AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 14th of November 1804,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-ninth of July One thousand eight hundred, to direct, that all Ships and Vessels not having the Plague or other infectious Disorder or Distemper, which shall, by His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, have been declared to be of the Nature of the Plague, actually on board, coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean with clean Bills of Health; and all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, having on board Cotton-Wool, (except Ships and Vessels coming directly from the East Indies, or from the Continent of America, or the West Indies, loaded in Whole, or in Part, with that Commodity, being the Produce of those Parts,) or any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes enumerated in the First Class, stated in the said Order, being the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa, within the Straights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, should, together with their Cargoes, and all Persons on board thereof, perform such Quarantine, for such Time, in such Manner, and at such Places as were thereafter directed: And whereas His Majesty was further pleased, by the said Order in Council, to direct, That all such Ships and Vessels, (not having the Plague or other infectious Disease or Distemper which should have been declared as aforesaid, to be of the Nature of the Plague actually on board,) coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, as should not be furnished with clean Bills of Health, should perform Quarantine in Standgate Creek, and no where else; and in case any Ship or Vessel coming from any of the Places before described not being furnished with a clean Bill of Health, should come into any of the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, or to any of the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark; or Man, the principal Officers of the Customs at such Ports, or in such Islands, or the Governor or Chief Magistrate thereof should cause such Ship or Vessel to depart

from thence immediately, and proceed to Standgate Creek to perform Quarantine:

And whereas His Majesty has received Information, that an infectious Distemper has manifested itself at Malaga and other Ports of Spain, and in the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and has extended itself to the City of Cadiz, in the Kingdom of Spain:

And whereas by an Act passed in the Thirtieth and Fortieth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for erecting a Lazaret on Chetney Hill, in the County of Kent, and for reducing into One Act the Laws relating to Quarantine, and for making further Provisions therein;" it is amongst other Things enacted, That it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by His Royal Proclamation from Time to Time, to declare any infectious Distemper, the Communication whereof may be highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty's Subjects, to be of the Nature of the Plague; His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Powers, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to declare, and doth hereby declare, That the said infectious Distemper is of the Nature of the Plague, and doth adjudge it probable that such infectious Distemper may be brought to Great Britain and the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man from the Ports and Places hereinafter mentioned; and His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, judges it necessary to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth of July One thousand eight hundred, upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, be strictly enforced and extended as hereinafter directed, and that all Officers appointed for the Service of Quarantine do use their utmost Care and Diligence, and cause the several Rules and Regulations established by the said Order, and by this present Order, for the due Performance of Quarantine, to be punctually observed and carried into Execution; and His Majesty, with the Advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, require, and command, That all Ships and Vessels coming from the Port of Cadiz, or from any other Port of Spain, without the Straights of Gibraltar, lying to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent, and all

Persons, Goods, and Merchandize on board the same, do, and shall perform Quarantine for such Time, in such Manner, and at such Places as are directed by His Majesty's said Order in Council of the Twentieth July One thousand eight hundred; and that the Master and other Persons having Charge of all such Ships and Vessels do likewise strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations required by the said Order, and by this present Order, to be observed by Ships and Vessels liable to Quarantine:

And His Majesty, with the Advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, That no Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, or any small Packages brought as Baggage, Presents, or otherwise, or any Letters or Packets, or Parcels of Letters, or other Articles whatsoever, on board any Ship or Vessel, or Ships or Vessels, coming from any Place from whence His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, shall have judged it probable that the Plague, or other infectious Disease or Distemper declared to be of the Nature of the Plague, may be brought, shall come, or be brought on Shore, or go, or be put on board any other Ship or Vessel, in order to be landed or brought on Shore, in any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, although such Ships or Vessels so coming from such infected Place as aforesaid shall, at the Time of such landing or unshipping thereof, be at Sea, and shall not have arrived in any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, and although such Ships or Vessels may not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid:

And it is hereby further ordered, That if any Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, or any small Packages brought as Baggage, Presents, or otherwise, or any Letters or Packets, or Parcels of Letters, or other Articles whatsoever, on board any Ship or Vessel, Ships or Vessels, coming from any Place from whence His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, shall have judged it probable that the Plague, or other infectious Disease or Distemper declared to be of the Nature of the Plague, may be brought, shall go, or be put on board any other Ship or Vessel, in order to be landed or brought on Shore as aforesaid, all such Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, small Packages brought as Baggage, Presents, or otherwise, Letters, Packets, Parcels of Letters, and other Articles whatsoever, shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as if the Ships or Vessels, from which they were unshipped had previously arrived in some Port or Place in Great Britain:

