Naples, Offob. 28.

Orn being at present very scarce here, our Viceroy the Marquis de los Veles is taking care to supply us from abroal, and for that purp f has railed a sum of Money, The evic in this Kingdom are continued, our Vic roy, as we are informed, having received Orders from Spain, to raise in all 10000 Foot; and to fill the Magazines with Arms, Powder, and other Military Provisions. From Reggio we have Advice, that eight m n of War of Tripoly have lately appeared in the S as of Calabria, and that they had taken a Veffel belonging to Maltha, and another to Genoua. The Viceroy has Declared that he will grant a Pardon to such Banditi, as will come in, and put themselves into the Kings Service, and has directed the Courts of Justice to Reprieve such Criminals as are Condemned to dye, and to fend them to the Gallies.

Warfaw, Ottob. 30. We are affured that the King and Queen of Poland will be here about the middle of Fecember, when the senate will meet to receive the Report of our Amballador, who is returning from Moscow; against that time P ince Radzeville, who has been at Vienna, at Venice, and at Rome, its believed will be likewife here, and its not doubted but that the Account he gives of the d sposition he found those Courts in to assist this Crown, in case it be engaged in a War with the Turks, will have a great influence upon the Debates and Resolu ions of the Senate. There is a discourse concerning the calling a Dyet to meet in Fanuary, but withou any certainty. The Troops of this King lom, as will as those of the Grand Signior, who have lain most of the Summer on the Frontiers of this Kingdom, and near Caminiec, are now in their Winter Quarters, where they will continue till Spring, when the Conferences for adjusting the Limits between us and the Turks will be renewed. The Marquis de Vitry, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Freich King, arrived here the last week, and is gone to wait upon their Majesties. We have Advice that Sierko, General of the Cossacks, a man famous in these parts, for the many considerable Actions he has been in, is dead.

Genoua, Nov 6. By a Vessel arrived from Sicily we have Advice, That on the 6th past, the Galisis of Maltha met with two Ships belonging to Tripoli, which after a Fight of leveral hours they took were no sooner matters of them, but they both sunk, and in them 80 Malthells, who perished, with 600 - Turks that were on board them. From Milan they write, that the Count de Melgar their Governor, had reformed 40 Companies of Foot, and put the Men into other Regiments

Venice, Nov. 9. The last week we received Letrers from Constantino, les which gird air Account,

that there were endeavours using to conclude a Peace between the Turks and the Moscovites, which it was believed both parties were well enough enclined to. The Duke of Mantoua, who has been forme time here, parted yellerday for Padous, Signior Donato is preparing for his Embassic to Confrantinople.

Strasburg, Nov. 15. The Bilhop of Strasburg continues as yet in our neighborhood, but will not do long fo, intending, as we are told, to return very fuddainly to France; Count Chavaignac, who is General of Battaille in the Emperors Service, is come hither and intends to pass the winter here. It is faid that Orders are come from France, to employ more hands on the Fortifications of Brifac, Schlestadt, Frie bourg, Hunningen, &c. in order to the speedy finish-

ing them. Cologne, Nov. 18; It is confidently faid, that bo fore Christmass we shall hear something concerning a Coad, u.or, which our Elector as they say, at last is prevailed with to confent to; he must be cholen by the Chapter; and the Prince of Furstemberg is not wanting in the mean time to adva ce what he can, the pretention of his Brother the Bilhop of Strasburg, who we heat is going to Paris, but this is a thing that has been often talked of, when there was I tile ground for it; and so perhaps it may by at this time. The Electoress Palatine Dowager arrived on Saturday last at Francfort, and parted ar gain the next day for Heydelberg.

Hamburg, Nov 18. From Poland they write, that the King and Queen arrived the 25th pall at Famore row, and intended to remove in few days again from theree to Zoikiew, where they would remain till towards the Dyet, which is appointed to meet at Warfam th 15th of Fahuary, in order to the taking those R. Jolutions as the flate of Affairs may require. From Berlin w have an Account, that the Elector of Branden urg, upon the Islances of the Dutch, Minister there, had caused the Placaet which he had ord red to be published, for the recalling his Subjects out of the Service of the States-General of the United-Provinces to be stopt. The Letters' from Sweden lay, that the King had d manded of the States affembled at Stockholm, five Millions, which it was b leved they would Grant; and that the Matter concerning the re-union of the Crown-Lands met with great difficulties, which it was likely would at last be overcome.

