A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to repeal an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or residing therein, in certain Cases;" We are authorized by Our Royal Proclamation, from Time to Time, to require and command every Alien who now is in, or who shall hereafter come into, Great Britain, except as therein excepted, to register himself or herself, and thereupon to obtain Our Royal Licence to reside within this Kingdom, as therein-mentioned: Now We, being desirous of carrying into Execution the Purposes of the said Act, do, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, require and command every Alien who shall be in this Kingdom on the Day of the Date of this Our Proclamation, except as hereinafter excepted, to register himself or herself, in the Manner hereinafter-mentioned; that is to say,

All Aliens residing in the City of London shall, within Ten Days from the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with the Lord Mayor of the said City:

All Aliens residing in the City and Liberties of Westminster, or elsewhere within the Bills of Mortality (except the City of London), or residing within Ten Miles of the City of London, shall, within Ten Days from the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with the Magistrates at One of the undermentioned Public

Offices, in the District of which Office such Alien shall then reside; that is to say, the Police Office Queen-Square, Westminster; Great Marlbro'-Street; Hatton-Garden; Lambeth-Street, Whitechapel; Worship-Street, Shoreditch; High-Street, Shadwell; and Union-Hall, Southwark:

All Aliens residing out of the Districts aforesaid, and within any Cities or Corporate Towns, or within the Jurisdiction of the Magistrates of such Cities or Corporate Towns respectively, shall, within Fourteen Days from the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate of such Cities or Corporate Towns respectively:

And all Aliens residing in other Places in Great Britain shall, within Eighteen Days from the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, so register themselves with some Magistrate of the County or Place where such Aliens respectively shall reside.

And We do further require and command all Aliens who shall come into Great Britain, after the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, to register themselves in the Manner hereinafter-mentioned with the Lord Mayor, Mayors, or other Magistrates as aforesaid, within Two Days after every such Alien shall have arrived within any such City, Town, District, or other Place to which he shall be allowed to proceed, by Passport granted for that Purpose, except Aliens who are required by Our Proclamation of the Twelfth August last to land at no other Port than the Ports of Yarmouth, Harwich, Dover, and Southampton, and at Gravesend, whom We hereby require and command to register themselves in Manner hereinafter-mentioned, at the Alien Office in Crown-Street, Westminster.

And We do further require and command every Alien, for the Purpose of obtaining such Licence as aforesaid, to deliver, or cause to be delivered, to

the Person or Persons with whom such Alien is hereby required to register himself or herself as aforesaid, a full and true Declaration or Account in Writing of his or her Name, Age, Place of Birth, Rank, Occupation, Profession, the Place of Residence when last in his or her own Country, together with the last and principal Place of Residence before his or her Arrival in this Kingdom, the Name or Names of some Person or Persons in this Country to whom known, the Reason or Purpose for which he or she came to this Kingdom, the Time when, and the Place at which, such Alien last arrived in Great Britain, and where his or her actual Residence has been since such last Arrival, and is at the Time of giving in such Declaration, which said Declaration or Account shall be signed by such Alien with his or her Name or Mark.

And We do hereby authorize and appoint the said Lord Mayor, Mayors, and other Magistrates as aforesaid respectively, to receive such Accounts as aforesaid, and do require and command them respectively to cause the original Account to be transmitted within Two Days to Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, for the Purpose of such Alien obtaining Our Royal Licence to reside within Great Britain from the said Secretary, whom We do hereby authorize and appoint to grant such Licences, or from such other Person or Persons who now are, or who shall from Time to Time be authorized and appointed by Us to grant such Licences.

And We do further authorize and require the said Lord Mayor, Mayors, and other Magistrates as aforesaid, to whom any such Accounts shall be delivered as aforesaid, to grant under his Hand and Seal to the Alien delivering such Account, a provisional Licence to reside within Great Britain, under such Restrictions as shall appear fit, during the Time that shall be therein allowed to such Alien for obtaining Our Royal Licence as aforesaid.

And We do further declare, That this Our Proclamation shall not extend to require any Alien to obtain such Licence as aforesaid, who shall, before the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, have obtained Our Royal Licence to reside in any Part of this Kingdom.

