THE following Intelligence has been received at the East India House:

AFTER the Capture of Hinglaiz-Ghur by the Detachment under the Command of the Honorable Lieutenant-Colonel Monson, as stated in the Calcutta Gazette of the 26th of July, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson advanced his Position about Fifty Miles from the Mokundra Pass, in which Position he was informed that he would be able to procure Supplies. Colonel Monson also expected to be able to communicate with Colonel Murray, at that Time on his March, with a considerable Detachment of Troops, from Guzerat towards Onjein.

The Corps under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson consisted of Five Battalions of Sepoys, with a Proportion of Artillery, and of Two Bodies of irregular Horse, under the Command of Lieutenant Lucan, and of a Native Chieftain, named Bapojee Scindiah, amounting to about Three Thousand Men.

On the 7th of July 1804, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson received Intelligence that Jeswunt Rao Holkar, (who, since his Retreat before the Army of the Commander in Chief, had occupied a Position in Malwa, having the Chumbul River between him and Colonel Monson's Corps,) had crossed the Chumbul River with the Whole of his Army and Guns. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson was desirous of attacking Jeswunt Rao Holkar, and moved towards the Place at which it was stated that Jeswunt Rao Holkar had crossed the Chumbul River. Colonel Monson however states that he had only Two Days Grain in his Camp; that Part of his Corps had been detached to bring up Grain; that One Battalion of his Force was on its March to join him from Hinglaiz-Ghur; that he expected to be joined by an Escort with Treasure, for the Use of his Detachment; and that he had also received Accounts from Colonel Murray, of that Officer's Intention to fall back on the Myhie River. Under these Circumstances, and adverting to the large Body of Cavalry which was stated to be with Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Army, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson determined to retire to the Mokundra Pass.

Accordingly the Whole of the Baggage and Stores belonging to Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's

Detachment was sent off at Four A.M. on the Morning of the 8th of July 1804, to Sonara; and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson remained on the Ground of Encampment till half-past Nine, with his Detachment formed in Order of Battle. At this Period of Time, no Enemy having appeared, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson commenced his March, leaving Lieutenant Lucan and Bapojee Scindiah, with the irregular Cavalry, on the Ground, with Orders to follow in Half an Hour, and to send Lieutenant-Colonel Monson the earliest Intelligence of Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Motions.

The Detachment had marched nearly Six Coss, when Lieutenant-Colonel Monson received Intelligence that Lieutenant Lucan's Party had been attacked at a considerable Distance in his Rear by the Whole of Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Cavalry. Lieut. Colonel Monson states that he immediately ordered the Troops to form, for the Purpose of supporting Lieutenant Lucan, and was on his March towards Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Army when Bapojee Scindiah joined him, and informed Lieutenant-Colonel Monson that the Rear Guard had been defeated, that many Sirdars had been either killed or wounded, and that Lieutenant Lucan, with several Sirdars, were taken Prisoners. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson therefore continued his March to Sonara, where his Baggage had arrived in Safety; the Baggage moved again at Eleven at Night on the 8th; and at Four in the Morning of the 9th of July the Detachment prosecuted its March to the Mokundra Pass, which it reached at Noon on the same Day, without having been molested by the Enemy.

On the Morning of the 10th of July, a large Body of the Enemy's Cavalry made their Appearance, and continued to encrease in Numbers until Noon next Day, when Jeswunt Rao Holkar sent a Letter to Lieutenant-Colonel Monson, requiring the Surrender of the Guns and Small Arms of the British Detachment. This Demand being rejected with becoming Spirit, Jeswunt Rao Holkar divided his Force into Three Bodies, and made a vigorous Attack on the Front and Flanks of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Corps. Owing, however, to the judicious Position occupied by Lieutenant-Colonel Monson, and to the Bravery and Steadiness displayed by the Troops under his Command, Jeswunt Rao Holkar could not make any Impression on Lieutenant-Colo-

nel Monson's Detachment; and after various unsuccessful Attacks, which continued until Evening, Jeswunt Rao Holkar drew off his Troops, to a Position Two Cofs from Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Corps, where he was joined by his Infantry and Guns, and, where he encamped, with the Intention, it is stated, of attacking Lieutenant-Colonel Monson the following Morning.

