Veffel Le Chameau, and destroyed another off Cape La Hague, on the Night of the 25th Instant. I am, &c. W. SELBY.

His Majelly's Ship Cerberus, off Cape La SIR, Hague, 26th January, 1804.
N pursuance of your Orders, I Yesterday at One P. M. weighed in His Majesly's Ship Cerberus, under my Command, from Guernsey Roads, and having passed through the Little Russel, I shaped a Course for Cape la Hague, in order, if possible, to look into Cherbourgh before dark; in our Approach to the above Cape, we discovered a Convoy of the Enemy, consisting of Four armed Vessels, steering to the Eastward. We had the good Fortune to cut them off before they reached the Cape, which obliged them to anchor. The Strength of the Tide pre-

rented our reaching them.

I therefore hauled the Wind to the Southward, under a Press of Sail, until after dark, when we bose up for Cape la Hague, and at Midnight saw them coming round the Cape, but so close to the Laud that it was considered dangerous to take the Ship near them. However, a heavy Squall of Wind driving them a little further from the Shore, we succeeded in capturing the National Gun Vessel. Le Chameau, and driving one on the Rocks, the rest effected their Escape, owing to the Vicinity of the Rocks, which at that Time was not more than a Cable's length from us.

The above Gun Veffel is Three Hundred Tons Burthen, is quite new, carrying Your long Six-Pounders and Two Swivels, and commanded by Francis Galliare Enfign de Vaisseau, laving on board at the Time of Capture Fifty-eight Men, Twenty-one of which are Soldiers, fully accountered. She is calculated to carry between Two and Three Hundred Troops, and appears to be a Gun Vessel fit for His Majesty's Service.

WHereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, that in the Night of Thursday the 22d of December last, about Ten o' Clock, the Report of several Guns awas beard in a Wood belonging to and near the House of Francis Ferrand Foljambe, Efg; of Osberton, in the County of Nottingham, whereupon William Hall his Gamekeeper, and several others of his Servants, went out to endeavour to epprehend the Ossens, and having pursued them from the Wood where the Report was first heard to another at some Distance, they all sexcept William Holmes, one of the Servants of Mr. Foljambe, who was on Horseback) entered the Wood, and in the Middle of it found one William Atkins armed with a Gun, which he presented, threatening to blow out the Brains of the first that came near him; and it was not till after considerable Resistance Atkins was secured: And whereas during the Struggle with Atkins the Report of another Gun was heard on the Oulside of the Wood, and immediately afterwards a Cry as of a Person in Agony, and thereupon several of the Servants of the faid Francis Ferrand Foljambe, Efq; ran to the Spot, and found there the faid William Holmes lying on the Ground dangerously wounded; and the faid William Holmes hat deposed, that feeing two Men, one in a Blue Jacket, the other in a Smock Frock, he rode up to the Man in a Jacket, and endeavoured to secure him, on which the Man immediately fired at him, and then, with his Companion, effected his Escape: And whereas the Circumstances of Two Men of the Names of Smith and William Thornton having been seen in Com-pany with Atkins on the Evening of the Commission of this atrocious Outrage in the Dress described by William Holmes; and it appearing that the faid William Thorn-ton that Evening bought Powder and Shot at Retford; and neither Smith nor Thornton having since been seen or heard of in the Neighbourhood where they resided, strongly authorize the Sufficion that they were Parties in the Perpetration of the Atrocity;

His Majesty, therefore, for the better and more speedily apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above Outrage, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of the said Offenders (except the Person who actually fired the Gun, and wounded the said William Holmes) who shall make such Discovery of his Accomplice or Accomplices therein
