A T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 5th of April 1805,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act "for making further Provision for the effectual
"Performance of Quarantine;" it is, amongst
other Things, enacted, That from and after the
Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five, all Ships and Veffels, as well His Majesty's Ships of War, as all others coming from, or having touched at, any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, shall have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague, or any other Infectious Disease or Distemper highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty's Subjects may be brought; and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize; Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever from or out of any Ships or Vessels so coming ever, from or out of any Ships or Vessels so coming from or having touched at such infected Place as aforesaid, whether such Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or other Articles shall have come or been brought in such Ships or Vessels, or such Persons shall lave gone, or Articles have been put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships or Vessels at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, and whether fuch Ships or Velfels were or were not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid; and that all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any Articles whatever on board any fuch Ships or Vessels so coming from, or having touched at, such infected Place as aforesaid, or on board of any fuch receiving Ships, Vessels, or Boats as aforefaid, shall be, and be considered to be, liable to Quarantine, within the Meaning of the faid Act, and of any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majelty, His Heirs, or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, concerning Quarantine and the Prevention of Infection,

from the Time of the Departure of fuch Ships or Vessels from such infected Place as aforesaid, or from the Time when such Persons, Goods, Wares, Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or other Articles shall have been received on board respectively; and that fuch Ships, Vessels, and Boats as aforesaid, and all Persons (as well Pilots as others), Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, whether coming or brought in such Ships, Vessels, or Boats from such infected Place as aforesaid, or going or being put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships, Vessels, or Boats at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforefaid; and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforefaid, on board any such receiving Ship, Vessel, or Boat as aforesaid, shall, upon their Arrival at any such Port or Place, be obliged to perform Quarantine in such Place or Places, for such Time, and in such Manner, as shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, and Boats, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforefaid, shall have respectively performed, and shall be duly discharged from, such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, or other Articles as aforesaid, or any of them, shall either before or after the Arrival of such Ships, Vessels, or Boats at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforefaid, come, or be brought on Shore, or go, or be put on board any other Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to come, or be brought on Shore in any such Port or Place, although such Ships or Vessels, so coming from such infected Place as aforesaid, may not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships, Vessels, and Boats, whether coming from such infected Place as aforesaid, or being otherwise liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, and all Persons (as well Pilots as others), Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforelaid, whether coming or brought in fuch

Ships, Veffels, or Boats, or going, or being put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of fuch Ships, Veffels, or Boats at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, and although fuch Ships, Veffels, or Boats shall not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid; and that all Commanders, Masters, or other Persons having the Charge or Command of any such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, whether coming from any infected Place, or being otherwise liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be subject to all the Provisions, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions contained in the said Act, or in any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majetty, His Heirs and Successors, in Council as aforelaid, concerning Quarantine and the Prevention of Infection, and to all the Pains, Penalties, Forfeitures, and Punishments contained in the faid Act for any Breach or Difobedience thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council made under the Authority thereof.

And it is likewise enacted by the said Act, That whereas certain Sorts of Goods and Merchandize are more especially liable to retain Infection, and may be brought from Places infected into other Countries, and from thence imported into Great Britain, or the Islands aforefaid, all such Goods and Merchandize, as shall be particularly specified for that Purpose in any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Council, con-cerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection as aforesaid, which shall be brought or imported into any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, from any foreign Country or Place, in any Ship or Veffel whatever, and the Ships or Veffels in which the same shall be brought, shall be subject and liable to fuch Regulations and Restrictions as shall be made by such Order or Orders of His Majesly, His Heirs or Succeffors, in Council as aforesaid, respecting the same; His Majesty, under the Authority of the said above-recited Act, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby adjudge and declare it probable that the Plague, or fome other infectious Difease or Distemper highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty's Subjects, may be brought into Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, by Ships or Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, with or without clean Bills of Health; and also by the Importation into Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, of certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes hereinafter enumerated, being the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, from any Port or Place in Europe without the Streights, or on the Continent of America, at which there is not a regular Establishment for the Performance of Quarantine, which shall have been declared sufficient for that Purpose by any Order of His Majesty in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette, and His Majesty is therefore pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Coun-

cil, to order, and it is hereby ordered,

I. That all Ships and Vessels, as well His Majesty's Ships of War as all others, (not having the Plague, or such other infectious Disease or Distemper as aforesaid, actually on board,) coming from or

