HEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the infectious Distemper which some Time since raged in the City of New York, in the State of New York; at Philipping State of New Y ladelphia, in the State of Penfylvania; and at Alexandria, in the State of Virginia, within the United States of America, has totally ceased; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, and being de-sirous to remove all Restraint upon Trade, so sar as may be confishent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleafed, by and with the Acrice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Orders in Council of the Twenty-fixth October and Twenty-third November last, upon all Ships, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes which, subsequent to the First Day

any of the Ports in the States of New York, Pen-Sylvania, or Virginia, and had arrived, or which should thereafter arrive, in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Ports in the States of New York, Penfylvania, or Virginia, be taken off; and that all fuch Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Orders of the Twenty-sixth October and Twenty-third of November last had not been made, any Thing in the said Orders. contained to the contrary notwithstanding; provided such Ships and Vessels shall have failed from the Ports in the States of New York, Penfylvania, or Virginia, subsequent to the First Day of December last, and that uone of the Crew or other Persons on board shall have died, or been sick with the faid Fever, during the Course of the Voyage: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieuteuant-General, and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
