Stockholme, Decemb: 7.

The 30th past, the States, having finished the matter concerning the reunion of the Crown Lands, and given the King besides a very considerable supply of money were sent for into the Rycks Zaell, (where the King was seated on his Throne) and after the usual Formalities received their Dismission. The 4th instant, the Queen made her publick Entry into this City in this manner; First marched the Kings Guards of Horse and Foot, being 3500 Men, then the Court Marshalls with the Officers of the Household, then the Nobility being about 300. then the Velt Marshalls and the General Officers of the Army, all on Horseback, then followed 20 Coaches in which were the Senators, and in the middle of these was an Extraordinary rich Coach in which were their Majesties, the Kings Guard of Partisans, and a great number of Pages, and footmen attending it, and the whole was closed by two companies of Burghers, the rest making a lane in the Streets their Majesties past through. Being come to the Castle the great Guns were fired, and the Kings Guards and the Burghers gave several volleys, the night concluding with bonfires and other demonstrations of joy. There were several Triumphant Arches, and the Nobility and others appeared very rich in their Clothes and Equipages. The next Day the Queen was Crowned. The Street between the Castle and St. Nicolas Church was covered with red Cloath, about Noon their Majesties, attended with the Nobility, the Senators, and great Officers went thither; the King went first, being clothed like with a Crimson Mantle lined with Ermins, which was born up by 2 Gentlemen;

He had his Crown on his head, and over him was born a canopy by 4 Gentlemen of his Chamber. The Queen was likewise clothed in white, with a Crimson Mantle lined with Ermins, which was born up by 4 young Ladies under a canopy carried by 4 of the Nobility; being come into the Church the King and Queen went up to the Altar, and after the Service appointed for the Occasion, and the Sermon Breached by the Archbishop of Upshall was ended, the Queen kneeling before the Altar a Crown was set upon her head by the Archbishop, and the Scepter and Globes put into her hands; then followed a very fine Musick and the Ceremony being finished their Majesties returned in the same manner they came, to the Castle where they Dined, the great Guns being in the meantime several times discharged, Medalls thrown among the People, the Conduits running with Wine, &c.

Lentz, Decemb: 14. This morning the Emperess was happily brought to Bed of a Young Princeps. The Emperor is sending an Envoy to Poland to be present at the opening of the Dyets, which is appointed to meet at Warsaw about the middle of the next month. The Letters we receive from Constantinople give us an Account, that the Emperors Minister had had an Audience of the Grand Signior, and that all things had passed to his Satisfaction; That having been afterwards with the Grand Vizier, he had given the said Envoy great Assurances of the Grand Signiors resolution to maintain with all punctuality the Peace and ~~Friendship~~ that is now established between the two Empires.

Frankfort Decemb: 22. The Deputies
for the regulating the matter of the Mint
have had several meetings, and we are
impatiently expecting to see the Success
of them. From Spire, they write, that
the preparations which the French
are making in Alsace, begins to give
the Judges of the Imperial Chamber
apprehensions of their being not safe
there, and that therefore they have
thought of removing to some place of
greater security, having to that pur-
pose made their Application to the
Diet at Ratisbonne. The Elector
of Mentz continues at Aschaffenburg
where he receives the Visits of the Neigh-
boring Princes. On Thursday last the
Margrave of Baden arrived at Heidelberg.

Strasburg Decemb: 16. The French
notwithstanding the Season, continue
to work with great Diligence on the
new Fortifications they are making on
the Saar, as at Saarburg, Saar Louis,
and Longuy, as well as those places on
the Rhine. From Metz, they write, that
they were preparing there a Train of
Artillery of 24 Pieces of Canon, and
that several Troops are drawing together.
Upon the complaints that have been
made to the French Intendant at Bris-
sac, concerning the new Customhouses,
that have been set up in several pla-
ces, he has promised to take such care
therein, as that no Vexation shall be
given to the Merchants, who are concerned
in the Trade of the Rhine. The French
are buying up all the salt they can meet
with in Alsace, which they send to Metz,
but what their Design is in it we cannot
yet understand.

Cologne Decemb: 20. Since our
last Count Ottingen, who is of the Em-
perors Council, and the Duke of Juliers
Chief Minister, is come hither from
Dusseldorpe, to examine, pursuant to

Orders he has received from the Emperor,
the proceedings that have been had against
some of the old Burgermasters, Our Ma-
gistrates understanding of his Arrival
sent immediately to complement him,
and since some of them as well as of the
Commonalty have been with him, to ac-
quaint him that what they have done
did not proceed from any inclination to
disorders, but that they might have
a just account of the publick moneys,
and that they, through whose hands they
had passed for 10 Years, might give satis-
faction for the Sums they had made
Use of to their own particular profit,
and that therefore they doubted not
but the Emperor when he was fully
informed of the thing, would rather
commend them, disapprove their pro-
ceedings against these Offenders, of
which they had resolved to write at large
to His Imperial Majesty.

