from Alexandria, worth 30000 Pieces of Eight, so that within this I welvementh they have taken four of the beil Ships that belong to this place, The Duke de Vandosme, Governor of this Province is daily expected here, and great preparations are making for his Reception. The Duke de Vivonne General of the Gallies, parted from hence some days past for Paris, and we are told, that the Duke de Mortemar his Sonis to succeed him in that Command.

Paris, Nov. 27. The King has given the Government of Thionville, vacant by the death of the Marcichal de Grancy, to Monfieur de Choily, Governor of the Calile of Cambray. The Dauphin is every day more and more re-established in his health. There are two Briefs come from the Pope, the one directed to the Archbithep of Tholouze, and the other to the Chapter of Pamiers, concerning the Rega-

fity.

• Whitehal, Nov. 23. This morning arrived here a Gentleman, fent Express by Sir Henry Goodrick, His Majestics Envoye Extraordinary at Madrid, with an Account of a late great Engagement between the Gartison of Tangier and the Moors; and of the happy success of it, the particulars whereos, as far as they are yet known, come in the inclosed L tters from Ma.aga; and we are hourly ex céting a more perfect and fuller Account by an Express directly from the Garrison, which we suppose, by reason of the Winds, had not so quick a passage to Cadiz, as the Vessel had that brought this News to Malaga. The said Express speaks of the death of the Earl of Phymouth, who dyed of a Feavor.

Malaga, Nov. 12. Three days fince arrived here a smal-Vessel, which stopt at Tangier, from whence we have Letters which give an account, that on the second Instant Sir Palmes Fairborne the Gov rnour, as he was riding without the Walls with a party of Horse to observe what the Moors were doing, was shot by one of them, and being mortally wounded sell from his Horse; That the Moors had entrencht themselves very near the Town, whereupon the Garrison, constiting of 4000 Horse and Foot, fallyed out upon them, Commanded by Colonel Sackville; That they matched out in the right, but were quickly discovered by the Moors Scatin Is, who immediately gave the Allerm, That in the morning there was a very that p Engag ment, which lasted fix hours, and then the Moors, who were above 20000, fled, and were purposed by the English, who killed above 1500 of them, took four of their greatest Guns, and filled up all their Irenches and then retired to the Town with sev ral Prifoners, having obtained a troft fignal Victory, wherein the Sparish Horse behaved them filv sas well as Men could do. The day the faid Veffel game from Tangier, which was the 7th Instant, they heard much Shooting, which mak's us believe there has -bcena iccond Engagement.

Maliga, Nov. 12. By a Veff I arrived from Tangier we have Advice, that on W duelday lait, all the Force of that Garrison took the Field, and gave Battle to about 30000 Moors, the Spanish Horse and 800 Scannen marched in the Van, the English Horse with the Mann o. y. The Figlist lasted near fix heurs, with the slaughter of between 1500 and 2000 Moors, and of 150 of the Garrison; the Moors field the English kept the Field, took six pieces of Canon, and Mix Colours; every Soldier that brought

in a Flag had 30 Guineas given him, and every one that took a Moor prisoner, had him for his encouragement, there was about 20 taken, and 300 Bodies of Moors were dragged together in one heap, and as many Heads into another Pile. But the great misfortune was, that the Saturday before, the Governor, as he was wasking under the Walls, received a mortal wound, which the Spanish Horse so bravely refented, that immediately without Command they Mounted and Charged the Moors with that courage, that they killed many of them, with the loss of 7 or 8 of themselves. Before this Action the Moors were so near the Walls of the Town, that with Hand-slings they pelted our Soldiers with flones. The day after this Vessel came from Tangier, they heard much Shooting.
