By THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS Ma-JESTY'S TREASURY.

Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for making Wet Docks, Basons, "Cuts, and other Works for the greater Accommodation and Security of Shipping, Commerce, and Revenue, within the Port of London:" It is enacted, That from and after Notice of the

Completion of the faid Docks should be given by public Advertisement in the London Gazette; and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London, there should be payable and paid to the faid Company, or to their Collectors or Deputies for their Use for every Ship or Vessel entering into the said Docks, the several Rates or Duties therein mentioned : And whereas by another Act passed in the Forty-third Year of His said present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great " Britain, to be secured in Warehouse without payment of Duty:" It is enacted, That it should be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Configuee or Configuees of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes enumerated or deferibed in the Table thereunto annexed; marked (B), and which fould be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the Joint, Locks of the Crown and the London Dock Company, in any Warehouse or Warehouses erected or to be erected, fituated within the Premiles belonging to the London Dock Company, without Payment at the Timeof the first Entry of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, of the Duties of Customs or Excile due on the Importation thereof, subject neverthless to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions therein contained; provided that no fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandize should be so lodged, or secured, unless and until fuch Warehouses and other Works belonging, or to belong thereto, should be so far com-pleated that, in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same should be fit and proper, in every Respect, for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and wherein the same might respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions in the faid Act contained; and the faid Lord High Trea-furer, or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered; by Writing under his or their Hand, or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of fuch Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times, at least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London. And whereas the Table marked B, above referred to, is in the Words following; viz. Table (B)