And it is hereby further ordered, That if any Pilot or other Person shall go on board any such Ship or Vessel so coming from such infected Place as aforesaid, or any Ship or Vessel whatsoever, liable to Quarantine, either before or after her Arrival at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, and whether such Ship or Vessel was or was not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain or the Islands aforesaid, such Pilot or other Person shall perform Quarantine in like Manner as any Seaman, Passenger, or other Person coming in such Ship or Vessel would if the said Ship or Vessel had arrived at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, have been obliged to perform the same; and all Ships and Vessels

which shall receive any Persons, or any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, or other Articles whatever, from on board any such Ship or Vessel so coming from such infected Place, and being at Sea as aforesaid, before her Arrival at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, although such Ship or Vessel shall not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, shall, together with the Cargo and Persons on board thereof, perform the like Quarantine, and be subject to the like Regulations and Restrictions, as such Ship or Vessel from which such Persons, Goods, Wares, Merchandizes, or Articles shall have been received, would have been obliged to perform, or have been subject to, if she had arrived at any Port or Place in Great Britain:

And it is hereby further ordered, That all Ships and Vessels coming from any Place from whence His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, shall have judged it probable that the Plague, or other infectious Disease or Distemper declared to be of the Nature of the Plague, may be brought, and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes on board such Ships and Vessels respectively, which, with clean Bills of Health, shall come to, arrive, or touch at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, shall perform Quarantine in the same Manner, at the same Place, and under the same Regulations and Restrictions, as if such Ship or Vessel had been bound to such Port or Place:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General, and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Information has been received that an infectious Distemper prevails in the City of Charlestown, in the State of South Carolina: in the Town of Darien, in the State of Georgia; and at New Orleans, in the Territory of Louisiana: And whereas by an Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for erecting a Lazaret on Chetney-Hill, in the County of Kent, and for reducing into one Act the Laws relating to Quarantine, and for making further Provision therein;" it is, among other Things, enacted, That it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by His Royal Proclamation from Time to Time, to declare any infectious Distemper, the Communication whereof may be highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty's Subjects, to be of the Nature of the Plague, His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Powers, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to declare, and doth hereby declare, that the said infec-

tious Distemper is of the Nature of the Plague, and doth adjudge it probable that such infectious Distemper may be brought to Great Britain, and the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, from the Ports and Places hereinafter mentioned; and His Majesty doth therefore hereby order, that all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes now arrived, or which may hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of Great Britain, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from Charlestown, in the State of South Carolina; from the Town of Darien, in the State of Georgia; or from New Orleans, in the Territory of Louisiana; or from any Port within the said States of South Carolina and Georgia, or the Territory of Louisiana, and shall have cleared out from any of the said Ports or Places subsequent to the First Day of September last, (not having any Person or Persons on board the same ill of the said infectious Distemper,) do perform a Quarantine of Fifteen Days, at the several Places appointed, and according to the Rules prescribed, by His Majesty's Orders in Council of the Twenty-ninth of July One thousand eight hundred, and of this Date, for Performance of Quarantine by all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or from any Port or Place on the Coast of Spain, without the Streights of Gibraltar, to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent, and arriving with clean Bills of Health; but in case it shall appear upon the Arrival of any Ship or Vessel at any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Islands aforesaid, which shall have cleared out subsequent to the said First Day of September last from any of the Ports or Places before mentioned within the Territory of the United States of America; that any of the Crew or Passengers belonging to the same, are actually ill of such infectious Distemper, or any of the Crew or Passengers on board any such Ship or Vessel shall have died of the said infectious Distemper, or have been ill of the same, during the Course of the Voyage, the Clothes and all personal Effects, which are susceptible of Infection, worn by, or belonging to such Person, shall be forthwith burned, or sunk in deep Water; and the said Ship or Vessel, with the Whole of her Cargo, shall not be permitted to perform Quarantine at any Port or Place, except at Standgate Creek, and shall be compelled to depart from any other Port or Place, at which the same has arrived, or shall arrive as aforesaid, and shall repair to Standgate Creek, and there perform Quarantine, and not elsewhere; and be subject to all the Rules and Regulations to which Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from Cadiz, or other Ports of Spain, without the Streights of Gibraltar, to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent, and not furnished with clean Bills of Health, are subject:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General, and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors, or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

S I R,

I HEREWITH enclose, for the Information of
my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, my
Letter of this Day's Date, to Lord Keith, acquaint-
ing him with my having captured the French Brig
Privateer Le Contre Amiral Magon, commanded by
Captain Blackeman, from Dunkirk.

Cruizer, at Sea, off Yarmouth, Ten A. M.

