Ta Period like the present, when every Part of the British Empire is threatened with Danger, more or lels imminent according to its local Situation, and other Circumstances, which may serve to provoke the Avarice or Ambition of a rapacious. proud, and infolent Enemy, we, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishops and Clergy of the Scotch Episcopal Church, consider ourselves bound to request your Royal Permission to approach the Throne, with those renewed Assurances of the most inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, which so well become our Character as Christian Pastors, and are no less conducive to our Honor and Interest as British Subjects.