Lieutenant-Colonel Monson states, that he was apprehensive the Enemy might pass his Rear, and thus cut off his Communication with the Mokundra Pass, and with the Town of Kotah, which was the only Place, at that Period of Time, from which he could expect to derive any Supplies. Adverting also to the circumscribed Nature of his own Position, to the supposed Strength of Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Force, and to the supposed Weight and Number of Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Guns, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson did not consider his Post at Mokundra, to be tenable, and accordingly resolved to retire to Kotah, which Place he reached on the 12th of July in the Morning, after two Marches. The whole Detachment experienced great Fatigue, owing to the Season of the Year, and to the State of the Country. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson reports the Conduct of all the Troops to have been extremely meritorious, and, on the 11th of July, to have been distinguished by particular Gallantry and Firmness. The Loss sustained in the Affair at the Mokundra Pass was inconsiderable; and is stated in the Official Return, annexed to this Gazette.

The Rajah of Kotah was unwilling to admit Lieutenant-Colonel Monson into the Town, and stated, that he could not furnish Lieutenant-Colonel Monson with any Provisions. As the Troops began to experience severe Distress for Want of a proper Supply of Food, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson continued his March to the Gaumus Nuddee Ghaut. The Rains had set in with Violence on the 30th of July, and about this Period of Time became incessant. Although the Gaumus Nuddee is only Seven Miles distant from Kotah, the Obstructions occasioned by the Rains, and the Nature of the Soil, prevented Lieutenant-Colonel Monson from reaching the Gaumus Rivulet until the Morning of the 13th of July.

The Rivulet was not fordable on the 13th, and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson halted on the 14th to enable the Troops to procure a Supply of Grain from a Village called Tuttun, distant about two Cofs.

On the 15th of July Lieutenant-Colonel Monson continued his March, but the Rains were so violent that it was impossible to move the Guns; Lieutenant-Colonel Monson therefore halted. It rained during the Whole of the Night of the 15th, and on the Morning of the 16th July, the Guns had sunk so deep into the Mud, that it was impracticable, with every Degree of Exertion, to extricate them. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson states, that he had no Provisions in Camp, and that all the neighbouring Villages were exhausted. The small Supply obtained from the Village of Pattun was also expended. Under these Circumstances, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson was induced to spike his Guns, and to order the Ammunition to be destroyed; at the same Time he wrote to the Rajah of Boondec, desiring him to send some People to extricate the Guns, and to deposit them in a Place of Security.

As soon as these Measures were completed, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson prosecuted his March, and reached the Cambulee Rivulet on the 17th of July, having passed a Country so completely overflowed, that it was with the utmost Difficulty the Troops could march. The Rivulet was not fordable on the 17th, but on the 18th of July, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson was enabled to cross over the European Artillery-men on Elephants, and to send them on to Rampoorah.

On the 19th of July, the Rivulet continued to rise. The Troops were in the greatest Distress for Food, when Lieutenant-Colonel Monson heard that there was some Grain in a Village at a few Miles Distance. A strong Party with Arms, and an equal Number without Arms, were accordingly detached from each Corps of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Detachment, together with all the Camp Followers. This Party returned the next Morning (20th July) with a sufficient Quantity of Grain for the Use of the Detachment for Two Days. On their Return to Camp, the Party was attacked by a Body of the Enemy's Horse, who were, however, repulsed. A few Sepoys were wounded in this Affair.

In the Evening of the 21st July, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson detached Captain O'Donnell with the Flank Companies belonging to the Corps of his Detachment, to beat up a Body of Cavalry encamped at some Distance. Capt. O'Donnell was completely successful. The Enemy's Camp was destroyed, and Captain O'Donnell captured some Camels, and Two hundred Horse. The Enemy's Loss was considerable in this Affair.