And We do further direct, That every Alien as aforesaid, upon every Change of Residence, as well to any Place in the same City, Town, District, or Place, as in any other City, Town, District, or Place, shall give Four Days previous Notice thereof to the Person or Persons with whom he or she has been so registered, and shall again register himself or herself in Manner before-mentioned according to such new Residence, declaring the Residence from whence he or she so removed.

And We do further declare, That no Foreign Ambassador, or other public Minister duly autho-

rized, nor the domestic Servants of any such Foreign Ambassador, or public Minister registered according to the Directions of the Laws in force for that Purpose, and being actually attendant upon such Ambassador or Minister; nor any Alien not above the Age of Fourteen Years, shall be deemed within the Meaning and Intent of this Proclamation.

And We do further declare, That all such Licences, and provisional Licences, as aforesaid shall be given without Fee or Reward, and shall be subject to no Duty or Charge whatsoever.

And We do further declare and make known, That every Alien who shall be found at large in Great Britain after the Time by this Our Proclamation limited for registering and thereupon obtaining Licences as aforesaid, such Aliens not having obtained such Licence respectively, and not being exempted as aforesaid, will be liable on Conviction to suffer Imprisonment for any Time not exceeding Six Months, according to the Provisions of the said Act.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twelfth Day of October One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign.

WE, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Noblemen, Heritors, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, Commissioners of Supply, Clergy, and Gentlemen of the County of Banff, assembled, impressed with a Sense of the present important Crisis, presume to approach the Throne with our unanimous Assurance of Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

The Contest in which the Nation is involved we consider as just as it is necessary, and now humbly beg Leave to come forward with an Offer of our Lives and Properties for the Safety of our Majesty's Person, and the Honor and Independence of the Crown.

We behold with Horror the Cruelties and Injustice exercised by the Military Despot of France

over other Countries. We contemplate with Indignation and Contempt, his Menaces against our own. But we view with Admiration the Zeal and Determination manifested by all the Subjects of your Majesty's Dominions, as a System with the Assistance of Almighty God, the most certain to overwhelm the Devices, and check the Plans of an Usurper who aspires to universal Rule through the Subversion of our Civil and Religious Privileges, who hopes to complete his Views of Aggrandizement by the Annihilation of that glorious Constitution, which is the Envy of surrounding Nations.

Whilst we reprobate the ambitious Designs of our Enemy, we trust that, with the Assistance of Almighty God, the wise Counsels of your Majesty's Government, and the vigorous Exertions of your Navy and Army, these Designs will be frustrated, and the Blessings of Peace restored. And pray that your Majesty may long reign over your free and happy People.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Aberdeen, in Synod assembled, deeply impressed with a Sense of the many Blessings we have enjoyed under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Government, beg Leave, at a Crisis when a foreign Enemy, the Slaves of an ambitious Despot, threaten the Subversion of the religious and civil Establishment of your United Kingdom, to approach the Throne with an Expression of that Zeal for the Support of your Majesty's Government, which we feel as Britons, and with that Gratitude for your Majesty's paternal Indulgence and Benignity, by which we are actuated as Members of the Church of Scotland. Solicitous, as we have been, to impress upon the People committed to our Charge the Duties which we owe to our God, our King, and our Country, we cannot contemplate without Indignation the projected Invasion of your Kingdom by a Nation who wish to spread over this happy Land the Miseries which they have introduced into their own. We have encouraged our People to place their Confidence in the Lord of Hosts, and to make the most zealous and active Efforts for the Defence of our common Country, and of our beloved Sovereign, and for the Maintenance of that glorious Constitution under which we have the Happiness to live.

We congratulate your Majesty on the Unanimity which, by the Blessing of God, prevails among all Ranks and Orders of your Majesty's Subjects, on the just Sense entertained of those Privileges which we enjoy, as well as of the Danger with which they are threatened, and on the patriotic and zealous Preparations in which all combine for repelling it.

May the Almighty Governor of the World avert the Dangers that threaten these Lands; defeat all the Designs of your Majesty's and our Enemies;

continue that Protection and Blessing which your Majesty has so frequently experienced; and to transmit to the latest Posterity our invaluable Rights and Privileges, both civil and religious.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Judiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Judiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court

of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
