## LORD DUNCAN'S VICTORY.

Lloyd's Coffee-House, January 17, 1804.

At a Meeting of the Committee appointed to manage the Subscription raised for the Benefit of the Wounded, and the Families and Relatives of those who were Killed, in the Action of the 11th of October 1797,

WILLIAM PITT, Esq; in the Chair,

The following Report was read:

The Committee, on the 29th of October 1802, advertised, in Compliance with the Resolutions of a General Meeting of Subscribers, that "All Gratuities, not satisfactorily claimed within Twelve Months, should be appropriated as follows: "All Sums voted to Foreigners, and unclaimed, to be paid to the Consuls, Ministers, Deacons, or Heads of Churches, in London, of the Nation to which the Parties belonged, for the Benefit of such sick or distressed Seamen of their Nation as may frequent this Port in Times of Peace; and the Gratuities voted to British Subjects, and those whose supposed Countries cannot be ascertained, be given to charitable Institutions connected with the Commerce and Navy of this Country."

The Committee report, that, agreeably to the above Resolution, they have endeavoured, by public Advertisements and other Channels, to find out those Foreigners, or their Families, (if any,) who had an honorable and a National Claim on the Funds of this Committee, for Services or Sufferings in Defence of this Country; and, where they have been unsuccessful, they have paid the Gratuities which the Parties would have been entitled to receive over to the Consuls or Heads of Churches of Foreign Nations, as directed in the preceding Resolution.

That, out of the Funds allotted to British Subjects, or those whose supposed Country could not be ascertained, and that have not yet been found out or claimed within the Time limited, the Committee have also been enabled to fulfil the Second Part of their Instructions, by giving to

as Public and National Institutions connected with the Commerce and Navy of the United Kingdom.

The Committee, having, in their Report to the Public of the 9th July 1801, and the 29th October 1802, stated the Receipt and Appropriation of a Subscription, the Liberality of which kept Pace with the enterprising Spirit and Valour of British Seamen, beg briefly to state, that they have now finally closed their Trust and their Duty; and that they have expended (including 7959l. 10s. 3d. arising from Dividends and Interest on Navy and Exchequer Bills, &c.) the Sum of 53,446l. 12s. 1d. for the Relief and Support of One Thousand and Forty Claimants, including Thirty-four Cases not found out.

It is with peculiar Pleasure that the Committee farther report, that they have received the strongest Testimonials and Assurances from every Part of the United Kingdom, and from Foreign Countries, that the Distribution of this Fund has not only given Comfort and Happiness to a numerous and meritorious Class of Men, as well as Settlement and Apprenticeship to Children, but that it has also had the happy Tendency of making the British Name and the British Navy respected at Home and Abroad.

The Committee have annexed a short Statement of the Total Receipts and Expenditure of their Funds; but they cannot take Leave of the Public without expressing their Acknowledgement of the unremitting Attention of Calverley Bewicke, Esq; their late worthy Chairman, to the Concerns of this Committee; and sincerely regret, that he