On the 23d of July, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson having procured a few Rafts, crossed over the 2d Battalion of the 21st Regiment, and on the 24th, the 2d Battalion of the 12th Regiment. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson also sent Lieutenant-Colonel Don with the 2d Battalion of the 8th Regiment, to a Ford, a few Miles lower down the Rivulet, with a View to expedite the Passage of the Detachment. During the 24th of July, a large Body of the Enemy's Cavalry made their Appearance. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson immediately drew up the Remainder of his Detachment, amounting to about Seven hundred Men, and maintained a Contest with the Enemy until Sun-set, when the Enemy retired with the Loss of several Men and Horses. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson had about Twenty Men killed and wounded.

On the Morning of the 25th July, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson ordered the 2d Battalion 21st Regiment to proceed through the Lackeree Pass, and to take up a Position near the Entrance towards Rampoorah. The 2d Battalion of the 2d Regiment crossed the River on the Morning of the 25th, and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson having sent the 1st Battalion of the 12th Regiment to join Lieutenant-Colonel Don, and having no Provisions in Camp, moved on the Morning of the 26th July, with the 2d Battalion 2d Regiment and the 2d Battalion 12th Regiment, towards Rampoorah, which he reached on the 27th. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson immediately adopted Measures for supplying the Two remaining Corps, (the 2d Battalion 8th Regiment, and the 1st Battalion 12th Regiment) under Lieutenant-Colonel Don, with Provisions, and Lieutenant-Colonel Don joined him at Rampoorah on the 29th of July. Some Men belonging to Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's

Detachment were drowned in crossing the Chumbulee Rivulet; and in the March to Rampoorah, (from the Nullah through the Lackeree Pass,) the different Corps were attacked by the Hill People, and by Banditti, who however were always repulsed with Vigour and Success. The 2d Battalion of the 8th Regiment had several Men killed and wounded, and among the latter, Lieutenant Simons, of the Honourable Company's Service.

On his Arrival at Rampoorah, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson was joined by Two Battalions of Sepoys, with Four Six-Pounders and Two Howitzers, and a Body of Hindostanee Cavalry, under Major Frith, together with a Supply of Grain, which had been sent from Agra by the Commander in Chief as soon as His Excellency heard of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Situation at the Mokundra Pass. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson also adopted Measures for collecting a Supply of Grain; but the Supply which he was enabled to procure was inconsiderable, and Jeswunt Rao Holkar having advanced in considerable Force, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson determined to prosecute his Retreat to Khooshal Ghur, where he expected to be joined by Six Battalions and Twenty-one Guns, under the Command of a Native Commander, named Sadasheew Bhow Bukshce, in the Service of Dowlut Rao Scindiah, and where he was also in Hopes he could obtain a sufficient Supply of Provisions to enable him to keep the Field against Jeswunt Rao Holkar. Previously to quitting Rampoorah Lieutenant-Colonel Monson made necessary Arrangements for its Security. A Garrison was left in the Fort of Rampoorah under the Command of Captain Hutchinson, of the Bengal Artillery, consisting of the 2d Battalion 8th Regiment, and Four Companies of the 21st Regiment, with Four Six-Pounders, and a large Stock of Provisions.

The Remainder of Colonel Monson's Detachment, consisting of Five Battalions and Six Companies of Sepoys*, with Two Howitzers, reached the Bannas River about Daybreak on the Morning of the 22d August 1801. The River had risen in consequence of a heavy Fall of Rain, and was so high as to be scarcely fordable for the largest Elephants.

Three Boats were found at the Bannas River, and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson perceiving that the River did not fall so rapidly as might be expected, ordered Captain Nicholl, with the Six Companies of the 2d Battalion 21st Regiment, to cross the River, and to proceed to Khooshal-Ghur, in Charge of the Treasure of the Detachment.

Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Cavalry appeared in large Bodies, in Front of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Detachment, on the Morning of the 23d August, 1804, and pitched their Camp about Four Miles from Lieutenant-Colonel Monson. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson, however, states that the Encampment was so irregular, as to render it impossible to attack the Enemy's Cavalry with any Prospect of Advantage.

