WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties, as if imported in British or Irish Ships;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-third Day of April last, to permit, for the Space of Three Months from the Date of the said Order, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), on the Duties specified in the said Order; And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Twenty-third Day of this instant July, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides,

dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), in any Foreign Ship or Vessel; and that on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Vessel with any of the Articles above mentioned, the said Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the same Duties of Customs and Excise as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Vessel.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue several Laws relating to the suspending the Operation of Two Acts of the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for restraining the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange, under a limited Sum, in England; and the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation into, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and five; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Eighth of May last, to permit, for the Space of Three Months, from the Date of

the said Order, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions therein specified Duty free; And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Eighth Day of August next, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Lenses, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for the better Support of His Majesty's Household, and of the Honor and Dignity of the Crown of the United Kingdom; and for preventing Accumulation of Arrears in the Payments out of the Civil List Revenues.

An Act for granting to His Majesty a Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of Two Millions Five Hundred Thousand Pounds for the Use and Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to obviate certain Inconveniencies which have been experienced in the Accountant General's Office in the Court of Chancery, in the Execution of an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament,

for granting a Contribution on the Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices.

An Act for regulating the Appointment of Commissioners to act in the Execution of an Act of the last Session of Parliament, for granting to His Majesty a Contribution on the Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices.

An Act for confirming the Provisions of an Act, made in Ireland in the Thirty-second Year of His present Majesty, so far as the same prohibits the Import of Malt into Ireland; and for repealing the Power given to the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, by an Act of this present Session of Parliament, prohibiting the Use of Oats and Oatmeal in the Distillation of Spirits in Ireland.

An Act to continue until Seven Years after the passing thereof, and from thence to the End of the next Session of Parliament, an Act, made in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-seventh Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for the better Execution of the Law, and Preservation of the Peace, within Counties at large.

An Act to permit the Issue and Negotiation of certain Promissory Notes, under a limited Sum, by registered Bankers in Ireland, and to restrain the Issue and Negotiation of certain other Notes.

An Act for explaining and amending several Acts relating to Hackney Coaches employed as Stage Coaches, and for indemnifying the Owners of Hackney Coaches who have omitted to take out Licences pursuant to an Act made in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty.

An Act to render more easy the apprehending and bringing to Trial Offenders escaping from one Part of the United Kingdom to the other, and also from one County to another.

An Act to permit certain Persons in the Office of Ordnance, and the Quarter-Master General, to send and receive Letters free from the Duty of Postage; and to enable the Board of Ordnance, the Adjutant-General, the Quarter-Master-General, and the Barrack-Master-General, to authorise Persons in their Offices to send Letters free from the said Duty.

An Act for further continuing for Seven Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of His present Majesty, for encouraging the Manufacture of Leather, by lowering the Duty payable upon the Importation of Oak Bark when the Price of such Bark shall exceed a certain Rate.

An Act for reviving, amending, and further continuing several Laws relating to the more effectual Encouragement of the British Fisheries, until the Fifth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and six; and to the Encouragement of the Trade and Manufactures of the Isle of Man, to the improving the Revenue thereof, and the more effectual Prevention of Smuggling to and from the said Island, until the Fifth Day of July One thousand eight hundred and five.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the Thirtieth and Fortieth Years of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for settling Disputes that may arise between Masters and Workmen engaged in the Cotton Manufacture in that Part of Great Britain called England.

Nelson, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships
and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to William Marsden,
Esq; dated on board the Victory, at Sea, May 19,
1804.*

SIR,

I HEREWITH transmit you, for the Information
of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty,
Copy of a Letter from Captain Pettet, Comman-
der of His Majesty's Sloop Termagant, giving an
Account of the Boats of that Sloop having, on the
15th Instant, taken Possession of the French Chebeck
Privateer Felicité, off Port Favona in Corsica, which
it appears the Enemy had scuttled previous to their
leaving her, as she soon afterwards sunk.

I am very much pleased with Captain Pettet's
Exertions in having destroyed this Vessel, as she was
one of the finest Privateers in this Country, and had
captured two of our Merchantmen last Year, off
Tunis. I am, &c.

NELSON and BRONTE.

*Termagant, Port Farma Island, off
My Lord, Corsica, May 15, 1804.*

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint your Lordship,
that at Two P. M. I chased a strange Sail under
the Land, but before I could arrive up with her,
she got into the Port Farma, and anchored behind

a Reef of Rocks. I came to, with the Sloop, and
sent the Boats in, who brought her out; but from
the Enemy's having scuttled her, she went down
within half a Mile of the Shore in Fourteen Fa-
thoms Water; she proved to be the Felicité French
Chebeck, commanded by Captain Felix Podesta; be-
longing to Ajaccio, mounting Two long Guns in the
Bow, and Six Brass Swivels, besides small Arms, &c.
and I believe Sixty Men, as she appears to have rowed
Thirty Oars.

I am sorry to add, that One Man was wounded in
boarding. I cannot say too much in Praise of the
Crew and Officers upon the Occasion.