Bruffels, Nov. 26. On Sunday last the Prince of Purma lent an Express to Spain, as we are told, to give the King an Account of the state of these Provintes. The Marqu's de Bourgammero, Ambassador to the Emperor is still here Yesterday the Sieur Baltier, Envoye from the Duke of Zell, had his first Audience of the Prince of Parma,

Marfeilles. Nov. 13. We have not of late had any news of the Sicur du Luefne, who its faid, is relobwed to give the Tripolins another wifit before he returns hom-. Those Pyrats have lately taken another ship belonging to this place, bound home from

from Alexandria, worth 30000 Pieces of Eight, so that within this I welvementh they have taken four of the beil Ships that belong to this place, The Duke de Vandosme, Governor of this Province is daily expected here, and great preparations are making for his Reception. The Duke de Vivonne General of the Gallies, parted from hence some days past for Paris, and we are told, that the Duke de Mortemar his Sonis to succeed him in that Command.

Paris, Nov. 27. The King has given the Government of Thionville, vacant by the death of the Marcechal de Grancy, to Monficur de Choily, Governor of the Castle of Cambray. The Dauphin is every day more and more re-established in his health. There are two Briefs come from the Pope, the one directed to the Archbithep of Tholouze, and the other to the Chapter of Pamiers, concerning the Rega-

fity.

• Whitebal, Nov. 23. This morning arrived here a Gentleman, fent Express by Sir Heary Goodrick, His Majestics Envoye Extraordinary at Madrid, with an Account of a late great Engagement between the Gartison of Tanguer and the Moors; and of the happy success of it, the particulars whereof, as far as they are yet known, come in the inclosed L tters from Ma.aga; and we are hourly ex céting a more persect and fuller Account by an Express directly from the Garrison, which we suppose, by reason of the Wirds, had not so quick a passage to Cadiz, as the Vessel had that brought this News to Malaga. The said Express speaks of the death of the Earl of

Phymouth, who dyed of a Feavor. Malaga, Nov. 12. Three days fince arrived here a smal-Vessel, which stopt at Tangier, from whence we have Letters which give an account, that on the second Instant Sir Palmes Fairborne the Gov rnour, as he was riding without the Walls with a party of Horse to observe what the Moors were doing, was shot by one of them, and being mortally wounded sell from his Horse; That the Moors had entrencht themselves very near the Town, whereupon the Garrison, consising of 4000 Horse and Foot, fallyed out upon them, Commanded by Colonel Sackville; That they matched out in the right, but were quickly discovered by the Moors Scatinals, who immediately gave the Allerm, That in the morning there was a very that p Engag ment, which lasted fix hours, and then the Moors, who were above 20000, fled, and were purposed by the English, who killed above 1500 of them, took four of their greatest Guns, and filled up all their Irenches and then retired to the Town with sev ral Prifoners, having obtained a most signal Victory, wherein the Sparish Horse behaved them filv sas well as Men could do. The day the faid Veffel came from Tangier, which was the 7th Instant, they heard much Shooting, which mak's us believe there has -bcena iccond Engagement.

Maliga, Nov. 12. By a Veff I arrived from Tangier we have Advice, that on W direlday laif, all the Force of that Garrison took the Field, and gave Battle to about 30000 Moors, the Spanish Horse and 800 Scanien marched in the Van, the English Horse with the Main o. y. The Figlist lasted near fix heurs, with the slaughter of between 1500 and 2000 Moors, and of 150 of the Garrison; the Moors steel the English kept the Field, took six pieces of Canon, and six Colours; every Soldier that brought

in a Plag had 30 Guineas given him, and every one that took a Moor prisoner, had him for his encouragement, there was about 20 taken, and 300 Bodies of Moors were dragged together in one heap, and as many Heads into another Pile. But the great misfortune was, that the Saturday before, the Governor, as he was waiking under the Walls, received a mortal wound, which the Spanish Horse so bravely resented, that immediately without Command they Mounted and Charged the Moors with that.courage, that they killed many of them, with the loss of 700 8 of themselves. Before this Action the Moors were so near the Walls of the Town, that with Hand-slings they pelted our Soldiers with stones. The day after this Vessel came from Tangier, they heard much Shooting.
