The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in His Privy Council.

THEREAS Francis Gartrell the Younger, of the Parish of Sennen, in the County of Cornwall, Fisherman, George Blackwell, of the same Place, Yeoman, John Bottrell, of the same Place, Labourer, William Pender, of the same Place, Labourer, and divers other Persons, to the Number of Three Perfons and more, were, upon the Twenty third Day of February One thousand eight hundred and five, charged by Information of Two credible Persons, upon Oath by them subscribed before Sir Nash Grose, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, with having been guilty, on the Tenth Day of January last past, of being armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, to wit, with Guns and Stones, and of having affembled themselves together in the said Parish in order to be aiding and affifting in rescuing and taking away, after Seizure made by William Parry, one of the Officers of His Majelly's Revenue of Excise, a large Quantity of Tobacco, Foreign Brandy, and other Foreign Spirituous Liquors called Rum and Geneva, (to wit,) Five Hundred Pounds Weight of Tobacco, One thousand seven hundred Gallons of Foreign Brandy, Two Hundred Gallons of Foreign Rum, and One thousand Gallons of Foreign Geneva, being, respectively, unaccustomed Goods, and Goods liable to pay Duties, which had not been paid or fecured, and with having been aiding and affilting in endeavoiring to rescue and take away from the said William Parry, being such Officer of Excise as aforesaid, the said Tobacco, Foreign Brandy, Foreign Rum, and Foreign Geneva, after Seizure thereof by the said William Parry as aforesaid, which Information was afterwards, by the faid Mr. Justice Grose, certified under his Hand and Seal, and returned to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided; His Majesty doth, by and with

T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 7th of the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command that the faid Francis Gartrell the Younger, George Blackwell, John Bottrell, and William Pender, and each of them do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or any other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's-Bench, or to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.
