

“ from the Isle of Malta, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace;” His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-seventh Day of June last, to permit, for the Space of Three Months, from the Eighth Day of August last, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions therein specified Duty free; and whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Eighth Day of this instant November, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty’s Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

CEREMONIAL of the Knighthood and Investiture of the Honorable Sir George James Ludlow and of Sir John Moore, Major-Generals in the Army, Knights of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath.

The Knights and Officers of the Order, attending in their Mantles, Collars, &c. proceeded into the Sovereign’s Presence, making the usual Reverences, in the following Order:

Gentleman Usher of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain, and Badge, bearing the Red Rod. The Register and Secretary of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain, and Badge.

Deputy Bath King of Arms, in the Mantle, Chain, and Badge, and in his Hand, the Ribbon and Badge of the Order on a Crimson Velvet Cushion. The Genealogist of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain, and Badge.

Sir John Colpoys.

Sir James Henry Craig.

Right Honorable Sir Joseph Banks, Bart.

Lord Henley.

The Dean of Westminster, Dean of the Order, in his Mantle, Chain, and Badge.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York and Albany, First and Principal Companion.

Then, by the Sovereign’s Command, the Honorable Major-General Ludlow was introduced into the Presence between Sir David Dundas and Sir John Colpoys, the Two junior Knights Companions present, preceded by the Gentleman Usher of the Order, with the accustomed Reverences.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Lord Henley, the second Knight in Seniority present, and Major-General Ludlow, kneeling, was knighted therewith:—Then His Royal Highness the Duke of York, the senior Knight, presented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign; and His Majesty put them over the new Knight’s Right Shoulder, who, being thus invested, had the Honor to kiss His Majesty’s Hand.

Major-General Moore was afterwards introduced, knighted, and invested with the same Ceremonies; and he having likewise kissed His Majesty’s Hand, the Procession returned in the Order abovementioned.
