College of Arms, held at Our faid College on the Twenty-third Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, it was ordered, That the Trea-furer of Our faid College should provide, at the Office Expence, a Book to be used only for the Entry of the Pedigrees and Arms of the Knights Companions of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, and another for those of their respective Esquires; and that of every Entry so to be made, and for which the accustomed Fees shall have been paid to the College, the Register shall, upon the Application of the Genealogist of the said Order for the Time being, deliver, or cause to be delivered, to the faid Genealogist a Copy to be entered in the Books of the faid Order, according to the Statutes of the faid Order, and for which Copy no Fees shall be charged or taken by the Register, or any other Officer of the College: Now We, having duly confidered fuch Recommendation and fuch Order of Our College of Arms, do hereby command and en-join all the Knights who have been invelled with this Mott Honorable Military Order fince the Fif-teenth Day of June One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, (being the Date of the Patent of the present Genealogis,) and their Esquires, Governors, and Young Esquires, that they shall record their respective Pedigrees and Coat-Arms in the College of Arms, paying therefor the accultomed Fees; and that the taid Genealogist, or the Genealogilt for the Time being, shall procure a Copy of the same from the Register of Our said College of Arms, and examine and transcribe the same in the Genealogical Books of the faid Order: And We do hereby further command and enjoin, That each and every of the faid Knights, their Eiquires, Governors, and their Young Efquires, shall pay to the atorefaid Genealogist, or to the Genealogist for the Time being, for the examining and entering of fuch Pedigrees and Coat-Arms in the Genealogical Books of the faid Order in Manner following, to wit-For the first Descent or Generation the Sum of Six Shillings and Eight Pence, and for every additional Descent or Generation the Sum of Five Shillings, and for entering the Armorial Enligns of a Knight Companion the Sum of One Pound Ten Shillings, (all which Fees have been the usual Fees paid by Us out of Our Treasury in Cases where We have been gracionfly pleased to discharge the Expences incurred by the Investiture of any Knight Elect,) and for entering the Armorial Entigns of an Efquire Fifteen Shillings, the aforefaid Sums being conformable to a Table of Fees, dated the Seventeenth Day of March One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, iffued under the Hand of Our dear entirely beloved Son Frederick acting as Great Maller, and under the Seal of the faid Order, which faid Table We do, by these Pre-feots, confirm and ratify; and each and every of such Knights, Esquires, Governors, and Young Elquires, thall also pay to the Officer who may be employed to record their faid Pedigrees and Coat Arms in the College of Arms, the accuftomed Fee for so doing: And We do hereby direct all the faid Knights, Esquires, Governors, and Young Esquires, to certify their Belief of the Truth and Correctness of their respective Pedigrees in the Genealogical Books of the said Order: And We so hereby further ordain, That nothing herein contained shall prejudife or injure the Rights and Pri-

vileges of our faid Genealogist, as given and fecured to him by the aforesaid Statutes, which we, in all Respects, hereby confirm.

HIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorised by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Assagreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for railing the Sum of Fourteen Millions Five Hundred Thousand Pounds by Way of Annuities.

An Act for railing a certain Sum of Money by Way of Annuities or Debentures for the Service of Ireland.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, until Twelve Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, additional Duties of Excile on Wine imported into Great Britain.

An Act to revive and continue, until the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, for providing for the more speedy Completion of the Establishment of Officers in the Militia of Great Britain, and for facilitating the filling up Vacancies therein.

An Act for making Allowances in certain Cases to Subaltern Officers of the Militia in Great Britain while disembodied.

An Act to alter and amend fo much of an Act, passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His present Majelly, as relates to the Amount of the Sums to be paid by Persons compounding for the Personnance of Statute Duty.

An Act for empowering the Justices of the Peace for the County of Leicester, at their General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to make a fair and equal County Rate for the faid County.

An Act for enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Worcester and Birmingham Canal Navigation to raise Money to discharge their Debts, and to complete the said Canal Navigation: and for amending the several Acts passed for making the said Canal Navigation.

An Act to continue and render more effectual Two Acts, passed in the Thirty-third Year of His late Majesty, and the Twenty-second Year of His present Majesty, for laying a Duty of Two Pennies, Scots, or One-lixth Part of a Penny Sterling, on every Scots Pint of Ale or Beer brewed for Sale, or vended within the Town and Parish of Dalkeith; for paving, cleansing, and lighting the Streets of the said Town; and for erecting a new public Market therein.
