Turin, Nov. 30.

ON monday last the Cardinal *d'Estree*, who has been extremely well received at this Court, parted from hence for *Venice*. He will stop at *Plaisanza* to see the Duke of *Parma*, as likewise the Duke of *Modena* at *Bresello*, we are assured that he has likewise instructions to see the Duke of *Mantoua*, and the great Duke of *Tuscany*, and indeed all the Princes of *Italy*; though at the same time it is given out, that he has not any business with those Princes, but that he takes these journeys merely for his pleasure. The Marquis *de Dronero* our Duke's Ambassador to the Prince Regent of *Portugal* is not yet embarked, he still expecting at *Villa Franca* the French man of War that is to carry him thither.

Milan, Decemb. 4. The Count *de Melgar* our Governor is sending a Gentleman to compliment the Cardinal *d'Estree* upon his coming into *Italy*: and the Governor of *Catal* has orders to receive him, at his passing through that place with all possible honors. They write from *Spain*, that levies are making in most parts of that Kingdom; and that orders were given for the fitting out 32 men of War and 4 Frigates against Spring.

Venice, Decemb. 7. We are expecting here the Cardinal *d'Estree*: It is said, that he comes hither to offer this State the French Kings Mediation for the composing the differences that are still depending between them and the Pope. And that he has likewise Affairs to treat with the Duke of *Mantoua*, who they think has therefore so long deferred his return home. From *Rome* they write, that those who have with so much impatience expected a promotion of Cardinals, and had persuaded themselves it would be declared now at *Christmas*, begin to fear they shall be disappointed. The Letters we receive from *Turkey* give us an account, that the Grand Signior was gone from *Constantinople* to *Adrianople*, and intends to pass the Winter there, and that in the spring he would go into the Field, and march against the *Moscovites* at the head of his Army; but this latter part, its believed is given out to frighten, as they imagine, their Enemies into a Peace.

Stockholme, Decemb. 3. The preparations that are making here for the Queens publick Entry and Coronation are very great, which are to be on the 4th and 5th instant. The Dyet will then be separated, and the Nobility at leisure to attend the solemnity. In our last we told you that the reunion of the Crown Lands was concluded by the Dyet, which is true; however many are of opinion that the execution thereof will prove very difficult, for several of the Nobility have at present little besides

the Lands which were given them for their services in the Wars by the Kings Predecessors, and will be, when deprived of these in a very ill condition; and not only they, but indeed the whole body of the Nobility are more or less concerned in this matter, and therefore some think, that the King will content himself with a Summ of money to be given him by the Nobility in lieu of the said Lands; but these are but the thoughts of particular men, upon which no certain judgment can be made of the issue this Affair may yet have. Count *Oxenstern's* dispatches are preparing, and its believed he will be gone for *Germany* before *Christmas*.

Lintz, Decemb. 5. A new Envoy is coming hither from *France*, and its said part of his Commission is to assure the Emperor that the King his Master is resolved to maintain the Peace and friendship now established between them, which we should hear with much more satisfaction, if at the same time we could understand that the many complaints that have been made concerning the proceedings of the French Officers in *Alsace* and elsewhere, which we are told are directly contrary to the said Peace, were so far regarded at the French Court, as that the Princes of the Empire, who have been injured, were like to have redress upon them; but it is so far from that, that we hear every day of fresh complaints of the same kind made to the Dyet by the Princes on the *Rhine*. The Courier that brought the Articles made between General *Caprara* and the Malecontents for a Cessation of Arms, is sent back with the Emperors Ratifications; and with orders to the said General to put the Imperial Troops into quarters. The Duke of *Lorraine* is at *Pienn*, but returns from thence to *Insprucke*, so that we shall not see him here this winter.

Berlin, Decemb. 8. Much has been said of a design against the life of the Elector of *Saxony* and the manner of the discovering it, which was related with so many circumstances that every body almost gave credit to it; but we have reason to believe it a meer fiction for that none of the Letters which we have received from the Court of that Elector, since this report was first spread abroad, make any mention of it. The Princess of *Rudzewille*, with whom our Electors second Son is going to Marry, is an Heiress to a very great Estate, and a very fine young Lady.

Francfort, Decemb. 13. The Deputies of several Princes that are to meet here about regulating the Mint, have not yet been together, and indeed people are the less solicitous, concerning their meeting, for that they believe it will be as fruitless as several others that have been held for this purpose have been. The Duties which the French exact at *Germerheim* for all goods that pass by that place, gives the Merchants great disturbance; They are resolved to make their complaints to the Dyet, though it be without any great expectation of obtaining satisfaction upon them. The Levies that

are making for the Emperors service, advance very well.

