A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Fourth Day of October next, We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Fourth Day of October next, to Tuesday the Twenty-seventh Day of November next: And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of that Part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further, hereby, with the Advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That the said Parliament, shall, on the said Twenty-seventh Day of November next, be held, and sit for the Dispatch of divers urgent and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Twenty-seventh Day of November next.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS George Hay, Marquis of Tweeddale, was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-House, in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the

Fourteenth Day of November next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Room of the said George Hay, Marquis of Tweeddale, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent, (such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law,) and the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes, and immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And We strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns in Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least, before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election.

IN pursuance of the Standing Orders of the House of Commons, Notice is hereby given, that Application will be made in the next Session of Parliament, for Leave to bring in a Bill or Bills for continuing for Twenty-one Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, the Term, and altering, amending and enlarging the Powers of an Act passed in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled an Act for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from the Town of Cardiff, and several other Towns and Places in the County of Glamorgan; and for making, altering, and repairing, and widening certain other Roads within

"the said County;" and also to alter, amend, widen, and make several other Roads within the said County, as follows: that is to say, from Roath Church over Cardiff Heaths, through the several Parishes of Roath, Saint John the Baptist, in Cardiff and Landaff, in the said County, to the Second Mile Stone on the Turnpike Road leading from Cardiff to Merthyr Tydvil, in the said County; from Landaff Turnpike Gate, over Landaff Bridge and Landaff Lock Bridge, through the several Parishes of Landaff and Whitchurch, in the said County, to the Turnpike Road leading from Cardiff to Merthyr Tydvil aforesaid; from the Town of Caerphilly to Quaker's Yard Bridge, through the several Parishes of Eglwysilan and Lanvabon, in the said County; from the Town of Caerphilly aforesaid to a certain Bridge crossing the River Rumney, near a Place called the Drinan, in the Hamlet of Rhydgwern, in the said County, through the several Parishes of Eglwysilan and Rudry, and the said Hamlet of Rhydgwern, in the said County; from the present Turnpike Road, near the West End of Longland Farm-House, in the Parish of Evenny, to a certain Lane leading from Watertown Court-House to Bridgend, and thence to the Turnpike Road at Old Castle, near Bridgend aforesaid, through the several Parishes of Coychurch and Coyty, in the said County: from the Termination of the present Road leading from Bridgend aforesaid to Brincethin, through the several Parishes of Coychurch, Saint Brides Minor, and Landevoduck, in the said County, towards and unto a certain Mill, situate in the said Parish of Landevoduck, called Mellin Evandu, where the same Road branches off towards the Villages of Aberdare and Merthyr Tydvil, and the Town of Llantrissant, in the said County: from Aberavon Bridge to the first Hill on the North Side of the Town of Aberavon, through the Parish of Aberavon, in the said County, through the Lands of the Right Honorable George Venables Lord Vernon and Edward David, Yeoman, in the Tenure of Richard John, and through the Gardens of the said George Venables Lord Vernon and Catharine Rees, Spinster, in the Tenure of the said Richard John and William Jenkin, on the West Side of the House in the Tenure of the said Richard John: from or near the Fifth Mile Stone on the Turnpike Road leading from Swansea to Rossilly, over Fairwood Common, towards and unto the Opening of a certain Road by a late Smith's Shop, leading to Kilvrough, and from thence by Park Mill, towards and unto the said Turnpike Road leading from Swansea to Rossilly, at or near the Village of Reynoldstone, through the several Parishes of Bishopstone, Pennard, Ilstone, Penmain, Nicholaston, Penrice, and Reynoldstone; and from the Place where the present Highway, leading from the Parish Church of the said Parish of Nicholaston, towards the said Village of Reynoldstone, crosses the Highway leading from the Common of Cefn bryn towards the Village of Penrice, at or near Pennyhitch Smith Forge, to the said Village of Penrice; and from thence towards and unto the Village of Portyauon, through the several Parishes of Penrice, Oxwich, and Portynon, in the said County; from the Junction of a certain Road on the Burroughs adjoining the Gate entering into the Grounds of George Jones, Es.