through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, with clean Bills of Health; and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person or Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchan-dize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles what-ever, from or out of any fuch Ship or Vessel, before fuch Ship or Vessel shall have performed, and shall be duly discharged from, Quarantine, whether such Person or Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, or other Articles as aforefaid, shall have come or been brought in fuch Ship or Vessel, or such Person or Persons shall have gone, or Articles have been put, on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of fuch Ship or Veffel, and whether fuch Ship or Vessel was-or was not bound to any Port or Place in Geeat Britain, or the Islands aforefaid, shall, together with all Persons (as well Pilots as others), Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, on board thereof, perform such Quarantine, for such Time, in such Manner, and at such Places, as are hereinafter directed; and all Commanders, Masters, and other Persons on board any such Ship, Vessel, or Boat so liable to Quarantine as aforefaid, and all Persons who shall have any Intercourse or Communication with them, or any of them, shall forthwith repair to such Lazaret, Ship, Vessel, or Place as is herein appointed, or shall hereafter be appointed in that Behalf, by any Order of His Majefty in Council as aforefaid, or of the Lords and others of the Privy Council, or any Three or more of them, for the Performance of Quarantine, and shall there perform Quarantine accordingly, under and subject to all the Pains, Penalties, Fines, Forfeitures, and Punishments, as well Pains of Death as others, to which any such Commander, Master, or Person is or may be by Law subject for any Resulat or Neglect to repair to fuch Lazaret, Ship, Vessel, or Place as aforefaid, or for any Escape, or Attempt to escape therefrom, or for any other Breach or Difobedience of the Provisions, Rules, and Regulations of the faid hereinbefore recited A&, or of this Or, der, or of any Orders which may hereafter be made as aforefaid.

II. And it is hereby further ordered, That all fuch Ships and Vessels so coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, as shall arrive with clean Bills of Health as aforesaid, and all such receiving Ships, Vessels, and Boats as aforesaid, and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles on board the same, shall respectively persons Quarantine in the Places hereinaster appointed, except in the Cases hereinaster otherwise provided for; that is to say.

All luch Ships or Vessels so arriving as last aforefaid, as are or shall be bound to the Ports of

London, Rochefter, Feversham,

and any Creeks or Places belonging to, or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine in Standgate Creek.

Such of them as are, or shall be bound to the Ports of

Leigh, Malden, Colchester, Harwich, Ipfwich, Woodbridge, Aldborough, Southwold,

Bridlington, Yarmouth, Blackney and Clay, Scarborough, Whitby, Stockton, Lynn, Sunderland, Wisbech, Bolton, Newcastle, Grimfby, Berwick,

and any Creeks or Places belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine in Whitebooth Roads between Hull and Grimsby.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Ports of

Carlifle, Liverpool, Whitehaven, Chester, Lancaster, Beaumaris, Isle of Man, Preston.

and any Creeks or Places belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine in Highlake, near Liverpool, at the West End of Highlake, or in Milsord Haven.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Ports of

Arundel, Sandwich, Chichester, Deal, Portsmouth, Dover, Rye, Southampton, Newhaven, Cowes,

Shoreham, and any Creeks or Places belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine at the Motherbank, near Portsmouth.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Ports of

Fowey, Falmouth, Poole, Weymouth, Gweek, Lyme, Exeter, Penryn, Truro, Dartmouth, Plymouth, Penzance, Scilly, Lone,

and any Creeks or Places belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine at St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the

Bridgewater, Chepftow, Cardiff, Minehead, Swanfea, Briftol, Gloucester,

and any Creeks or Places belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine at Kingroad and Portshute Pill?

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Ports of

Llanelly, St. Ives, Pembroke, Paditow, Milford, Bideford, Barnstaple, Cardigan, Aberystwith, Ilfracombe,

or any Creeks or Places belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quaran-, tine at Milford Haven aforesaid.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Mands of Jersey, Guernsey, Sark, or Alderney, or either of them, or any Part of them, or either of I tually on board, (except any Ship of War, Trans-

them, shall perform Quarantine, either at the Motherbank; near Portsmouth aforesaid, or at St. Ives Pool, within the Mouth of the Harbour of Falmouth aforefaid, being Places hereinbefore appointed for Performance of Quarantine.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Eastern Coast of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of Leith, Preston Pans,

Borrowstounness, Dundee, Alloa, Perth, Dunbar, Montrole. Kirkaldy, and Anstruther, Aberdeen,

or to any Member, Creek, or other Place belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine in Inverkeithing Bay.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Western Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of

Port Glafgow, Fort William. Greenock, Port Patrick, Irvine, Campbeltoun, Stranraer, Oban, and Wigtown, Rothfay,

or to any Member, Creek, or other Place belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine at Holy Loch, in the Firth of Clyde.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the Northern Ports of Scotland, comprehending the Ports of

Inverness, Caithness, Zetland, and Orkney, Stornaway,

or to any Member, Creek, or other Place belonging to or within any or either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine in Cromarty Bay, in the Murray Firth.

Such of them as are or shall be bound to the South West Parts of Scotland, comprehending the Ports Dumfries and

Kirkcudbright, or to any Member, Creek, or other Place belonging to or within either of the above Ports, shall perform Quarantine at Carsthorn, at the Mouth of the River

And lastly, such of them, as are or shall be bound to any Place on the Coasts of England or Scotland not within any of the Ports or Limits hereinbefore mentioned or described, shall perform Quarantine at such Place hereinbefore appointed for Personance of Quarantine as shall be nearest to the Port or Place to which such Ships or Vessels respectively, shall be fo bound.

III. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes imported in any fuch Ships or Vessels as aforesaid, shall be opened and aired at the several Places hereinbefore respectively appointed for the Performance of Quarantine by fuch Ships and Vellels respectively in the Manner and for the Time hereinafter directed.