On the Morning of the 24th August, the River having been found fordable, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson began to cross over the Baggage, at Eight A. M. together with One Battalion. At the same Time the Enemy took Possession of a large Village

on Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Right, but Lieutenant-Colonel Monson attacked this Post, and carried it with the Loss of a few Men. The Fall of the River having rendered it fordable in many Places, the Enemy availed themselves of this Circumstance, and their Cavalry began to cross in great Numbers, at different Places, to the Right and Left of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Position. The greater Part of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Baggage had crossed, and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson sent over Three more Battalions, and One Howitzer for its Protection, intending to follow with the remaining Corps, (the 2d Battalion 2d Regiment, and the Picquets of the Four Corps which had crossed,) as soon as the Remainder of the Baggage and the Camp Followers had effected that Passage over the River.

At Four P. M. however, the Enemy's Infantry and Guns arrived, and opened a heavy Cannonade on the 2d Battalion 2d Regiment, and the Picquets posted on the South Side of the Bannas River. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson immediately charged the Enemy with his small Body of Men, and succeeded in carrying some Guns. The Enemy, however, encouraged by their Superiority of Numbers, rallied, and advancing with great Celerity in different Directions, the Picquets, and the 2d Battalion 2d Regiment, were overpowered, and compelled to retire, and to abandon the remaining Howitzer. Our Troops suffered very severely in this Operation, and with Difficulty effected a Retreat, under Cover of the 1st Battalion 4th Regiment, who advanced to the Banks of the River for that Purpose.

The Enemy prosecuted the Advantage which they had obtained, and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson was compelled to abandon his Baggage, and continue his Retreat to Khooshal-Ghur, which he reached on the Night of the 25th August. During the March to Khooshal-Ghur, the Enemy's Cavalry, supported by Guns, made several Attacks on Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Detachment, but without Success. At Khooshal-Ghur Lieutenant-Colonel Monson found Captain Nicholl, who arrived in the Vicinity of the Fort of Khooshal-Ghur on the 24th of August. Captain Nicholl's Picquets were attacked on the Night of the 24th by Parties of Horsemen, but maintained their Post until the Morning of the 25th, when they were recalled, and Captain Nicholl moved into the Fort of Khooshal Ghur with the Whole of his Detachment, strengthened by a Company from the 12th Regiment Native Infantry, which had been stationed at Khooshal-Ghur for some Days. Captain Nicholl states that there were several Gates and Openings into the Fort of Khooshal-Ghur, which belongs to the Rajah of Jeypoor; and that on the Morning of the 25th of August he was apprised that it was the Intention of the Troops under Sadasheew Bhow to levy a Contribution upon the Town of Khooshal-Ghur. This Information, Captain Nicholl further adds, was accompanied by a Threat, that if, in Two Hours, a certain Sum of Money was not paid to the Mahratta Troops they would cannonade the Town.

Captain Nicholl then declared his Intention of protecting the Town, and received a Letter from the Mahratta Commander, requiring the Surrender of the Elephants, Treasure, &c. belonging to the British Detachment. To this demand Captain Nicholl made no Reply, and at Nine o'Clock in the

Morning of the 25th August, the Enemy opened some Guns on the Town. At Five o'Clock in the Evening of the same Day, Captain Nicholl reports, that the Enemy made an Attack upon the Town with their Infantry, but were quickly repulsed with the Loss of several Men. Captain Nicholl had Two Sepoys killed in this Affair.

On the Morning of the 26th August, the Whole of the Enemy's Cavalry encamped in separate Bodies, surrounding Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Detachment. A Correspondence was at this Period detected, between some of the Native Officers of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson's Corps, and Jeswunt Rao Holkar. The most vigorous and effectual Steps appear to have been immediately adopted to check this Mischief; but notwithstanding every Effort on the Part of Lieutenant-Colonel Monson and his Officers, nearly Two Companies from the 1st Battalion 14th Regiment, and a large Proportion of the Hindoostanee Cavalry deserted.

