

of Infection, and for purifying any Ship or House, or any Place in which any contagious Disorder may have manifested itself, and to communicate the same to all Magistrates, Medical Persons, and others of Our loving Subjects, who may be desirous, and may apply to be made acquainted therewith; and We most strictly enjoin and command all Magistrates and Persons in Authority, all Medical Persons, and others Our loving Subjects, especially those within the Maritime Counties, to give immediate Notice to Us, through Our Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, or Our Privy Council, in case any Person or Persons should be attacked with any Fever, attended with new and uncommon Symptoms, such as to afford Ground for Apprehension that such Fever is of the same Nature as the Disorder prevailing in several Parts of Spain, and in Gibraltar, in order that the most immediate and effectual Measures may be taken, as well for affording due and necessary Assistance and Relief to those afflicted with the same, as for preventing the Contagion from spreading amongst Our loving Subjects.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Seventh of March One thousand eight hundred and three, We were pleased, amongst other Things, to promise and declare that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board Our Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our Service by any of Our Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the Thirteenth Day of April then next: And whereas the Time limited for the Payment of the said Reward has been, by several Orders in Council, prolonged to the Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive: And whereas We have, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, thought it expedient and necessary for the public Service that the said Reward should be increased, We do hereby promise and declare, by and with the Advice of Our said Council, that a Reward of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Fifty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board Our Ships, shall be paid to any Person who shall discover any such Seaman or Seamen respectively, who may conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen shall be taken for Our said Service by any of Our Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive; the said Rewards to be paid for any such Seaman or Seamen respectively, so discovered and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, and at the Out-Ports, by the Naval Officers (where there are any); and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collectors of Our Customs, imme-

diately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors respectively, by the Person who may make Discovery of any Seaman or Seamen as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Number and Quality of Seamen procured in Consequence of his Discovery; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take such Seaman or Seamen for Our Service.

Given at Our Court, at the Queen's Palace, this Sixth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and five, and in the Forty-fifth Year of Our Reign.

AT the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 14th of January 1805,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties, as if imported in British or Irish Ships;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twentieth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and four, to permit, for the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Twenty-third Day of October last, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), on the Duties specified in the said Order: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Twenty-third Day of this Instant, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), in any Foreign Ship or Vessel; and that on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Vessel with any of the Articles above mentioned, the said Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the same Duties of Customs and Excise as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Vessel.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