Strasburg, Decemb. 13. Though the march of the French Troops, and the great preparations they make give us very just occasion to be alarmed thereat, yet there are some among us, who would make our fears seem groundless, by assuring us that the French King has not any design to employ his Arms against this City, and as all people are ready to believe what they desire, so should we perhaps be too forward to rest satisfied with those assurances, did not we receive advices from several parts, which bid us provide for our security and defence, though after all they may be deceived too; whether they are or not, a short time will now let us see.

Cologne, Decemb. 18. Our Magistrates are preparing a Letter in answer to that they received from the Emperor, concerning the proceedings that have been had here against some of the old Burgermasters; and at the same time they endeavor to prevent the coming hither of Count *Otiingen*, being desirous to determine this matter within themselves. There is not yet the least discourse of our Electors removing to *Bonne*, which many very much wonder at, neither is there any more talk of choosing a Coadjutor, which was so much spoken of this Summer; and its not improbable that among the other reasons that serve to dissuade our Elector from consenting to it, one is, that so great Interests are contending about it; the Prince of *Fuliers* pretensions being supported by the Emperor, and those of the Bishop of *Strasburg* by the French King, one of which must if the thing were brought to an issue, be disoblged.

Hamburg, Decemb. 13. It has been reported, and that very confidently, that the two Northern Crowns were Arming very considerably by Sea and Land, but upon enquiry, it appears a mistake. 'Tis true the King of *Sueden* seems resolved to keep a good Army constantly on foot, and to put his Navy into a posture fit for the service of the Kingdom, and the States now assembled at *Stockholme* have granted him supplies to enable him to doe it; but this gives not any jealousy to the King of *Danmark* to make him Arm extraordinarily as reports have said.

Hague, Decemb. 20. The States of *Holland* will break up to morrow, and Adjourn till the beginning of *February*. We are informed that they have this day agreed to the State of the War for the next Year, which is the same with that of this Year, the particular concerning Prince *Maurice*, who is dead, only excepted. The Deputies of the States General have been in conference with those sent hither by the Admiralties, concerning the Debt owing to them by the Crown of *Spain*. The Prince of *Hanouer* will embark in few days for *England*; greatest part of his Train and Equipage is gone thither directly by Sea from *Hamburg*.

Brussels, Decemb. 20. We are now expecting with some impatience, to see the orders which its said the last Courier brought from the Court at *Madrid*, concerning the General reform, though its probable they that are like to suffer by it, are not displeas'd with the delay. The Count d' *Archinto* will be here to morrow from *Antwerp*, and then we shall know the particulars of what he has done. We have Letters from *Lille* which say in general

that the French are making great preparations in all their Conquests.

Brussels, Decemb. 24. Sunday last being the Queen Mother of *Spains* Birth day, the Court observed it with a great deal of Ceremony; and the Prince of *Parma*, whose Age had left him some days before, came out of his chamber, and entertained the Nobility with a Banquet; but his Highness took cold, and the next day was taken with a violent fit of the Collique, and still continues very ill. The Count d' *Archinto* is not yet returned from *Antwerp*, and is not expected till the end of the week, or the beginning of the next; the 26th instant being the day on which the Council of the six and twenty are to give their answer concerning the subsidies that are demanded by his Highness; who has 'to gratifie them abated very considerably the Imposts upon *Wines* and other Merchandizes. Yesterday Don *Bernardo de Salinas* returned thither to be present at the said meeting, upon the success of which no less depends then the settlement of the subsistance for the Troops of that whole Province.

Falmouth, Decemb. 16. The 13th instant arrived here the *Dove* of *Topsham* from *Cadiz*; and the *Ann* of *Flushing* from *Lisbon*; The only news they bring is, that a Comet has been seen in *Spain* and *Portugal*. Several other Vessels are now in this Port which came home under the Convoy of Sir *John Berry* in the *Leopard*, though some others are not yet come up. The Comet or Blazing Star is now seen here, and at other places very plainly; It rises about 5 a clock in the Evening in the South and sets about 7 in the W. N. W. It is a small Star, and the Blaze or Stream that comes from it is reckoned to be above 43 degrees in length.

Plymouth, Decemb. 17. This day arrived here His Majesties Ship the *Forefight*, Captain *Kilbcrew* Commander, with several Merchants Ships under his Convoy from *Cadiz*, from whence they came 24 days after Sir *John Berry's* departure.
