AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 21st of November 1803,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of December next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or

"Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Colonies of Demerara and Essequibo have surrendered to His Majesty's Arms, and the Territories and Forts of the same are delivered up to His Majesty, and the said Colonies are now in His Majesty's Possession; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, That all His Majesty's Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said Colonies, subject, nevertheless, to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies, is or shall be subject by Law: And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the said Colonies, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of this Kingdom in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Copy of a Letter from Sir James Saumarez, K. B. Rear-Admiral of the Blue, &c. to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated at Guernsey, the 15th Instant.

SIR,

I BEG you will please to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that having detached His Majesty's Ship Poulette, on the breaking up of the late Gale of Wind, to watch the Enemy's Armaments on the French Coast, and to reconnoitre the Port of Cherbourg, Captain Dunbar had the good Fortune to fall in with a French Convoy of about Thirty Sail, escorted by a National Brig and other Armed Vessels, standing to the Eastward, the Whole of which were driven on the Rocks of Cape La Hague; Three of them were cut out by the Boats of the Poulette, assisted by the Liberty Brig, under a smart Fire from the Shore.

I herewith enclose Captain Dunbar's Letter, and cannot too highly commend the Zeal and good Conduct displayed by him, his Officers, and Men, on this Service, which has been effected without the Loss of a single Man.

His Majesty's Ship Poulette, at Sea, November 15, 1803.

SIR,

AS I was passing the Island of Alderney this Morning, about a Quarter past Eleven, I came up with a Convoy belonging to the Enemy, consisting of about Thirty Sail, steering to the Eastward, escorted by several Armed Vessels, and in the Act of rounding Cape La Hague.

I have great Pleasure in acquainting you, that the Attack made on them by His Majesty's Ship under my Command was such as to compel their Crews to run them on the Rocks, where they became completely exposed to our Shot, as well as the Dangers incident to that Situation. It is impossible for me to describe sufficiently the Zeal and good Conduct of those under me: every Officer and Man volunteered their Services in the Boats, by which a Brig, a Lugger, and a Sloop, the latter made fast with her Cable to the Shore, were cut out under a smart Fire, while the Ship was carried, and anchored within Three Cables' Length of the Surf, to cover those engaged on this Enterprize. As the rest were left dry by the Tide, I am confident that several are totally lost. Those that fell into our Hands are new, and from having Sweeps on board, though not armed, evidently intended to aid the Invasion. The Liberty took ashore, but the Moucheron could not get up in Time. I am most happy to add that not a Man was hurt, and the Loss of an Anchor is all that we experienced.