MY LORD, *October 17, 1804.*

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint your Lordship,
that being last Night, at Nine P. M., with His
Majesty's Sloop under my Command, and the Gun-
Brigs Bold and Ann, and Florence Cutter, close in
with Ostend, in Five Fathoms' Water, which Sta-
tion I had taken from the Moment the Wind came
to the Eastward, to follow with every possible Ef-
ficacy and Energy your Lordship's Instructions in
the important Duty entrusted to me, of watching the
Enemy's Movements at that Port and Flushing, we
observed a strange Sail standing in Shore, which, on
discovering us, wore and made all Sail, steering at
first with the Wind abaft the Beam; we immedi-
ately made all Sail in Chafe, which continued during
the whole Night, in which the Stranger displayed
much Skill and Ability in all his Manœuvres, and
tried us on every Point of Sailing, with various Suc-
cess; he sometimes gaining on us, and we in our
Turn nearing him, till Five A. M. in which Time
(Eight Hours) we had run Ninety-seven Miles; by
the Log: During the latter Part of the Chafe the
Wind freshened considerably; but this gave us not
the Advantage I expected, as he preserved his Dis-
tance till a Quarter before Five A. M., when both
his Topmasts went away; he then attempted a
masterly Manœuvre to escape, which the Haze, the
Darkness of the Morning, and the Lee Tide, gave
him a fair Prospect of succeeding in, by clearing up
his remaining Sails, and coming instantly to an An-
chor, although in Twenty-five Fathoms Water, in
hopes we should either pass him unperceived, or get
to Leeward. Although I was not aware, to the
full Extent, of this Accident and Manœuvre, I
never lost Sight of him; and at the Time it hap-
pened I observed we were nearing him so very
fast, that I had begun to reduce the Sail; but,
as we were going then more than Eleven Knots,
I had but a few Minutes' Time before I was up
with him, and the Wind blowing so fresh as to
risk the Loss of all our Masts, if I attempted to
haul to Wind with the Sail I had then set, I was
under the Necessity of passing him, which I did,

however, within Hail, and to Windward, and not
receiving any Answer, except that he was from
Philadelphia, in bad English, I ordered Three Guns
to be fired into him. I then plainly discovered him
to be a large Armed Brig with Nine Ports on a
Side; having in a few Minutes taken Two Reefs
in the Topmasts, and cleared the Decks of wrecked
Spars and Split Sails; we tacked, and ranged up
within Ten Yards of his Lee-Quarter, he having cut
his Cable, and again attempted to make sail, when,
just as I was on the Point of hailing him, preparatory
to giving him our Broadside, he called out and
begged us not to fire, as he had struck.

On boarding him I was pleased to find my Opinion
confirmed that I had captured Captain Blauckman,
so well known during the late and present Wars in
these Seas, having received Information he was at
Sea in a Brig. The Vessel he commanded, proved
to be Le Contre Amiral Magon French Privateer
Brig, quite new, this being her first Cruise, pierced
for Eighteen, and mounting Seventeen Guns of dif-
ferent Calibres, viz. Fourteen long Six-Pounders,
Two Eighteen-Pound Carronades, and One long
Nine-Pounder, and manned with Eighty-four Men,
French, Danes, Swedes, and Americans; had been
out from Dunkirk Eighteen Days, and had cap-
tured, during his Cruise, the Ship Belisarius, of New-
castle, Matthew Hunter, Master, on the 3d Instant,
off Tynemouth, the Brig Scipio, Richard Robert-
son, Master, and the Content's Increase, George
Bell, Master, both laden with Coals, off Foley
Bridge on the 10th Instant; the Two former were
immediately dispatched for Dunkirk, but the latter
was recaptured about Two Hours after by an Eng-
lish Man of War Brig; she was proceeding for Dun-
kirk or Ostend, and had been laying-to for some
Hours in the Evening waiting for Water to cross the
Bank, and, I apprehend, little expected to find Eng-
lish Cruisers within the Stroom Sand. The Brigs
and Cutters in Company who have bore up with the
Cruizer in Chace were run out of Sight by Twelve
A. M.

I beg to recommend to your Lordship's Notice
Lieutenant J. Pearse, senior Lieutenant, Lieutenant
Lusk, Second, and Mr. Lash, Master, with the
whole of the Warrant and Petty Officers, Seamen,
and Mariners, through whose united Exertions this
active and enterprising Enemy has been prevented
making further Depredations, which, from his
local Knowledge of our Coasts, added to the ample
Means he possessed in this Brig, from her superior
Sailing and Force, must have been highly detri-
mental to the Trade of this Country; nor can I,
in Justice, omit availing myself of this Opportunity
to express to your Lordship my Thanks to Jo-
hannes Whymmer, Pilot of the Cruiser, who, on
this and all former Occasions, by his correct Know-
ledge of the Coast and Shoals, and Zeal for His
Majesty's Service, has afforded me the more essential
Confidence and Assistance.

I am happy to add that the Masters of the cap-
tured Vessels, as also their Crews, amounting to
Twenty English Seamen, were on board the Contre
Amiral Magon at the Time of Capture, and are
now on board the Cruiser.
