it is faid that the Elector of Majence is endeavouring to get the Fair removed from thence to his Town of Erfort; which if he does, it will be a great loss to all the Countrey of Saxony. Every body here is in great expectation of the Answer from spain, to the Electors Letter of the 22 of September, justifying his Reprilal; upon that Answer it is thought will depend the good or bad fuccess of that Affair.

Cologne, Nov. 19. Two days fince arrived here Mr. Bartue, Envoye Extraordinary from the Kiegof England to the Princes on the Rhine. The Affair concerning the old Burgermalters, who are accused by the Commonalty, make a great deal of stir, and many people apprehend, it will not be determined without some disturbance (the ordinary fort of people being very much incenfed) to prevent which, thick Guards are kept every night.

Hamburg, Nov. 19. From Saxony we have an Account, that the young Elector had made a great Reformation in his Court; that he had discharged a great many of the Officers of his Fathers Houthold, intending in that, and in his whole way of living, to lessen his Expences: Instead whereof he was refulved to keep up an Army of 20000 men, being a Prince of a very Martial Di'polition, and that he had already made choice of the general Officers to Command it. From Poland they write, that the Conferences concerning the adjulling the Limits, were put off till Spring; and that therenpon the Polish Troops were going into their Winter Quarters. The Duke of Hanover came two days fince to Zell, to take his leave of his Brother, before his departure for Italy, whither he is going. Wifmar will certainly be restored to the Swedes in few days,

Amsterdam, Nov. 22. The States of Holland met the 20th Inflant; we do not expect this Seffion will produce anything of great moment, it being intended chiefly for Domestique Affairs. It has been reported that the Elector of Brandenburg was so much distatissied with the Placaet published by the States General, for the recalling their Subjects out of the Service of Forreign Princes, which he lookt upon as chiefly meant against himself, that he had refolved to recall fuch of his Subjects as are in the service of this State: The affair of Liege may have great consequences, for that City is resolved to perfest in the Resolutions they have taken not to submit to the new Impositions laid upon them by their Prince, and have written to the States-General, to acquaint them therewith, and to defire them to fland by them in it.

Haque, Nov. 22. The City of Liege has written a Letter to the States-General, in which they acquaint them, that they are positively resolved not to submit to the Imposition of the 60th penny laid by the Elector of Cologne upon all Merchandizes, and desire their Assistance, in case they shall have need of it; upon which we do not hear that the States have as yet taken any Resolution. The States have answered the Letter written to them by the Duke of Neuburg, concerning the Arrears of Subfidi s due to him, by which they promise the payment thereof. The state of the War for the next year, having been formed by the Council of State, the same was yesterday presented to the States-General, who have ordered it to be communicated to the feveral Provinces, for their approbation. We are told that it differs very little from that of the last year.

Bruffels, Nov. 20. The Provinces having prefented the Prince of Parma with several sums of Money, as they have accustomed to do to all their Sovernors, upon their coming to the Government; his Highness has been so generous, as to employ the same for the publick service, and particularly, for the providing new Cloaths for the Soldiers in this Province. At Liege things are in the same posture we gave you an account of in our former, and they go on to make Levies, and to provide for their Defence and Security, in case their Prince the Elector of Cologne shall employ force against them, as it has been reported he intends to do; though as yet we do not hear that any Troops are in Motion for that purpote. The Prince of Parma's Son is gone for England.

Versailles, Nov. 15. The 12th Instant the Marquis de Ferrera, Ambassador from the Duke of Savoye. had his publick Audience. Here has been a report of great disturbances at Lisbon, and that the Prince Regent had caused the chirf Magistrate of the City to be secured, which our next Letters from Portugal will let us know what ground there is for.