On the 26th August, at Seven P. M. Lieutenant-Colonel Monson moved from the Fort of Koo-shal-Ghur, and formed an oblong Square, having previously spiked the remaining Howitzer.

During the Night of the 26th August, and the greater Part of the 27th, the Enemy's Cavalry supported, as before, by some Guns, attempted several Times to penetrate the Detachment under Lieutenant-Colonel Monson, but could not make the least Impression on this compact Body of Men. On the Night of the 27th of August, Lieutenant-Colonel Monson took Possession of the ruined Fort of Hindown, and at One A. M. on the 28th, continued his Retreat towards Agra. As soon as the Detachment had cleared the Ravines near Hindown, the Enemy's Cavalry made a desperate Charge in Three separate Bodies, but were received by the Sepoys with determined Coolness and Bravery. The Sepoys reserved their Fire, until the Enemy's Cavalry had come almost within Reach of the Bayonet, and then gave their Fire with such signal Effect, as to compel the Enemy to retire in every Direction.

Lieutenant-Colonel Monson reached the Biana Pass about Sun-set the 28th August. The Troops were almost exhausted with Fatigue and Hunger, and Lieutenant-Colonel Monson halted with an Intention to remain during the Night at the Entrance of the Pass. The Enemy, however, succeeded in bringing up some Guns, and opened a heavy Fire, which compelled Lieutenant-Colonel Monson to continue his Retreat to Agra. The Detachment reached the Town of Biana at Nine P. M. on the 28th August. The Night was dark; and the Camp Followers, with such Baggage as remained with the Detachment, having mixed with the Lines, the Troops were thrown into Confusion. It was impossible to restore Order, and the different Corps retreated in great Disorder to Agra, which they all reached by the 31st of August. The Enemy followed as far as Futty-poor, in fraggling Parties, for the Purpose of plundering, but made no united Attack after the 28th.

The following Extract of a Letter from His Excellency the Commander in Chief to the Governor-General, under date 8th September 1804, is published for general Information:—

“Although I cannot sufficiently lament the unfortunate Turn Affairs have taken with this Detachment; or the Circumstances which led to them, still I feel it my Duty to represent to your Lordship, that

both Officers and Men of the Detachment, on every Occasion in which they were actually engaged with the Enemy, maintained the Superiority of British Discipline, and shewed the utmost Steadiness and Gallantry; and that should an Opportunity occur of leading against the Enemy those who remain, I shall place the fullest Confidence in their Attachment and approved Bravery and Experience.

“I shall cause every possible Enquiry to be made into the apparent Disaffection on the Part of some of the Corps, but I have the Pleasure to assure your Lordship, that it does not appear to have been, by any Means, extensive. Numbers of the Sepoys are daily coming in; and those that are still with the Enemy, and have been obliged to take Service, have sent Word to their Officers, that they will avail themselves of the first Opportunity of escaping to return. Those who refused to enter the Enemy's Service, have been most cruelly treated, and in general mutilated in the Right Hand.”

Heads of Intelligence from Rampoorah.

AT Nine A. M. on the 28th August, Captain Hutchinson, of the Bengal Artillery (who had been left in the Command of the Fort of Rampoorah), observed a Party of the Enemy marching in the Direction of Ooniar, and conceiving it to be possible to cut them off, ordered Lieutenant Robertson, with Three Companies of Sepoys, and some Golundauze, to attempt this Operation. Lieutenant Robertson succeeded in reaching the Enemy, who immediately opened a Fire upon him from Three Guns. The Enemy, however, were enabled to draw off their Artillery, but Lieutenant Robertson captured Five Tumbrils, and a Stand of Colours, and compelled the Enemy to retire, with the greatest Precipitation.

Official Intelligence has been received of the Capture, without any Loss on our Part, of Indore, the Capital of the Holkar Territories, by the Corps under the command of Colonel Murray, on the 24th of August, 1804. The Officer commanding Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Troops at Indore, retired without opposing any Resistance to Colonel Murray.

