fifeuce, are its to be feared flatved; to supply them the neighbouring Princes and States have take, care to have Provisions carried within a mile of the place, and there left in the open Field, to be setcht away by the Inhabitants.

Coogne, Nov. 15. Some of the old Burgermafkis of this City being acculed of milemploying the jullick Moneys, and of other mildemeanors; the jurghers have taken upon them their Profecutions and that no diforders may on this occafion be committed, a Guard has been appointed to fecure the Houfes of those that are acculed, from all violence, and to preferve the publick Peace. It is believed, that in 8 or 10 days Sentence will be pronounced againfithem, and till then we fhall not know the particulars of their charge; In the mean time the diffcouse among the common people is, that in the year 1513, the Burgermallers were first put to the Torture, and afterwards Beheaded, for no greater crimes than thefe are acculed of.

Hamburg, Nov. 15. Sir Robert Southwel, Envoye Extraordinary from the King of England to the El. Ctor of Brandenburgh, is arrived here from Berlin, and will embark to morrow for England. From Sweden they write, that the King had conferred the Charge of Rycks Droft upon Count Magnus de In Gardie; and that of Chancellor, voyd by his preferment, on Count Bengt Oxensterne, his late Ambasfador at the Treaty of Nimeguen; that the States were flift Affembled, and that the chief Matter before them, was the providing a good Navy, and a conflant Land Army, which the King was very zealous in, as a thing of absolute necessity, for the making himfelf and his Kingdom confiderable to his neighb.rs. The Letters we receive from Staden inform us, that Wifmar will certainly be reffored to the Swedes in very few days; the King of Denmark having fent the neceffary Orders for that purpoic.

Hague, Nov. 19. To morrow the States of Holland meet, their main bufinefs will be to regulate their Revenues, which they left urfinished when they parted last. The Prince of Orange went henceon Wednesday to Soefidyke, having Dined with Mr. Sidney. We are expecting here the Printes of Ofnabrug, the eldest whereof goes for England, and the other for France.

Swanzer, Nov. 6. We have had of late very blowing weather. Some days fince a finall Vefiel belonging to Barnstaple was cast away about feven miles from hence, all the Men loss. We are likewise irformed that a Ship of about 140 Tun, belond for Landon from the Barbados, was cast away the last week at a place called Stackepoole, the Men all faved, but little of the Goods but what are dannified.

Plymonth, Nov. 9. Since my last, the Newcasile, the Phenix, and the Guernsey Frigats are arrived here from the Downs, with above 100 Sail of Merchant Ships under their Convoy.

Deal, Nov 11. Two days fince a Pink of about 80 Tuns, belonging to Amfierdum, and bound for Guinea, was driven alhore to the Northwards of this place, and broke in pieces; the Goods.were most faved and carried to Sandwich.

Whitehal, Nov. 12. On Wednefday laft Don Pedro de Ronquillo, Ambaffador fi om the King of Spain to His Majefty, made his publick Eatry, having been received at Greenwich by the Earl of Chefferfield, and Sir Charles Cotterel Matter of the Ceremonies, and from thence brought by Water in the Kings Barge to Tower-Eill, where at his Landing, his Excellency was Saluted with a Difcharge of feveral pieces of Canon, and was conducted in his Majeflics Coach of State, followed with a Train of above 50 Coaches more with fix Horfes apieer, to Wild-Houfe: His Excellencies Equipage was very fplendid, confifting of fix Pages, who with the Gentlerman of his Horfe were on Horfeback, and 20 Footmen in noble Liveries, and three very rich Coaches with fix Horfes each.

Yesterday in the afternoon his Excellency was conducted in the like manner by the Earl of Bridgewater and Sir Charles Cotterel to his Audience, which he had of His Majelty in the Banqueting House with the utual Solemnity. And this Evening his Excellency had his Audience of the Queen in her Bedchamber.
