Juch Importation, have cleared out from fome Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majefty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ircland, or any other Person or Perfons who may be duly authorifed in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form thereinafter-mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which fuch Licence is refpeotively granted, and no longer; provided that no Juch Licence as aforefaid, granted after the Thir-Aieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majelty is hereby further pleafed to order, that the Matter or Perfon having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Veffel to whom fuch Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Veffel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where the fhall difcharge fuch Bread, Flour, Reafe, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, deliver up the faid. Licence to the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Cultoms there; having first inderfed on the Back of fuch Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents, of each Package of Bread, Flour, Peafe, Indian Corn, Butter, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned ; and the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Cuftoms at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Mafter or Perfon having the Charge or Command of fuch Ship or Veffel, of his having received the faid Licence, fo endorfed as before-directed, and to transmit the fame to the Commissioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms in England or Scotland, or to the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Revenue in Ireland refpectively, by whom fuch Licence was granted.

A PROCLAMATION. GEORGE R.

W HEREAS alarming Accounts have been received that the Infectious Difease (which, with a Malignancy equalling if not exceeding that of the Plague, has occasioned a dreadful Mortality in feveral Parts of Spain, and in Our Town and Garrilon of Gibraltar) has spread and extended itself to Parts of the Coast of the Mediterranean; And whereas, from the Season of the Year in which it has continued its Ravages in those Places where it has already appeared, there is no good Ground of Confidence or Hope that the comparative Colduess and the Temperature of this Climate can afford any Obstacle to its Introduction and Progress in Our Kingdom:

And whereas we feel it to be incumbent upon Us to employ fuch Means as, under the Protection and Favour of Divine Providence, may be beft calculated to guard Our loving Subjects against the Visitation of to dreadful a Calamity, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereins by and with the Advice of Our faid Council, most shriftly enjoin and command all Our loving Subjects, and more effectally those residing at any of the Sea-
