WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-third ultimo, to direct that all Ships or Vessels which should be bound to the Port of Greenock, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, from any Place or Places from whence Quarantine is required to be performed, should perform their Quarantine in Holy Loch, in the Firth of Clyde, in place of Lamfash, in the Island of Arran; and that all Goods on board such Ships should be aired at the same Place; His Majesty is hereby pleased to order, that Holy Loch, in the Firth of Clyde, instead of Lamfash, in the Island of Arran, shall also be the Place for the Performance of Quarantine by all Ships and Vessels which shall be bound to any of the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Port Glasgow, Greenock, Irwine, Campbelltown, Oban, Rothesay, Fort William, Air, Port Patrick, Stranraer, and Wigtown, or to any Member, Creek, or other Parts thereof, from any Place or Places from whence Quarantine is required to be performed; and that all Goods imported on board such Ships shall be aired at the same Place:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-first of Decen ber last, to prohibit, until the Thirty-first Day of March then ensuing, the Exportation of the several Articles of Provision mentioned in the said Order; and also to permit, for and during the

like Term, the Importation, Duty free, of the several Articles of Provision also specified in the said Order, which expired on the Thirty-first of March last; And whereas it is judged expedient that the Permission to import certain Articles of Provision free of Duty should be revived, and be in Force for some Time longer, His Majesty, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue several Laws relating to the suspending the Operation of Two Acts of the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty for restraining the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange, under a limited Sum, in England; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and five; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace;" is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months from the Date of this Order, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sage, Sage-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Cront, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act. And the Right Honorable the Lords Com-

missioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

ORDER OF THE BATH.

GEORGE the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, &c and Sovereign of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, to all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting: Whereas, by the Statute of Our said Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, it is provided, that We, the Sovereign thereof, have the Power of adding to the same from Time to Time, and of explaining any Particular therein, as to Us shall seem expedient, all which Additions and Explanations, under Our Sign Manual, are to be taken as Part and Parcel of the Statutes of our said Order: And whereas, in and by the Eighteenth Statute, it is (amongst other Things) declared to be the Duty of the Genealogist of the said Order to examine and enter the Pedigrees of the respective Persons then already elected, and of such as might hereafter be elected into the said Order, and of their Esquires, Governors, and of the Young Esquires, with their several Coat-Arms; and that he was likewise fairly to enter the same into Books, to remain to Posterity for the Memorial of their Families: And whereas certain Differences have arisen between Our Servants the King's Herald and Pursuivants of Our College of Arms, and the Genealogist of the said Most Honorable Order, respecting the Exercise of the Duties, which by the said Eighteenth Statute are assigned to Our said Genealogist, for the Adjustment of which a Chapter of the said Most Honorable Military Order was held on the 10th Day of June last: And whereas it was by the said Chapter resolved, That as it appeared to the Chapter to be the Opinion of the Law Officers of the Crown, that the Herald, (that is to say, Our Servants the King's Herald and Pursuivants of Our College of Arms,) have the Original Cognizance of Pedigrees and Coat-Armour, and that the Genealogist cannot properly receive any Evidence of Pedigree or Coat-Armour to be entered in his Books in pursuance of the Statutes, except from the College of Arms, The Chapter therefore humbly recommended to Us, that We would be pleased to command, that the Pedigrees and Arms of the Knights and Esquires of this Order should be recorded in the College of Arms, upon Payment of the accustomed Fees, and that Copies of such Pedigrees and Arms be communicated to the Genealogist of the Order, who shall enter the same in Books of the Order to be provided for that Purpose; and that We would also be graciously pleased to determine such Fees as the said Genealogist should be entitled to for making such Transcripts in those Books: And whereas at a Chapter of Our College of Arms, held at Our said College on the Twenty-third Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, it was ordered, That the Treasurer of Our said College should provide, at the Office Expence, a Book to be used only for the Entry of the Pedigrees and Arms of the Knights Companions of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, and another for those of their respective