Extract of a Letter from Peter Rainier, Esq; Vice-Admiral of the Red, and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the East Indies, to William Marsden, Esq; dated on board His Majesty's Ship Trident, 18th October 1804.

ON the 17th, Monr. Linois had seized on some Country Boats off Masulipatam-Road, who gave him the Intelligence of His Majesty's Ship *Wilhelmina* having left that Road a few Days before for Vizagapatam-Road, with the Princess Charlotte Indiaman in Convoy, and accordingly he dashed into that Road in the Forenoon of the 18th, and commenced a furious Attack with the *Marengo* and Frigates on His Majesty's Ship the *Centurion*, (of Fifty Guns,) whom I had a few Days before subti-

tuted for the *Wilhelmina*, having ordered the latter to proceed to Calcutta with the Bengal and Asia Indiamen, who had some Treasure on board. For the Particulars of what followed I beg Leave to refer their Lordships to Captain James Lind's Letter of the 19th, whom I had given an acting Order to command that Ship in the Absence of Captain J. S. Rainier, left dangerously ill at Sick Quarters.

The gallant and spirited Conduct displayed by Captain Lind, his Officers and Crew, in the Defence of His Majesty's Ship *Centurion* against so great a Superiority of Force, under every Advantage on the Part of the Assaults, with the complete Defeat given the French Admiral and Squadron in the Conclusion, merits every Encomium, and I trust will be honored with their Lordships' fullest Approbation. For my own Part I do not hesitate to rank this brilliant Action with the most famous of the defensive Kind recorded in the glorious Annals of the British Navy.

His Majesty's Ship Centurion, in Vizagapatam-Road, 19th Sept. 1804.

SIR, YESTERDAY Morning, whilst at Anchor in this Roadstead, and waiting till the Indiaman, the Princess Charlotte, and the Country Ship the *Barnaby*, the Two Ships you directed me to convoy to Madras, were loaded, Three Ships were perceived under the Land in the South West, coming down before the Wind, with all Sail set. About half-past Nine A. M. it was seen that the strange Ships were Enemies, and were a Line of Battle Ship and Two Frigates; the Line of Battle Ship hoisted, with her Colours, a Flag at the Mizzen Topmast-Head, and I believe was the *Marengo*, Admiral Linois, and I shall so call her in this Letter. The Frigate appeared to be of Thirty-six or Forty Guns. For the Information of the Convoy the Signal of an Enemy being in Sight was hoisted, and soon afterwards one for the Convoy, as they were belt able to put into a Port in View. This was done, that the Two Ships that we had taken under Convoy might get close in Shore for Protection, or, if necessary, to be run on it: The *Barnaby* complied with this Signal; she ran in Shore, but unfortunately afterwards got into the Surf, and was totally lost.

About Ten A. M. the headmost of the Enemy's Ships, a Frigate, was about Half a Mile from the *Centurion*, without any Colours flying. Several Shot were fired at her. About the same Time the Cable was cut, and Topsails sheeted home, which were already loose for the Purpose; by this Means the Broadside was brought to bear upon the Enemy, and prevented the Ship being boarded or raked; by this Manœuvre, likewise, a Frigate, that was within a Cable's Length of the *Centurion*, and appeared to have an Intention to board, got a close and well-directed Broadside into her: the Action soon became general; the Three Enemy's Ships directing their Fire on the *Centurion*, their only Object, for the Princess Charlotte Indiaman had very early struck her Colours. The *Centurion* stood in Shore, the *Marengo* and One Frigate on the Starboard Quarter, the other Frigate on the Larboard; they were all less than Half a Mile distant, and kept firing, which the *Centurion* returned. Her Fire was chiefly directed against the *Marengo*. About a Quarter before Eleven the French Ships stood to Sea; and immediately after this I got on board,

though with much Difficulty and Danger. I had been on Shore to expedite the Sailing of the Convoy, and was not present in this early Part of the Action, for, till now, the Centurion had been under the Direction of Lieutenant James Robert Philips, the First Lieutenant; and, before I proceed any further in this Account, permit me to notice the judicious Conduct of this deserving and old Officer, and his gallant Defence of the Ship against so superior Force as that of the Enemy. I hope, Sir, his Conduct will be thought worthy of a Reward, and that he will be esteemed deserving of Promotion.

