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Naples, Octob. 28.

Corn being at present very scarce here, our Viceroy the Marquis *de los Peles* is taking care to supply us from abroad, and for that purpose has raised a sum of Money, The Levies in this Kingdom are continued, our Vic roy, as we are informed, having received Orders from *Spain*, to raise in all 10000 Foot; and to fill the Magazines with Arms, Powder, and other Military Provisions. From *Reggio* we have Advice, that eight men of War of *Tripoly* have lately appeared in the Seas of *Calabria*, and that they had taken a Vessel belonging to *Malta*, and another to *Genoua*. The Vic-roy has Declared that he will grant a Pardon to such Banditi, as will come in, and put themselves into the Kings Service, and has directed the Courts of Justice to Reprieve such Criminals as are Condemned to dye, and to send them to the Gallies.

Warsaw, Octob. 30. We are assured that the King and Queen of *Poland* will be here about the middle of *December*, when the Senate will meet to receive the Report of our Ambassador, who is returning from *Moscow*; against that time Prince *Radzeville*, who has been at *Vienna*, at *Venice*, and at *Rome*, is believed will be likewise here, and its not doubted but that the Account he gives of the disposition he found those Courts in to assist this Crown, in case it be engaged in a War with the Turks, will have a great influence upon the Debates and Resolutions of the Senate. There is a discourse concerning the calling a Dyet to meet in *January*, but without any certainty. The Troops of this Kingdom, as well as those of the Grand Signior, who have lain most of the Summer on the Frontiers of this Kingdom, and near *Caminiec*, are now in their Winter Quarters, where they will continue till Spring, when the Conferences for adjusting the Limits between us and the Turks will be renewed. The Marquis *de Vi-try*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the French King, arrived here the last week, and is gone to wait upon their Majesties. We have Advice that *Sierko*, General of the Cossacks, a man famous in these parts, for the many considerable Actions he has been in, is dead.

Genoua, Nov. 6. By a Vessel arrived from *Sicily* we have Advice, That on the 6th past, the Gallies of *Malta* met with two Ships belonging to *Tripoli*, which after a Fight of several hours they took were no sooner masters of them, but they both sunk, and in them 80 Maltese, who perished, with 600 Turks that were on board them. From *Milana* they write, that the Count *de Melgar* their Governour, had reformed 40 Companies of Foot, and put the Men into other Regiments.

Venice, Nov. 9. The last week we received Letters from *Constantinople*, which give an Account,

that there were endeavours using to conclude a Peace between the Turks and the Moscovites, which it was believed both parties were well enough endeavored to. The Duke of *Mantoua*, who has been some time here, parted yesterday for *Padoua*, Signior *Donato* is preparing for his Embassie to *Constantinople*.

Strasburg, Nov. 15. The Bilhop of *Strasburg* continues as yet in our neighborhood, but will not do long so, intending, as we are told, to return very suddenly to *France*; Count *Chavaignac*, who is General of Battaille in the Emperors Service, is come hither and intends to pass the winter here. It is said that Orders are come from *France*, to employ more hands on the Fortifications of *Brissac*, *Schlestadt*, *Fribourg*, *Hunningen*, &c. in order to the speedy finishing them.

Cologne, Nov. 18. It is confidently said, that before *Christmasts* we shall hear something concerning a Coadjutor, which our Elector as they say, at last is prevailed with to consent to; he must be chosen by the Chapter; and the Prince of *Furstemberg* is not wanting in the mean time to advance what he can, the pretension of his Brother the Bilhop of *Strasburg*, who we hear is going to *Paris*, but this is a thing that has been often talked of, when there was little ground for it; and so perhaps it may be at this time. The Electors Palatine Dowager arrived on Saturday last at *Frankfort*, and parted again the next day for *Heydelberg*.

Hamburg, Nov. 18. From *Poland* they write, that the King and Queen arrived the 25th past at *Faworow*, and intended to remove in few days again from thence to *Zolkiew*, where they would remain till towards the Dyet, which is appointed to meet at *Warsaw* the 15th of *January*, in order to the taking those Resolutions as the state of Affairs may require. From *Berlin* we have an Account, that the Elector of *Brandenburg*, upon the Instances of the Dutch Minister there, had caused the Placet which he had ordered to be published, for the recalling his Subjects out of the Service of the States-General of the *United-Provinces* to be stopped. The Letters from *Sweden* say, that the King had demanded of the States assembled at *Stockholm*, five Millions, which it was believed they would Grant; and that the Matter concerning the reunion of the Crown-Lands met with great difficulties, which it was likely would at last be overcome.

