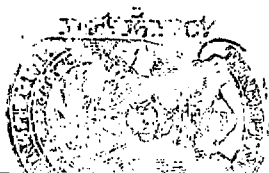

The Lord Chancellor has appointed Edward Edmonds, of Oswestry, in the County of Salop, Gent. to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.