On my coming on board I found the Sails and Rigging so very much cut as to render the Ship not in a State to be worked, and therefore anchored at the Back of the Surf, about a Mile and a Half to the North East of the Town; this Situation was the best I had in my Power to take, both for Defence, and to prevent her falling into the Possession of the Enemy if overpowered.

A Battery of Three Guns at the Town, under the Command of Colonel Campbell, of His Majesty's 74th Regiment, had kept a Fire on the Enemy whilst within Reach in the Roadstead, but now we were too far distant to receive any Support from it. I sent on Shore to request Guns might be brought on the Beach nearer us; this was a Thing, I have been since convinced of, totally impracticable, or it would have been done. We prepared again for Action; and, whilst thus employed, the Enemy, in the Offing, wore and stood towards us; the *Marengo*, after having repeatedly tied the Range of her Guns, came to an Anchor abreast of us, and about a Mile distant; clewed up her Topsails, furled her Courses, and commenced cannonading. This threatening Appearance of being determined to persevere and to succeed only served to animate the Officers and Men of His Majesty's Ship to greater Exertions of Defence with the Lower Deck Guns, the only ones that would reach the Enemy, for she was too far distant for the Carronades, but all the Enemy's Shot reached us. In the mean Time one of the Frigates kept under Sail on our Quarter, and nearer than the *Marengo*, and annoyed us much by her Fire; the other Frigate carried off the Indiaman from her Anchorage in the Road.

At a Quarter past One P. M. nearly two Hours after this cannonading had commenced, and which had been kept up with Vigour on both Sides, the *Marengo* cut her Cable, hoisted her Jib, and stood to Sea. By some of her last Shot our Cable was cut, and we made some Sail, and got further off Shore before we brought up with the Sheet Anchor. When the *Marengo* first made Sail I supposed she intended to make a short Stretch, tack, and renew the Action nearer, and made all necessary Preparation to receive her, but she, Frigates, and Prize Indiaman, stood to Sea, and a little before Sunset bore up to the North-East, towards the Bottom of the Bay.

What Damage the Enemy has sustained, or from what Cause they declined further Contest with us I cannot tell.

After this full Account of the Transactions of the Day, I feel it a Duty incumbent on me not only to repeat the high Sense I have of Lieutenant Philips' Services, but likewise to inform you that the other Lieutenants of this Ship, Lieutenants David Pringle,

Richard Coote, and William Fairbrother Carrol, displayed great Gallantry and Spirit on the Occasion; the last mentioned, Lieutenant Carrol, though a young Officer, has seen much Service, and as his Commission of Lieutenant is not yet confirmed by my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, may I request that you will be pleased to represent his great Merit, to induce their Lordships to do it. To the Zeal and Energy of Lieutenant Warring of the Marines, I am much indebted.

To insert any Thing in this Letter in praise of the Behaviour of the veteran and gallant Crew of His Majesty's Ship *Centurion*, must be needless to you, Sir, who are well acquainted with it, but I cannot refrain from saying that they displayed great Experience, and cool Courage, and the good Discipline of the Ship was conspicuous, and does great Credit to their proper Commander, Captain Rainier.

His Majesty's Ship has received considerable Damage in her Masts, Yards, and Rigging. The Fore-mast, Mizenmast, and Mainyard, are badly wounded, as well as several smaller Masts and Yards; several Shot remain in the Bottom between Wind and Water, one came through into the Gunner's Store-Room; but for your full Information of Particulars there accompanies this detailed Reports of Damages sustained in the Gunner's, Boatswain's, and Carpenter's Departments, as far as they have been yet ascertained. It is with Pleasure I acquaint you that very few Men, considering the long Action, have suffered, none were killed, and only nine wounded, one of them is since dead, the others are not in apparent Danger.