Brussels, Nov. 26. On Sunday last the Prince of *Parma* sent an Express to *Spain*, as we are told, to give the King an Account of the state of these Provinces. The Marquis *de Bourghmanero*, Ambassador to the Emperor is still here. Yesterday the Sieur *Baltier*, Envoye from the Duke of *Zell*, had his first Audience of the Prince of *Parma*.

Marseilles, Nov. 17. We have not of late had any news of the Sieur *du Quesne*, who its said, is believed to give the *Tripolins* another visit before he returns home. Those Pyrats have lately taken another Ship belonging to this place, bound home

from *Alexandria*, worth 30000 Pieces of Eight, so that within this I welvemonth they have taken four of the best Ships that belong to this place, The Duke de *Vandosme*, Governor of this Province is daily expected here, and great preparations are making for his Reception. The Duke de *Vivonne* General of the Gallies, parted from hence some days past for *Paris*, and we are told, that the Duke de *Mortemar* his Son is to succeed him in that Command.

Paris, Nov. 27. The King has given the Government of *Tbionville*, vacant by the death of the *Marfchal de Grancy*, to Monsieur de *Choily*, Governor of the Castle of *Cambray*. The Dauphin is every day more and more re-established in his health. There are two Briefs come from the Pope, the one directed to the Archbishop of *Tholouze*, and the other to the Chapter of *Pamiers*, concerning the Regality.

Whitehal, Nov. 23. This morning arrived here a Gentleman, sent Express by Sir *Henry Goodrick*, His Majesties Envoye Extraordinary at *Madrid*, with an Account of a late great Engagement between the Garrison of *Tangier* and the Moors; and of the happy success of it, the particulars whereof, as far as they are yet known, come in the inclosed Letters from *Malaga*; and we are hourly expecting a more perfect and fuller Account by an Express directly from the Garrison, which we suppose, by reason of the Winds, had not so quick a passage to *Cadiz*, as the Vessel had that brought this News to *Malaga*. The said Express speaks of the death of the Earl of *Plsmouth*, who dyed of a Feavor.

Malaga, Nov. 12. Three days since arrived here a small Vessel, which stopt at *Tangier*, from whence we have Letters which give an account, that on the second Instant Sir *Palmer Fairborne* the Governor, as he was riding without the Walls with a party of Horse to observe what the Moors were doing, was shot by one of them, and being mortally wounded fell from his Horse; That the Moors had entrencht themselves very near the Town, whereupon the Garrison, consisting of 4000 Horse and Foot, sallied out upon them, Commanded by Colonel *Sackville*; That they marcht out in the right, but were quickly discovered by the Moors Scatinils, who immediately gave the Alarm, That in the morning there was a very sharp Engagement, which lasted six hours, and then the Moors, who were above 20000, fled, and were pursued by the English, who killed above 1500 of them, took four of their greatest Guns, and filled up all their Trenches and then retired to the Town with several Prisoners, having obtained a most signal Victory, wherein the Spanish Horse behaved themselves as well as Men could do. The day the said Vessel came from *Tangier*, which was the 7th Instant, they heard much Shooting, which makes us believe there has been a second Engagement.

Malaga, Nov. 12. By a Vessel arrived from *Tangier* we have Advice, that on Wednesday last, all the Force of that Garrison took the Field, and gave Battle to about 30000 Moors, the Spanish Horse and 800 Seamen marcht in the Van, the English Horse with the Main body, The Fight lasted near six hours, with the slaughter of between 1500 and 2000 Moors, and of 150 of the Garrison; the Moors fled, the English kept the Field, took six pieces of Canon, and six Colours; every Soldier that brought

in a Flag had 30 Guineas given him, and every one that took a Moor prisoner, had him for his encouragement, there was about 20 taken, and 300 Bodies of Moors were dragged together in one heap, and as many Heads into another Pile. But the great misfortune was, that the Saturday before, the Governor, as he was walking under the Walls, received a mortal wound, which the Spanish Horse so bravely resisted, that immediately without Command they Mounted and Charged the Moors with that courage, that they killed many of them, with the loss of 7 or 8 of themselves. Before this Action the Moors were so near the Walls of the Town, that with Hand-slings they pelted our Soldiers with stones. The day after this Vessel came from *Tangier*, they heard much Shooting.
