the faid Order, the Importation of fundry Articles of Provisions therein fpecified Duty free; And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Eighth Day of August next, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, I ares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulie; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwise: Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheele, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapinca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Cultoms at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the faid above recited Act. - And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

An Act for the better Support of His Majesty's Househould, and of the Honor and Dignity of the Crown of the United Kingdom; and for preventing Accumulation of Arrears in the Payments out of the Civil List Revenues.

An Act for granting to His Majesty a Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of Two Millions, Five Hundred Thouland Pounds for the Use and Purposes therein men-

An Act to obviate certain Inconveniencies which have been experienced in the Accomptant General's Office in the Court of Chancery, in the Execution of an Act, made in the last Sellion of Parliament,

for granting a Contribution on the Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices.

An Act for regulating the Appointment of Commissioners to act in the Execution of an Act of the last Session of Parliament, for granting to His Ma-jelly a Contribution on the Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices.

An Act for confirming the Provisious of an Act, made in Ireland in the Thirty-fecond Year of His present Majesty, so far as the same prohibits the Import of Malt into Ireland; and for repealing the Power given to the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, by an Act of this present Session of Parliament, prohibiting the Use of Oats and Oatmeal in the Distillation of Spirits in Ireland.

An Act to continue until Seven Years after the passing thereof, and from thence to the End of the next Session of Parliament, an Act, made in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-feventh Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for the better Execution of the Law, and Preservation of the Peace, within Counties at large.

An Act to permit the Issue and Negotiation of certain Promissory Notes, under a limited Sum, by registered Bankers in Ireland, and to restrain the Issue and Negotiation of certain other Notes.

An Act for explaining and amending leveral Acts relating to Hackney Coaches employed as Stage Coaches, and for indemnifying the Owners of Hackney Coaches who have omitted to take out Licences pursuant to an Act made in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty.

An Act to render more easy the apprehending and bringing to Trial Offenders escaping from one Part of the United Kingdom to the other, and also

from one County to another.

An Act to permit certain Persons in the Office of Ordnance, and the Quarter-Master General, to send and receive Letters free from the Duty of Postage; and to enable the Board of Ordnance, the Adjutant-General, the Quarter Master General, and the Barrack-Master General, to authorise Persons in their Offices to fend Letters free from the faid Duty.

An Act for further continuing for Seven Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Selsion of Parliament, an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of His present Majesty, for encouraging the Manufacture of Leather, by lowering the Duty payable upon the Importation of O'k Bark when the Price of such Bark shall exceed a certain Rate.

An Act for reviving, amending, and further continuing several Laws relating to the more effectual Encouragement of the British Fisheries, until the Fifth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and fix; and to the Encouragement of the Trade and Manufactures of the Isle of Man; to the improving the Revenue thereof, and the more effectual Presention of Smuggling to and from the said Island, until the Fifth Day of July One thousand eight hundred and five.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for settling Disputes that may arile between Masters and Workmen engaged in the Cotton ManufaQure in that Part of Great Britain called England.

An Act for enabling the Sheriffs of the City of London to remove the Debtors and Prisoners in
