PRESENT,

The KING's Molt Excellent Majelty in His Privy Council,

WHEREAS Francis Gartrell the Younger, of the Parish of Sennen, in the County of Cornwall, Fisherman, George Blackwell, of the fame Place, Yeoman, John Bottrell, of the fame Place, Labourer, William Pender, of the fame Place, Labourer, and divers other Perlons, to the Number of Three Perfons and more, were, upon the Twenty-third Day of February One thousand eight hundred and five, charged by Information of Two credible Perfons, upon Oath by them fubferibed before Sir Nath Grofe, one of His Majefty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, with having been guilty, on the Tenth Day of January lalt past, of being armed with Fire Arms and other offenfive Weapons, to wit, with Guns and Stones, and of having affembled themfelves together in the faid Parish in order to be aiding and affilling in refcuing and taking away, after Seizure made by William Parry, one of the Officers of His Majetty's Revenue of Excife, a large Quantity of Tobacco, Foreign Brandy, and other Fo-reign Spirituous Liquors called Rum and Geneva, (to wit,) Five Hundred Pounds Weight of Tobacco, One thouland feven hundred Gallons of Foreign Brandy, Two Hundred Gallons of Foreign Rum, and One thousand Gallons of Foreign Ge--neva, being, respectively, unaccustomed Goods, and Goods liable to pay Duties, which had not been paid or fecured, and with having been aiding and affilting in endeavouring to refcue and take away from the faid William Parry, being fuch Officer of Excife as aforefaid, the faid Tohacco, Foreign Brandy, Fo-reign Rum, and Foreign Geneva, after Seizure thereof by the faid William Parry as aforefaid, which Information was afterwards, by the faid Mr. Justice Grofe, certified under his Hand and Seal, and returned to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the fame before His Majelty in His Privy Council, purfnant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of His late Majefly King George the Second, in that Cafe owned by His Majefly's Subjects, and navigated made and provided; His Majefly doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Or-and according to Law: And whereas it is expedient

## PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, paffed in the Twenty-W eighth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, intituled "An Act for regulating the "Trade between the Subjects of His Majefty's "Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the Weft India Islands, and the Countries be-" longing to the United States of America, and " between His Majefty's faid Subjects and the Fo-" reign Iflands in the Weft Indies ;" it is, amongft other Things, enacted, That it fhall and may be lawful for His Majefty in Council, by Order or Orders to be iffued and published from. Time to Time, to authorife, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governue of Newfoundland for the Time being, to authorife, in Cafe of Necessity, the Importation into New-foundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, for the Supply of the Inhabi-tants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the then enfuing Scalon only; provided always, that fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, fo authorifed to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported, except in Conformity to fuch Rules, Regulations, aud Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships
