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Turin, Nov. 30.

N monday last the Cardinal d' Estree, who has been extreamly well recoived at this Court, parted from hence for Venice. He will ftop at Plaifanza to fee the Duke of Parma, as likewife the Duke of Modena at Brefello, we are affured that he has likewife inftructions to fee the Duke of Mantoua, and the great Duke of Tuscany, and indeed all the Princes of Italy ; though at the fame time it is given out, that he has not any bufinefs with those Princes, but that he takes these journeys meerly for his pleasure. The Marquis de Dronero our Duke's Ambaffador to the Prince Regent of Portugal is not yet embarked, he ftill expecting at Villa Francha the French man of War that is to carry him thither.

Milan, Decemb. 4. The Count de Melgar our Governor is fending a Gentleman to compliment the Cardinal d' Effree upon his coming into Italy: and the Governor of Casal has orders to receive him, at his pailing through that place with all poffible honors. They write from Spain, that leavies are making in m ft pa s f tha Kingdom; and that orders wer g ven for the fitting out 32 men of War and 4 Ei. c hips againft Spring.

Venice, Der.mb. 7. We re expecting here the Cardina. d' Estree: It is faid, that he comes hither to offer the State the French Kings Mediation for the composing the differences that are fill depending between them and the Pope. And that he has likewife Affairs to treat with the Duke of Mantoua, who they think has therefore for long deferred his return home. From Rome they write, that those who have with fo much impatience expected a promotion of Cardinals, and had perfwaded themfelves it would be declared now at Christmass, begin to fear they shall be disappointed. The Letters we receive from Turkey give us an account, that the Grand Signior was gone from Gonstantinople to Adrianople, and intends to pais the Winter there, and that in the fpring he would goe into the Field, and march against the Moscovites at the head of his Army; but this latter part, its believed is given out to frighten, as they imagine, their Enemies into a Peace.

Stockbolme, Decemb. 1. The preparations that are making here for the Queens publick Entrys and Coronation are very great, which are for be on the 4th and 5 th inflant. The Dyet will then be forerated, and the Nobility at leafure to attend the folemnity. In our laft we told you that the reunion of the Crown Lands was concluded by the Dyet, which is trues however many are of opinion that the execution thereof will prove very difficult, for feveral of the Nobility have at prefent little befides

the Lands which were given them for their fervices in the Wars by the Kings Predeceffors, and will be, when deprived of thefe in a very ill condition ; and not only they, but indeed the whole body of the Nobility are more of lefs concerned in this matter, and therefore fome think, that the King will content himfelf with a Summ of money to be given him by the Nobility in lieu of the faid Lands; but thefe are but the thoughts of particular men, upon which no certain judgment can be made of the iffue this Affair may yet have. Count Oxenftern's diffpatches are preparing, and its believed he will be gone for Germany before Cbriftmafs.

Lintz, Decemb, 5. A new Envoy is coming hither from France, and its faid part of his Commiffion is to affure the Emperor that the King his Mafter is refolved to maintain the Peace and friendfhip now established between them, which we should hear with much more fatisfaction, if at the fame time we could understand that the many complaints that have been made concerning the proceedings of the. French Officers in Alface and elswhere, which we are told are directly contrary to the faid Peace, were fo far regarded at the French Court, as that the Princes of the Empire, who have been injured, were like to have redrefs upon them; but it is fo far from that, that we hear every day of fresh complaints of the fame kind made to the Dyet by the Princeson the Rhine. The Courier that brought the Articles made between General Caprara and the Malecontents for a Ceffation of Arms, is fent back with the Emperors Ratifications; and with orders to the faid General to put the Imperial Troops into quarters. The Duke of Lorraine is at Fiennd, but returns from thence to Infprucke fo that we fhall not fee him here this winter.

Berlin, Decemb. 8. Much has been faid of a defign against the life of the Elector of Saxony and the manner of the discovering it, which was related with io many circumstances that every body almost gave credit to it; but we have reason to believe it a meer fishion for that none of the Letters which we have received from the Court of that Elector, fince this report was first foread abroad, make any mention of it. The Princess of Radzer ville, with whom our Electors second Son is going to Marry, is an Heirels to a very great Estate, and a very fine young Lady.

Francfort, Decemb. 13. The Deputies of leveral Princes that are to meet here about regulating the Mint, have not yet been together, and indeed people are the lefs follicitous, concerning their meeting, for that they believe it will be as fruitlefs as feveral others that have been held for this purpole have been. The Duties which the French exact at Germerscheim for all goods that pafs by that place, gives the Merchants great diffurbance; They are refolved to make their complaints to the Dyet, though it be without any great expectation of obtaining fatisfaction upon them. The Leavies that are making for the Emperors fervice, advance very well.

Strasburg, Decemb. 13. Though the march of the French Troops, and the great preparations they make give us very just occasion to be allarmed therer, at, yet there are fome among us, who would make our fears feem groundlefs, by affuring us that the French King has not any defign to employ his Arms againft this City, and as all people are ready to believe what they defire, fo fkould we perhaps be too forward to reft fatisfyed with thole affurances, did not we receive advices from feveral parts, which bid us provide for our fecurity and defence, though after all they may be deceived too; whether they are or not, a fhort time will now let us fee.

Cologne, Decemb. 18. Our Magistrates are preparing a Letter in answer to that they received from the Emperor, concerning the proceedings that have been had here against fome of the old Burgermafters; and at the fame time they endeavor to prevent the coming hither of Count Ouingon, being d firous to determine this matter within themfelves. There is not yet the leaf difcourfe of our Electors removing to Bonne, which many very much wonder at, neither is there any more talk of o oofing a Coadjutor, which was to much spoken of this Summer; and its not improbable that among the other reasons that serve to diffuade our Elector from confenting to it, one is, that fo great Interefts are contending about it; the Prince of Juliers pretenfions being supported by the Emperor, and those of the Bilhop of Strasburg by the French King, one of which mult if the thing were brought to an isfue, be difobliged.

Hamburg, Decemb. 13. It has been reported, and that very confidently, that the two Northern Crowns were Arming very confiderably by Sea and Land, but upon enquiry, it appears a millake. Tis true the King of Sueden feems refolved to keep a good Army conflantly on foot, and to put his Navy into a poflure fit for the fervice of the Kingdom, and the States now allembled at *stockholme* have granted him fnpplies to enable him to doe it; but this gives not any jealoufie to the King of Danmarke to make him Arm extraordinarily as reports have faid.

have faid, Hague, Decemb. 20. The States of Holland will break up to morrow, and Adjourn till the beginnirg of February. We are informed that they have this day agreed to the State of the War for the next Year, which is the fame with that of this Year, the particular concerning Prince Maurice, who is dead, only excepted. The Deputies of the States General have been in conference with thole fent hither by the Admiralties, concerning the Debt owing to them by the Crown of Spaim. The Prince of Hanpuer will embark in few days for England; greateft part of his Train and Equipage is gone thither directly by Spa from Hamburg.

We are now expecting with Iome impatience, to fee the orders which its faid the laft Courier brought from the Court at Madrid, concerning the General reform, though its probable they that are like to fuffer by it, are not difpleafed with the delay. The Count d'Archineo will be here to morrow from Antwerp, and then we fhall know the particulars of what he has done. We have Letters from Lille which fay in general that the French are making great preparations in all their Conquefts.

Bruffells. Decemb. 24. Sunday last being the Queen Mother of Spains Birth day, the Court obferved it with a great deal of Ceremony; and the Prince of Parma, whole Ague had left him fome days before, came out of his chamber, and entertained the Nobility with a Banquet; but his Highness took cold, and the next day was taken with a violent fit of the Collique, and full continues ve-ry ill. The Count d' Archinto is not yet returned from Animerp, and is not expected till the end of the week, or the beginning of the next; the 26th inftant being the day on which the Councel of the fix and twenty are to give their answer concerning the fubfidies that are demanded by his Highness ; who has 'to gratific them abated very confiderably the Imposts upon Winds and other Merchandizes. Yesterday Don Bernardovde Salinas returned thither to be prefent at the faid meeting, upon the fuccels of which no less depends then the lettlement of the subsistance for the Troops of that whole Province.

Falmouth, Decemb. 16. The 13th inflant arrived here the Dove of Topfham from Cadiz; and the Ann of Fluffing from Lisbon; The only news they bring is, that a Comet has been feen in Spain and Portugal. Several other Veffels are now in this Port which came home under the Convoy of Sir John Berry in the Leopard, though fome others are not yet come up. The Comet or Blazing Star is now feen here, and at other places very plainly; It rifes about 5 a clock in the Evening in the South and fets about 7 in the W. N. W. It is a final Star, and the Blaze or Stream that comes from it is reckomed to be above 45 degrees in length.