Esquires; and that of every Entry so to be made, and for which the accustomed Fees shall have been paid to the College, the Register shall, upon the Application of the Genealogist of the said Order for the Time being, deliver, or cause to be delivered, to the said Genealogist a Copy to be entered in the Books of the said Order, according to the Statutes of the said Order, and for which no Fees shall be charged or taken by the Register, or any other Officer of the College: Now We, having duly considered such Recommendation and such Order of Our College of Arms, do hereby command and enjoin all the Knights who have been invested with this Most Honorable Military Order since the Fifteenth Day of June One thousand seven hundred and ninety two, (being the Date of the Patent of the present Genealogist,) and their Esquires, Governors, and Young Esquires, that they shall record their respective Pedigrees and Coat-Arms in the College of Arms, paying therefor the accustomed Fees; and that the said Genealogist, or the Genealogist for the Time being, shall procure a Copy of the same from the Register of Our said College of Arms, and examine and transcribe the same in the Genealogical Books of the said Order: And We do hereby further command and enjoin, That each and every of the said Knights, their Esquires, Governors, and their Young Esquires, shall pay to the aforesaid Genealogist, or to the Genealogist for the Time being, for the examining and entering of such Pedigrees and Coat-Arms in the Genealogical Books of the said Order in Manner following, to wit—For the first Descend or Generation the Sum of Six Shillings and Eight Pence; and for every additional Descend or Generation the Sum of Five Shillings; and for entering the Armorial Ensigns of a Knight Companion the Sum of One Pound Ten Shillings (all which Fees have been the usual Fees paid by Us out of Our Treasury in Cases where We have been graciously pleased to discharge the Expences incurred by the Investiture of any Knight Elect,) and for entering the Armorial Ensigns of an Esquire Fifteen Shillings, the aforesaid Sums being conformable to a Table of Fees, dated the Seventeenth Day of March One thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, issued under the Hand of Our dear entirely beloved Son Frederick acting as Great Master, and under the Seal of the said Order, which said Table We do, by these Presents, confirm and ratify; and each and every of such Knights, Esquires, Governors, and Young Esquires, shall also pay to the Officer who may be employed to record their said Pedigrees and Coat-Arms in the College of Arms, the accustomed Fee for so doing: And We do hereby direct all the said Knights, Esquire, Governors, and Young Esquires, to certify their Belief of the Truth and Correctness of their respective Pedigrees in the Genealogical Books of the said Order: And We do hereby further ordain, That nothing herein contained shall prejudice or injure the Rights and Privileges of our said Genealogist, as given and secured to him by the aforesaid Statutes, which we, in all Respects, hereby confirm.

Whereas His Most Gracious Majesty King George the First, for divers wise and honourable Considerations His said Most Gracious Majesty thereunto moving, did, by Letters Patent, bearing Date the Eighteenth Day of the Month of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and twenty-four, re-establish the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, whereof His said Most Gracious Majesty's Successors, Kings of England, were declared to be Sovereigns for ever; and it was also directed by the said Letters Patent, that the Officers of the said Most Honorable Order should consist of a Dean, Genealogist, King of Arms, Register, Secretary, Usher, and Messenger: And whereas upon the Re-establishment of the said Most Honorable Order, certain Statutes were ordained and enacted by His said Most Gracious Majesty, for the Government of the said Most Honorable Order, to be inviolably and perpetually observed within the said Most Honorable Order, and in the Second Section of such Statutes, His said Most Gracious Majesty nominated divers honorable Persons to be Companions of the said Most Honorable Order, and also nominated the proper Officers to belong thereto: And whereas by the Eighteenth Section of the said Statutes, the Duty of the Genealogist is set forth, and Power given to the Great Master for the Time being, to nominate and constitute the said Genealogist, and also to regulate the Fees, in the Words following:

And whereas it hath been represented unto me by the humble Petition of George Naylor, Esq; of His Majesty's College of Arms, Genealogist of the said Most Honorable Order, that no such Fees having yet been established, neither he the said Petitioner, nor his Predecessors, Genealogists of the said Most Honorable Order, have been enabled to ascertain the fair and just Reward to which they were or may be entitled for the Performance of their Duty, as set forth by the said Statutes; wherefore, and also for the Certainty and Security of all new