I have received all the Assistance that this Place could afford me from Colonel A. Campbell, of His Majesty's 74th Highland Regiment, Commanding Officer of the District, and from all the Company's Servants, both Civil and Military, at this Settlement.

I AM to acknowledge the Receipt of your Letter of the 19th ultimo, informing Particulars of your proceeding in Execution of my Orders, and of the very noble Defence you made in His Majesty's Ship *Centurion*, under your Command, in Vizagapatam Road the preceding Day, against the formidable Attack of so superior a Force of the Enemy, as described in your Letter, led on by the French Admiral, Linois, in the *Marengo*; the gallant and spirited Conduct displayed on this Occasion by yourself, Officers, and Crew, merits the highest Applause, wherein you not only saved His Majesty's Ship under your Command from falling into the Enemy's Hand, as well as from Shipwreck, by running her on Shore, as a very obvious Resource that offered to prevent it, but gave the French Rear-Admiral a complete Defeat.

I shall not fail to forward your Letter to the Secretary of the Admiralty, for their Lordships' Information by the present Opportunity, and have no Doubt but their Lordships will bestow on you some honorable Acknowledgment of their Approbation of your gallant Conduct.

I HAVE the Pleasure to inform you, this Morning at Two o'Clock we fell in with the French Privateer Brig, Les Freres Unis, of One Hundred and Forty Tons, pierced for Sixteen, but with only Eight Guns on-board, and One Hundred and Thirty-four Men, Fifteen of whom are Officers, and Forty Soldiers from Bourdeaux; in July, and from Mauritius 11th November, on a Cruise, but had taken Nothing. It took us till near Six A. M. to close with and capture this Vessel, who sails fast, and made every Effort to get from us, firing all his Guns into us, and as we hailed, but (thank God) without hurting any one. They had one Man shot by our Musquetry, and, with ourselves, received much Injury to Boats, Booms, Rigging, &c. &c.

SIR, I HAVE great Pleasure in acquainting you, that the French National Vessel Passe par Tout, (a Chasse Marée,) was this Day at Noon captured by the Boats of His Majesty's Ship under my Command, without the Loss of a single Man, after a most determined Resistance, in which the Enemy lost Two Men killed, with the First and Second Captains, and Three others very dangerously wounded, the Captain, I fear, mortally, having a Ball through his Body. About Ten A. M. perceiving the Chace to have got her Sweeps out, and the Land Wind failing, I sent Three Boats in Pursuit; the Barge and small Cutter with Lieutenants Doyle and Beach (my First and Second Lieutenants,) being up first, most gallantly laid her on board in the Face of a very heavy Fire from Two Brafs Six-Pounders, several Swivels, and repeated Volleys of Musketry, when in less than Two Minutes they laid down their Arms. Great Praise is due to my Officers and People employed on this Occasion; and I have not the least Doubt of their Success, had the Enemy been of a much greater Force. One of the Bargemen is wounded on the Back of his Hand by a Cutlass.

She proved to be the Passe par Tout, of Two Brafs Six-Pounders and Six Brafs Swivels, with Twenty-five Men. I have the Honor to be, &c.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, for the Information of the Lords of the Admiralty, that on Sunday the 10th Instant, in the Latitude of 48 Deg. North, and Longitude 10 Deg. 15 Min. West, we fell in with the Spanish Private Ship of War Felicity, mounting Twenty Guns and One Hundred and Seventy Men, commanded by Jose Vincento de Cinza, out Ten Days from St. Andero, and after an Engagement of One Hour and a Half, she struck to the Kitty, Private Ship of War, of London, under my Command. I am concerned to add, that we had One Man killed and Two dangerously wounded. In Justice to the Officers and Ship's Company, I must say their Conduct deserves the Approbation of their Lordships, when you take into Consideration that not Twenty of them ever saw a Gun fired before, and not twice that Number ever were at Sea before we left the Downs, on the 3d Instant.
