TITE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are cengaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by :Sea and Land, have refolved, and do, by and with "the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a public Day of Fassing and Humiliation be observed throughout those Parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Wednef-. day the Twentieth Day of February next ensuing, sthat so both We and Our People may humble Ourrselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and in the most devout and stolemn Manner fend up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those : heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations shave most justly deserved; and for imploring His Bleffing and Affistance on Our Arms for the Kesto. tration of Peace, and Prosperity to Us and Our Doaminions: And We do strictly charge and command, that the faid Public Fast be reverently and devoutly -observed by all Oursloving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justly rinflict on all such as coutemn and neglect the Persformance of fo religious and necessary a Duty: And, for the better and more orderly folemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Public Worship, and to take Care that the same

be timely dispersed throughout their respective. Dioceses.

KE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms, both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, That a public Day of Fasting and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Thursday the Twenty first Day of February next ensuing, that so both We and Our People may humble Ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and, in the most devout and solemn Manner, fend up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved; and for imploring His Bleffing and Asfistance on Our Arms, for the Restoration of Peace, and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, That the faid public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as

contemn and neglect the Performance of fo religious and necessary a Duty: Our Will is, therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation feen, ye forthwith proceed to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be fent to the Sheriffs of the feveral Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to fee the same published; and We do appoint them to fend Copies hereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, and that, upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the fame may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

TIS MAJESTY doth hereby direct and require, that all the Private Men on the Out-Pension of Chelsea-Hospital, residing in South Britain, exclusive of Wales, whether discharged from the Regular Cavalry, Foot Guards, or Infantry of the Line, or from the Militia or Fencibles, (those relident in London, or within Twenty-five Miles thereof, who are to attend at Chelfea on fuch Days as the Commissioners of the said Hospital shall appoint, the Out-Pensioners from the late Horse Guards and Horse Grenadier Guards, the Life Guards, and Royal Regiment of Horse Guards; such Men as, by the Hospital Books, are now more than Fifty-five Years of Age, or had ferved Twenty-five Years in the Army previously to their Discharges; those who have loft a Limb, or their Eyefight, or are Cripples, or who received a Certificate of their total Unfitness for further Service from any of the Officers employed at the General Examination of Out Penfioners in the Month of December 1802, excepted,) do personally appear at the Places and on the Days hereinaster mentioned, in order that such of them as, on Examination, shall be found fit, may be appointed to a ROYAL VETERAN BATTALION:

His Majefly is graciously pleased to declare, that all the said Private Men shall be considered as entitled to the Pension for the Six Months commencing from Christmas next, notwithstanding those found sit for Service will commence Pay from the respective Days of their Appearance, in pursuance of this Order.

His Majesty is further pleased to declare, that every Man found fit for Duty shall be entitled, on his joining the Corps to which he shall be appointed, to receive a Bounty of One Pound Five Shillings, or so much thereof as shall remain after supplying him with proper Necessaries; and those who, on Examination, are found unfit for any Duty, shall be disfinissed, with proportionate Subsistence to carry them back to their Homes: And it is also His Majesty's gracious Intention, that every Out Peusioner received, in Conformity to this Order, into a VETERAN BATTALION, shall be entitled, when discharged therefrom, to the increased Allowance of Nine Pence per Diem, provided they are recommended by their Colonels or Commanding Officers as Objects deserving of His Majesty's Royal Bounty.

And it is hereby notified, that all the Private Men on the Out-Pension of Chelsea-Hospital, residing in South Britain, exclusive of Wales, dis-

charged as aforefaid, (except as above excepted,) who shall not appear at the Times and Places herein appointed, will be considered by Government as otherwise provided for, or as dead, and they will accordingly be struck off the Books of the Out Penfion of the faid Hospital, without any Prospect of being restored thereto.