Hamburg, Decemb: 24. The Duke of
Croy, who has been several Years in the
Service of the King of Denmarke, is as
we are informed going to leave it and
to pass into that of the Elector of Saxony,
in whose Army, which is now raising he
is to have a principal command. The Elec-
tors of Saxony, who is the King of Den-
marke's Sister, is still at Copenhagen,
but according to our last Letters from
thence was preparing for her departure.

The Hague, Decemb: 24. The States of Hol-
land are separated but have only adjourn-
ed till the 8th of the next month, which
they have done upon the Instance of
the Deputies of Amsterdam, who are
very desirous to have some Affairs de-
termined that are now before them.
They have agreed to the State of the War
by which the same Number of Forces
are kept up this Year, that was the last.
The Prince of Hannover is received and
Entertained here with all imaginable

Honours and respects, his stay in this place will not be long, his Highness intending in few Days to Embark for England. The Letters we have from Germany say, that the Leavies which have as yet been made for the Emperor are not very considerable. *Brussels*, Decemb: 27. This place affords very little news at this time; but during this vacation of business, several great entertainments - have been made for the Prince of Hanover by the Heer Van der Lecke, the Heer Van Odyke and others; and this Evening the Prince and Princess of Orange the Princess of Simerin, the Prince of Hannover, &c. are at Mr Sidneys, where they Sup, and afterwards will be Entertained with a Ball. On Sunday last we saw here the Comet, that is a pale bright Stream, above 40 Degrees in length; but the Star it came from we could not see.

Brussels, Decemb: 27. The Prince of Parma is very ill again, and this Evening was let blood; The Count d'Archinto is not yet returned from Antwerp. The Marquis de Bourgomanero will certainly begin his Journey the next week for Germany.

Paris, Decemb: 25. The Dauphins recovery fills this Court with joy, which seems at present to think of nothing but Divertisements; among others a Ball is preparing, which will be very chargeable to those that are to have a part in it, for their Habits will be as rich as they can be made. The difference between the King and the Pope concerning the Regality, continues in the same State, without any great likelihood of a Composure. The Pope has lately sent Briefs to several Chapters and Religious Houses concerning the same, and they have been commanded by the King, as well as by an Arrest of Parliament, not to yield obedience to, or take any notice of them; Besides it is said that the Cardinal d'Estree is not

gone to Rome to settle this Affair, but that the Design of his Journey is to visit the Princes of Italy, and to negotiate some matters of importance with them. *Falmouth*, Decemb: 20. The 17th Instant came in here the Castle Frigate of London, Lerrivall Granger Master, from Alicanto she went thither from Newfoundland, and having sold her Fish Laden Fruit; The Bilboa merchant of Topsham, Samuel Clarke from Oporto, with four Vessels more from the same Port, they say Corn & Provisions are somewhat scarce there. The 18th came in the Friendship of London, William King from the Canaries, she came from thence about Six weeks since, and reports they have had a very good Vintage this Year, and very good Wine; she left the Fleet and Convoy behind her. The same Day came into this Port the Unity of London Barth: Ketcher, from Zant, The Balestine of London, James Salmon from Scandestone, and the Phoenix of London W^m Cutler from Cadix. The 19th the Lusitania of London, Rich: Warner bound home from Zant; These four last came from Cadix without Convoy, which they would not stay for; They saw two Algerine Men of War, but being Ships of good force, and resolved to stand by one another, those Pyrates did not think fit to Venture upon them.

Plimouth, Decemb: 21. On Fryday last put into this Port, The Foresight, Captain Hilligrew Commander, where she is still kept for want of allins; as is likewise the Garland, Captain Hodder, who is going to Bortsmouth to new mast.

Deal, Decemb: 23. This Day arrived in the Downs, His Majesties Ship the Leopard, S^r John Berry Commander; His Grace the Duke of Grafton who has been the Voyage came ashore, and is gone for London; We hear that Captⁿ Hilligrew in the Foresight, is in y^e Channell.

Ten, or twelve Merchant Ships, who came home under S^r. John Berry's Con- voy, are past through the Downs for the River.

Whitehal, Decemb: 26. Yesterday arrived here, Captain Clarke from San- gier, from whence he came by Sea, and had a very Quick passage. He gives an Account that Colonel Sackville who commands there in Chief had made a Truce with the Moors for Six Months, and that an Ambassador was coming to his Majesty from the Emperor of Morocco to conclude a Peace.

The Prince of Hannover arrived here this afternoon.
