WHEREAS Francis Gartrell the Younger, of the Parish of Sennen, in the County of Cornwall, Fisherman, George Blackwell, of the same Place, Yeoman, John Bottrell, of the same Place, Labourer, William Pender, of the same Place, Labourer, and divers other Persons, to the Number of Three Persons and more, were, upon the Twenty-third Day of February One thousand eight hundred and five, charged by Information of Two credible Persons, upon Oath by them subscribed before Sir Nash Grose, one of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, with having been guilty, on the Tenth Day of January last past, of being armed with Fire Arms and other offensive Weapons, to wit, with Guns and Stones, and of having assembled themselves together in the said Parish in order to be aiding and assisting in rescuing and taking away, after Seizure made by William Parry, one of the Officers of His Majesty's Revenue of Excise, a large Quantity of Tobacco, Foreign Brandy, and other Foreign Spirituous Liquors called Rum and Geneva, (to wit,) Five Hundred Pounds Weight of Tobacco, One thousand seven hundred Gallons of Foreign Brandy, Two Hundred Gallons of Foreign Rum, and One thousand Gallons of Foreign Geneva, being, respectively, unaccustomed Goods, and Goods liable to pay Duties, which had not been paid or secured, and with having been aiding and assisting in endeavouring to rescue and take away from the said William Parry, being such Officer of Excise as aforesaid, the said Tobacco, Foreign Brandy, Foreign Rum, and Foreign Geneva, after Seizure thereof by the said William Parry as aforesaid, which Information was afterwards, by the said Mr. Justice Grose, certified under his Hand and Seal, and returned to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided; His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Or-

der in His Privy Council, require and command that the said Francis Gartrell the Younger, George Blackwell, John Bottrell, and William Pender, and each of them do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or any other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America; and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being, to authorise, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported, except in Conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully sup-

plying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock may be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; and which, within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted; and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect; And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so endorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.
