AT the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 6th of June 1804,

PRESENT

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-first Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwile, Gun-powder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire this Day: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwife, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and fuffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the "Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the "Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the "Exportation of Gunnaudes or now Sort of 46 the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of 47 Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Matter-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majelly a Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respec-W Fawkner. tirely appertain.

Copy of a Letter from the Honorable William Cornwallis, Admiral of the White, &c to William Marsden, Efq; dated off Ufbant, the 7th Inflant.

HAVE the Honor to enclose, for the Informa-mation of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copies of Two Letters to me from Captain Campbell, of the Doris, containing an Account of his having captured Two of the Enemy's Gun-Boats in the Bay of Hodierne.

His Majesty's Ship Doris, off Point du Raze, SIR, 10th March 1804. BEG Leave to inform you of my having taken and defrayed the Engage

and destroyed the French Gun-Boat No. 351. of the Second Class, carrying One Eighteen-Pounder and Thirty Men, being One of a small Convoy from Quimper to Brest, ultimately to Bonlogne, laden with Ammunition, Provisions, &c.: the rest escaped into Hodierne, owing to my having sprung the Main-topmast, and split the Sail, in Chase. His Majesty's Ship Doris, off Point du SIR, Raze, April 30, 1804.

HAVING observed, on the clearing up of a Fog, a Number of Gun Brigs, Boats, and Chasse Marees, anchored at the Entrance of Ho-dierne Harbour; I stood in at Night, and anchored as near as I could to protect the Boats which were dispatched under the Orders of Lieutevant Aderson, who succeeded in bringing out the Gun-Boat No. 360, of the Second Class, carrying One Eighteen-Pounder and Thirty Men, but owing to a rapid and heavy Surf which broke at the Harbour's Mouth, as well as their being protected by firong Batteries prevented his being more successful.