and lately-elected Companions, as also for those who shall hereafter be elected Companions of the said Most Honorable Order, and their Esquires Governors and Young Esquires, he the said Petitioner hath most humbly solicited my Aid in this Behalf, praying that I would be graciously pleased, by virtue of the special Power and Authority so given to me, in and by the Eighteenth Section of the said Statutes as aforesaid, to direct the Secretary of the said Most Honorable Order, by and with the Advice, and under the Direction of, the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Rochester, the Dean of the said Most Honorable Order, to prepare a Warrant for my Signature, setting forth the Fees and Dues to which the Genealogist of the said Most Honorable Order is rightly entitled, whereby the said Petitioner's Claim, and his Successors, Genealogists of the said Most Honorable Order, may hereafter be fully and clearly known and ascertained. And I, having well and duly weighed and considered the Justice and Equity of the said Petition, by virtue of the special Power and Authority so given to me, in and by the Eighteenth Section of the said Statutes, do by these Presents enact and ordain, that from henceforth it shall and may be lawful for the said Genealogist and his Successors, Genealogists of the said Most Honorable Order, to ask, demand, and take of the respective Persons now elected, and of such who shall hereafter be elected into this Order, and of their Esquires Governors, and of the Young Esquires, the following Fees and Charges as a Reward for his and their Trouble and Pains in examining and entering their respective Pedigrees, with their Armorial Ensigns, to wit, For the First Descent or Generation, the Sum of Six Shillings and Eight Pence; and for every additional Descent or Generation, the Sum of Five Shillings; and for entering the Armorial Ensigns of a Knight Companion, the Sum of One Pound Ten Shillings; and those of an Esquire, the Sum of Fifteen Shillings. And I will and direct that these Presents shall be deposited with and remain in the Custody of the Genealogist, for the Time being, of the said Most Honorable Order, to be by him carefully preserved in the Office of the said Genealogist, together with the Books and Muniments belonging to the said Most Honorable Order, which are, by virtue of his said Office, entrusted to the Care and Custody of the said Genealogist for the Time being.

Copy of a Letter from the Right Honorable Lord Keith, K. B. Admiral of the Blue, &c. to William Marsden, Esq; dated at Ramsgate, the 20th Instant.

SIR,

I HEREWITH transmit, for the Information of their Lordships, a Letter which I have this Day received from Commodore Sir Sidney Smith, acquainting me that the Enemy's Flotilla at Flushing had been pushed out from that Port on the 16th Instant to form a Junction with that at Ostend, and that the greatest Part of them had succeeded in reaching the latter Place, notwithstanding the vigorous Measures that were used by the Commodore and his Squadron to resist their Progress; a Circumstance which is to be imputed only to the numerous Disadvantages to which His Majesty's Ships were subjected in consequence of the Shallowness of the Water, and the Effect of the Enemy's Field-Artillery and their Batteries on the Shore; for the Commodore appears to have used every practicable Exertion to defeat the Design, and to have been very gallantly seconded by all the Officers serving under his Orders.

I also enclose a List of the Killed and Wounded on this Occasion; and have the Honor to be, &c.

*Antelope, at Anchor, off Ostend,
May 17. 1804.*

MY LORD,

INFORMATION from all Quarters, and the evident State of Readiness in which the Enemy's Armaments were in Helvoet, Flushing, and Ostend, indicating the Probability of a general Movement from those Ports, I reinforced Captain Manby, off Helvoet, with one Ship, and directed Captain Hancock, of the Cruiser, stationed in Shore, to combine his Operations and the Rattler's, with the Squadron of Gun-Boats stationed off Ostend.

The Antelope, Penelope, and Aimable, occupied a central Position in Sight both of Flushing and Ostend, in anxious Expectation of the Enemy's Appearance. Yesterday at Half past Five A. M. I received Information from Captain Hancock, then off Ostend, that the Enemy's Flotilla was hauling out of that Pier, and had already Twenty-one one-masted Vessels and one Schooner outside in the Roads; and at Half-past Seven the same Morning, I had the Satisfaction to see the Flushing Flotilla of Fifty-nine Sail, viz. Two Ship-rigged Praams,

Nineteen Schooners, and Thirty-eight Schuyts, steering along Shore from that Port towards Ostend, under Circumstances which allowed me to hope I should be able to bring them to Action. The Signal was made to the Cruiser and Rattler for an Enemy, in the E. S. E. to call their Attention from Ostend; the Squadron weighed the Moment the Flood made, and allowed of the heavier Ships following them over the Banks; the Signals to chase and to engage were obeyed with Alacrity, Spirit, and Judgment, by the active and experienced Officers your Lordship has done me the Honor to place under my Orders. Captains Hancock and Mason attacked this formidable Line with the greatest Gallantry and Address, attaching themselves particularly to the Two Praams, both of them of greater Force than themselves, independent of the Cross Fire from the Schooners and Schuyts; I sent the Aimable, by Signal, to support them. The Penelope, (having an able Pilot, Mr. Thornton,) on Signal being made to engage, Captain Broughton worked up to the Centre of the Enemy's Line, as near as the Shoal Water would allow, while the Antelope went round the Stroom Sand to cut the Van off from Ostend; unfortunately our Gun Boats were not in Sight, having, as I have understood, since devoted their Attention to preventing the Ostend Division from moving Westward.

