The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the Forty-second Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to permit the Importation and Exportation of certain Goods and Commodities into and from the Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, and from thence until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Sixteenth of August One thousand eight hundred and two, to permit, and did thereby permit, during the Time limited by the said Act, the Importation into the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, one of the Virgin Islands, from Countries and Plantations in America and the West Indies belonging to, or under the Dominion of any Foreign European Sovereign or State, of all such Articles, Goods, and Commodities enumerated in certain Acts, passed in the Twenty-seventh, Thirty-second, and Thirty-third Years of His Majesty's Reign, as are permitted by the said Acts to be imported into the Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, one of the Bahama Islands; and also the Exportation thereof from the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola aforesaid, in the same Manner, and subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions, and to the same Penalties and Forfeitures for the Breach thereof, as are provided in the said Acts, or any of them, respecting such Importation into the said Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, and the Exportation from thence to this Kingdom, and subject also to the Conditions, Rules, and Regulations thereinafter mentioned; that is to say, That before any Sugar or Coffee, the Produce of Tortola and its Dependencies, shall be permitted or suffered to be shipped or laden on board any Ship or Vessel, each and every Package shall be stamped or marked by the proper Officer of the Customs in Roman Letters of

not less than Two Inches in Length, with the Words BRITISH P^r.

That all Sugar and Coffee not being the Produce of any of the British Plantations, Islands, or Territories, shall, upon Importation into Road-Harbour, be laid on Land and examined, and shall be deposited in safe and secure Warehouses, under the Joint Locks of His Majesty and the Owner or Proprietor of such Sugar and Coffee, and the same shall not be afterwards shipped or laden on board any Ship or Vessel, unless directly from such Warehouses, (upon due Entry thereof being first made,) under the Care and Inspection of the proper Officer of the Customs; and before any such Sugar or Coffee shall be permitted or suffered to be shipped or laden on board any Ship or Vessel, each and every Package shall be stamped or marked by the proper Officer of the Customs in Roman Letters of not less than Two Inches in Length, with the Word FOREIGN, and shall also be numbered progressively; and whereas the said above recited Act, passed in the Forty-second Year of His Majesty's Reign, has been by another Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit, and doth by this His Order in Council permit, until further Order, the Importation into the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, one of the Virgin Islands, from Countries and Plantations in America and the West Indies, belonging to or under the Dominion of any Foreign European Sovereign or State, of all such Articles, Goods, and Commodities as were by His Majesty's said Order in Council, bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of August One thousand eight hundred and two, permitted to be so imported into the said Port of Road-Harbour, and also the Exportation thereof from the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions, and to the same Penalties and Forfeitures for the Breach thereof, as were expressed and contained in His Majesty's said Order in Council bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of August One thousand eight hundred and two.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury

and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *W. Fawkner.*

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-first Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire this Day: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this Order, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council; upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *W. Fawkner.*

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-first of December last, to prohibit, until the Thirty-first Day of March then ensuing, the Exportation of the several Articles of Provision mentioned in the said Order: and also to permit, for and during the like Term, the Importation, Duty free, of the several Articles of Provision also specified in the said

Order, which expired on the Thirty-first of March last; And whereas it is judged expedient that the Permission to import certain Articles of Provision free of Duty should be revived, and be in Force for some Time longer, His Majesty, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue several Laws relating to the suspending the Operation of Two Acts of the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty for restraining the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange, under a limited Sum, in England; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and five; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace;" is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months from the Date of this Order, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. *W. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the Twenty-third Ultimo, to direct that all Ships or Vessels which should be bound to the Port of Greenock, or any Member or Creek thereof, or other Place therein, from any Place or Places from whence Quarantine is required to be performed, shall perform their Quarantine in Holy Loch, in the Firth of Clyde, in place of Lamash, in the Island of Arran; and that all Goods on board such Ships should be aired at the same Place; His Majesty is hereby pleased to order, that Holy Loch, in the Firth of Clyde, instead of Lamash, in the Island of Arran, shall also be the Place for the Performance of Quarantine by all

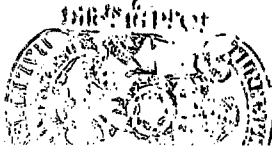
