Westminster, January 15, 1805.

HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers: The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

SINCE the End of the last Session, the Preparations of the Enemy for the Invasion of this Kingdom have been continued with incessant Activity; but no Attempt has been made to carry their repeated Menaces into Effect.

The Skill and Intrepidity of My Navy, the respectable and formidable State of My Army and Militia, the unabated Zeal and improved Discipline of a numerous Volunteer Force, and the general Ardor manifested by all Classes of My Subjects, have, indeed, been fufficient to deter them from so presumptuous and desperate an, Enterprize. While this Spirit continues to animate the Country, and its voluntary Exertions for its own Defence subfift in their full Vigour, We need not fear the Confequences of the most powerful Efforts on the Part of the Enemy: But let us never forget that our Security has arisen from the Resolution with which we have met and provided against the Danger, and that it can be preserved only by steady Perseverance and unremitting Activity.

The Conduct of the Court of Spain, evidently under the predominant Influence and Controul of France, compelled Me to take prompt and decifive Measures to guard against the Essects of Hostility. I have, at the same Time, endeavoured, as long as it was possible, to prevent the Necessity of a Rupture; but, in consequence of the Refusal of a satisfactory has fince been declared by Spain against this Country.

I have directed a Copy of the Manifesto, which I have caused to be prepared on this Occasion, to be laid before you, together with fuch Papers as are necessary to explain the Discussions which have . taken place between Me and the Court of Madrid. You will, I trust, be convinced by them, that My Forbearance has been carried to the utmost Extent which the Interests of My Dominions would admit; and, while I lament the Situation of Spain, involved in Hossilities contrary to its true Interests, I rely with Confidence on your vigorous Support in a Contest which can be attributed only to the unfortunate Prevalence of French Counsels.

The general Conduct of the French Government on the Continent of Europe, has been marked by the utmost Violence and Outrage, and has shewn a wanton Defiance of the Rights of Neutral Territories, of the acknowledged Privileges of accredited Ministers, and of the established Principles of the Law of Nations.

Notwithstanding these Transactions, so repugnant to every Sentiment of Moderation and Justice, I have recently received a Communication from the French Government, containing Professions of a pacific Disposition. I have, in consequence, expressed My earnest Defire to embrace the first Opportunity of restoring the Blessings of Peace on such Grounds as may be confistent with the permanent Safety and Interests of My Dominions; but I am confident you will agree with Me, that those Objects are closely connected with the general Security of Europe; I. have, therefore, not thought it right to enter into any more particular Explanation without previous Communication with those Powers on the Continent, with whom I am engaged in confidential Intercourse and Connection, with a View to that important Object, and especially with the Emperor of Russia, who has given the strongest Proofs of the wife and dig-Explanation, My Minister quitted Madrid, and War I nified Sentiments by which he is animated, and of

the warm Interest he takes in the Safety and Inde- , jects, and People; His Majesty, therefore, being pendence of Europe.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons,

I have directed the Estimates for the public Service to be laid before you. I regret the Necessity of any additional Burdens being imposed on My People; but I am sure you will be sensible how much their future Safetyand Happiness depend on the Vigour of our Exertions, and that in the Mode of raifing the Supplies you will continue to shew your Auxiety for the Support of public Credit, and for restraining as much as possible the Accumulation of the National Debt.

My Lords, and Gentlemen;

In confidering the great Efforts and Sacrifices which the Nature of the Contest requires, it is a peculiar Satisfaction to Me to observe the many Proofs of the internal Wealth and Prosperity of the Country, It will, I am fure, be your great Object to maintain and improve these Advantages, and at the same Time to take all such Measures, as by enabling Me to profecute the War with Vigour, may afford the best Prospect of bringing it to a fafe and honourable Termination.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS His Majesty has received Infor-VV mation that the King of Spain has iffined a Declaration of War against His Majesty, His Sub-

determined to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honor of His Crown, and for the vigorous Profecution of the War in which He finds himself engaged, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the King of Spain, so that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vesfels that shall be commissionated, by Letters of Marque, or General Reprifals, or otherwife, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully feize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the King of Spain, or his Subjects, or others inhabiting within the Territories of the King of Spain, and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions; and, to that End, His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Com-mission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authoriting the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to iffue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprifals to any of His Majetty's Subjects, or others whom the faid Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, feizing, and taking the Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to Spain, and the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or any inhabiting within His Countries, Territories, or Dominions; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission, as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authoriting the faid Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the faid Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominious, to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Scizures, Prizes, and Reprifals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the fame; and, according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemir all fuch Ships, Veffels, and Goods as shall belong to Spain, or the Vaffals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or to any others inhabiting within any of his Countries, Territories, and Dominions; and that fuch Powers and Claufes be inferred in the faid Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewife to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board a Draft of fuch Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Draft of Influctions for fuch Ships as shall be commissionated for the Pur-Eldon, C. poses afore mentioned. PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majelly in Council. THEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty feventh Day of June last, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cardage, Malts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of January next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majeky's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Mouths, from the faid Eleventh Day of January next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar Iron, Hamp, Pitch, Tar, Rosia, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet Copper, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Auchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Okum, Oker, Sheet Copper, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act to enable His Majelly to religain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and so more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when pro-"hibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:" But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be con-Atrued to extend, to any of His Majelty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Isavy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necesfary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majelly's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to New-

foundland, on to His Majeffy's Forte and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the Print h Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided, that upon the Exportation of any of the field Articles for the Purposes of Trade to Indiana, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Ma-jesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered Outwards, and for the Purpofes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were en-tered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury. the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to gent ceffary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

LONDON DOCKS. By the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

Hereas by an Act passed in the Fortieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for making Wet Docks, Basons, "Cuts, and other Works for the greater Accom-"modation and Security of Shipping, Commerce, and Revenue, within the Port of London:"
It is enacted, That from and after Notice of the Completion of the faid Docks should be given by public Advertisement in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London, there should be payable and paid to the faid Company, or to their Collectors or Deputies for their Use for every Ship or Vessel entering into the said Docks, the several Rates or Duties therein mentioned: And whereas by another Act passed in the Forty-third Year of His said present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for " permitting certain Goods imported into Great
" Britain, to be secured in Warehouse without pay" ment of Duty:" It is enacted, That it should be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Confignee or Confignees of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (B), and which should be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the Joint Locks of the Crown and the London Dock Company, in any Warehouse or Warehouses erected or to be erected, situated within the Premises belonging to the Los

don Dock Company, without Payment at the Time of the first. Entry of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, of the Duties of Customs or Excise due on the Importation thereof, subject neverthless to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions therein contained; provided that no fuch Goods, Wares, or Merchandize should be so lodged, or secured, unless and until fuch Warehouses and other Works belonging, or to belong thereto, should be so far compleated that, in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same should be fit and proper, in every Respect, for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and wherein the same might refpectively be fafely and tecurely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions in the faid Act contained; and the faid Lord High Trea-furer, or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand, or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of fuch Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times, at least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London. And whereas the Table marked B, above ref rred to, is in the Words following ; viz. Table (B)

A Lift of Articles which (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or not being imported from the West Indies) may be secured in Warehouses within the Premises belonging to the London Dock Company, without the Duties due on the Im-