The Enemy attempted to get back to Flushing, but, being harassed by the Cruiser and the Rattler, and the Wind coming more Easterly against them, they were obliged to run the Gauntlet to the Westward, keeping close to the Beach, under the Protection of the Batteries.

Having found a Passage for the Antelope within the Stroom Sand, she was enabled to bring her Broadside to bear on the headmost Schooners before they got the length of Ostend. The Leader struck immediately, and her Crew deserted her: She was however recovered by the followers; the Artillery from the Town and Camp, and the Rowing Gun-Boats from the Pier, kept up a constant and well-directed Fire for their Support; our Shot, however, which went over the Schooners, going on Shore among the Horse Artillery interrupted it in a Degree; still however it was from the Shore we received the greatest Annoyance; for the Schooners and Schuyts crowding along could not bring their Prow Guns to bear without altering their Course towards us, which they could not venture; and their Side Guns, though numerous and well served, were very light. In this Manner the Penelope and Antelope engaged every Part of their long Line from Four till Eight, while the Aimable, Cruiser, and Rattler continued to press their Rear. Since Two o'Clock the sternmost Praam struck her Colours and ran on shore; but the Artillery-Men from the Army got on board, and she renewed her Fire on the Aimable with the Precision of a Land Battery, from which that Ship suffered much: Captain Bolton speaks much in Praise of Lieutenant Mather, who is wounded.

Several of the Schooners and Schuyts immediately under the Fire of the Ships were driven on Shore in like Manner, and recovered by the Army. At Eight, the Tide falling, and leaving us in little more Water than we drew, we were reluctantly obliged to haul off into deeper Water to keep afloat, and the Enemy's Vessels that were not on Shore, or



too much shattered, were thus able to reach Ostend; these and the Ostend Division have hauled into the Bason. I have anchored in such a Position as to keep an Eye on them; and I shall endeavour to close with them again if they move into deeper Water. I have to regret that, from the Depth of the Water in which these Vessels move, Gun-Boats alone can act against them with Effect. Four have joined me, and I have sent them in to see what they can do with the Praam that is on Shore. I have great Satisfaction in bearing Testimony to your Lordship of the gallant and steady Conduct of the Captains, Commanders, Officers, Seamen, and Marines under my Orders. Captains Hancock and Mason bore the Brunt of the Attack, and continued it for Six Hours against a great Superiority of Fire, particularly from the Army on Shore, the Howitzer-Shells annoying them much. These Officers deserve the highest Praise I can give them. They speak of the Conduct of their Lieutenants, Officers, and Crews in Terms of warm Panegyric. Messrs. Budd and Dalyell from the Antelope acted in the Absence of Two Lieutenants of those Ships. Lieutenants Garrety and Patful, commanding the Favourite and Stag Cutters, did their best with their small Guns against greater Numbers of greater Calibre. Lieutenant Hillier, of the Antelope, gave me all the Assistance and Support on her Quarter-Deck his ill State of Health would permit. Lieutenant Stokes and Mr. Slesser, Acting Lieutenant, directed the Fire on the Lower and Main-Decks with Coolness and Precision. It would be the highest Injustice if I omitted to mention the intrepid Conduct of Mr. Lewis, the Master, Mr. Nunn and Mr. Webb, Pilots, to whose Steadiness, Skill, and Attention, particularly the former, I shall ever feel myself indebted, for having brought the Antelope into Action within the Sands, where, certainly, the Enemy could not expect to be met by a Ship of her Size; and for having allowed her to continue engaged with Commodore Verhuel to the last Minute it was possible to remain in such Shoal-Water, with a falling Tide. It is but Justice to say the Enemy's Commodore pursued a steady Course notwithstanding our Fire, and returned it with Spirit to the last.

I could not detach open Boats into the Enemy's Line to pick up those Vessels which had struck, and were deserted, mixed as they were with those still firing. Captain Hancock sent me One Schuyt that had hauled out of the Line and surrendered. She had a Lieutenant and Twenty-three Soldiers of the 48th Regiment, with Five Dutch Seamen on board. She is so useful here I cannot part with her yet. Enclosed is a List of our Loss, which, though great, is less than might have been expected, owing to the Enemy's directing their Fire at our Masts. The Rattler and the Cruizer have of course suffered most in the latter Respect, but are nearly ready for Service again. The Smoke would not allow us to see the Effect of our Shot on the Enemy; but their Loss, considering the Number of them under our Guns for so long, must be great in Proportion. We see the Mast-Heads above Water of Three of the Schooners and One of the Schuyts which were sunk. I have the Honor to be, &c.
