Rivers; fo that though we do not hear our EleEtor has any defign of offending ochers, yet will be in a conditon not to te liable to be offended himelf. It is faid here, that l'rince EDuis was contracted to the Princefs Radzeville in Prufla on the fecond inftant, and that the Marriage may Toonfollow, bue the time is nut yet certain. The Plague at Leipficke and Drefden, decrealcs very confiderably; and 4 is hoped, that this winter, which is like te prote a very bard one, will frece thofe places from the Infection. Lieutenant Gen ral Spaen parted bence fome days fince for the Country of Cleves; and the reafon of his having ftaid fo long here, was, the Duke of Zells refufing him a pafs to go through his Countreys; fo that he was forced to-go through Maegdeburg, where there is yet fome fmall appearance of the Flague. Here is much difcourle of the Comet which have been lately [cen; and this Evening we have had much lightening here.
strabburg, Deçmb. 22. There is at prefent little to write from hence, unlefs we repeat what we have fo often told you, concerning the great preparations that are making, and the apprehenons we have here of them. Our laft Letters from, Ratisbonge gige us an account, That it had been propofed gt the Dyet, that the Imperial Chamber ought to be removed from Spire, to fome place of greater fecurity; and that the Deputies feemed all of an opinion, that it was a thing very. neceflary, though they had not yet taken any formal refolution ins it.

Hambarg, Decemb, 23. The Magiftrates of Leip/fcke have aoquainted the Neigbboring Towns, that then Plague is wholly ceafed in their City, and defire they will tepew their Trade with them. We haye nothirg new flom $S$ weden or Denpark, thofe Not thern Crowns have a very good correfpondence; and the reports that were fpread abroad, as if the King of Demmark, had a jialoufre of the preparations that were making by the King of Sweten to put his Army, and his Navy into a polture, do now fufficiently appear to be groundlefs. There is now much difcouric again of the Jikelyhood there is, that the Crown of poland will enter into a War againft the Turks, we fhall know wh-n the Dyet meets, what that kingdotn will do.

Cologne, Decemb. 27 On Fridaty latt arrived here the Baron de Leyen, Ervoy of the Elector of Mentz, who has had Audience of our Elector. From Strissburg th ywrite, that they very much fear a now Whar in tite Spri: g, and that vaft Magazines are providiag by the french at Schlcftade and other places. And that the Baron de aMonclar, the French Kings Lieutenant General in Alface, had commanded all the principal Officers to repair to Brifac, ${ }^{*}$ to acquaint them with fome defign they were to be employed in. And from Francfort they write ${ }_{2}$ that the Bilhop af Wurtsbirg apprehending the French may bave a defiga upon Pbillipsbu'g, which cover his Territories, had lent thither 400 Dragoous, and 400 Foots ta reinforce the Garrifon.

Eruffels, Decemb. 31. His Highnefs is now prets t-y well recovered, but dill kecps his bed; However this night he is to give Audience to Mon*
fieur de Corfell, Intendent of Tonimay;, who arrived here yellerday in quality of Envoy from the French King: what his errand is, we as yet know not, though it's feared it may be fome new demand. The Count $d^{\prime}$ Archinto is Itill at Antroerp, But we expect him back in two or three days; for this is the day appoinced by that people to give their final anfwer in the matter of the fubfidies. The States of Brabans proceed in adjufling their proportion of the aydes; yee we mult expect the refolution of thole of Antwerp, before theirs can be made effectual. The Nations of this City are again Alfembled, in Order to the renewing of the Impolts; bat before they will confent to it, defire his Highnefs to promife them that none be exempted from the faid Impofts, either Forreigners or others. In the mean time the Troops of this Province, and fome of the Generals, have received à Months pay, and it's believed the general Reform will foon follow. Mr. Legg haring had his Audience of Leave of his Highnetis, parted hence yefterday for Germany. The Marquis de Burgamenero is atill here.

Parí, $\mathfrak{F} a n$. 1. We are told that the King is going to augment his Troops, and that Commifions are preparing for the Raifing 20000 Men. The King has given the Governmant of Thionville, vacanr by the death of the Marefchal de Grarcey, to the Sieur de Cafaux. The Spanilh Ambaffador has complained of an Hoftility committed by fome French Troops in Luxemburg, who attacked a CaAle belonging to the Prince of Chemay, though they did not take it, Come Spanilh Troops being privately gotten into the Place before; but feveral Soldiers were killed on both fides. People here begin to talk of an approaching War, which, by the prepatrations that are making, and the Orders that are given to raife Men, and buy Horfes, leem to give therr forme ground for.

Pendemis, Decemb. 26. On Monday lalt, the wind being at Wçt North Welt, the Leopard Frigat, together with feveral Merchaut men, Sayled to their feveral Ports. Since came into this Harbour the Olive-Brauch of Topham, 150 Tuns, 14 Guns, and 25 men, Jobn Tringmore Malter, with Fruits from Malago, bound home, alfo the Pbenix of Topflam; Tbomas Lavell, with Salt for a Marker.

Faimouth, Decemb. 27. The Olive-Branch of TopJham together with is Merchant Ships more, under the Convoy of the Smpeep/takes and Mermaid $^{\text {and }}$ Frigats, arrived bere the 23 d inltant from the Streigbts; they tell us, that about a fortniglit fince they met with the Englith Fleet of Merchant men, beond for the Streighes, off of the Southern Cape, atd that they fuppoled the reil of the Flect that came int company with them, are going up the Cbaunel