IV. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Merchant Ships and Vessels, and all other Ships and Vessels not having the Plague or such other infectious Disease or Distemper as aforesaid ac-

port, or other Ship in the actual Service of Go-1 vernment, under the Command of a Commissioned Officer of His Majesty's Navy,) coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, which shall not be furnished with clean Bills of Health, shall perform Quarantine in Standgate Creek and no where elfe; and in case any such Merchant or other Ship or Vessel as aforesaid, coming from any of the Places before described, and not furnished with a clean Bill of Health, shall come, or attempt to enter into any of the Out-Ports of Great Britain, or any of the Islands aforesaid, the Principal and other Officers of the Cultoms at fuch Port, or in fuch Islands, or the Governor or Chief Magistrate thereof, shall cause such Ship or Vessel to depart from thence immediately, and proceed to Standgate Creek to per-form Quarantine; and all Ships of War, Transports, and other Ships in the actual Service of Government, under the Command of Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Navy, coming from any of the said Places, and not being furnished with clean Bills of Health, shall perform Quarantine at the Mother-bank, in a separate and distinct Place to be appointed and marked out with Yellow Buoys for that Purpose, in the Center of which Place a Floating Lazaret, moored with Chains, shall be stationed, with a Yellow Flag constantly slying at the Master Head; and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever from or out of any Ships or Vessels so coming from any of the faid Places without clean Bills of Health as aforesaid, shall perform the like Quarantine at Standgate Creek, or at the Mother Bank respectively, in the same Manuer as if such receiving Ships, Vesiels, or Boats had come from any of the faid Places without clean Bills of Health.

V. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Ships and Vessels coming from any Port or Place in Europe without the Streights, or on the Continent of America, at which there is not a regular Establishment for the Performance of Quarantine declared sufficient by His Majesty in Council as aforesaid, and having on board any of the Articles enumerated in the First Class hereinaster stated, being the Growth, Produce, or Manusasture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any of the said Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, or other Articles as aforesaid from or out of the said Ships or Vessels, shall, together with all Persons, (as well Pilots as others,) Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and all Articles on board thereof, personn the same Quarantine for such Time in such Manner, and at such Places respectively as is herein directed with respect to Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean with clean Bills of Health.

VI. Provided always, That in case it shall happen that any Ship or Vessel being liable to Quarantine, and having a clean Bill of Health on hoard, and bound to any of the Ports or Places aforesaid, shall have passed the Port or Place hereby appointed for such Ship or Vessel to perform Quarantine, either from the Commander or Master being ignorant of his Liability to perform the same, or from the said.

Ship or Veffel having been carried past the said Port or Place by Stress of Weather, or any other unavoidable Circumstance, the said Commander or Masters upon Proof thereof being made by the Oath of such Commander or Master, and likewise of the Pilot, (if any on board;) to the Satisfaction of the Superintendant of Quarantine or his Affistant, or of the Principal or other Officer of the Customs authorized to act in that Behalf, and that the faid passing such Port or Place was not done intentionally and with a View of evading the Regulations of Quarantine, may be permitted to proceed and repair to any other Port or Place appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, in the Discretion of such Superintendant or his Assistant, or the Principal or other Officer of the Customs authorized as aforesaid, keeping the proper Quarantine Signal hoisted during the Whole Time; and such Commander or Master shall there perform Quarantine with such Ship or Vessel, and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, and other Articles on board in the same Manner as if he had been bound to fuch Port or Place.

VII: And it is hereby further ordered, That no Ship or Vessel liable to Quarantine not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain or the Islands aforesaid, shall touch at or attempt to enter any Port or Place in Great Britain or the Islands aforefaid, whether fuch Port or Place shall have been appointed for the Performance of Quarantine or not,) except for Orders or in consequence of Stress of-Weather, or any Damage, Lols. or Accidents of the Seas, (the Circumstances and Necessity of which shall be proved upon Oath as aforesaid, to the Satisfaction of the Superintendant of Quarantine or his Affistant, or of the Principal or other Officer of the Customs authorized to act in that Behalf,) and that the Commanders and Masters of all such Ships and Vessels, by whom, and with respect to which, such satisfactory Proof shall have been made as aforesaid, shall be examined by such Superintendant or his Affistant, or the Principal, or other Officer of the Customs, and shall give true Answers upon Oath, to the preliminary Quarantine Questions hereinafter directed to be put to the Commanders and Masters of all Ships and Vessels liable to perform Quarantine, and shall likewise strictly conform in all Respects to all such Directions as they shall receive from such Superintendant or his Assistant, or the Principal or other Officer of the Customs as aforefaid, as well with respect to their Stay or Continuance at such Port, and their Departure from thence, and repairing to any other Port or Place for that Purpole, as also with respect to all other Orders; Regulations, and Restrictions, touching or concerning Quarantine; and in default of making such satisfactory Proof, or giving true Answers to such Questions, or of obeying and complying with fuch Directions, Orders, Regulations, and Restrictions as aforesaid, the faid Commanders, Masters, or other Persons having the Charge of such Ships or Vessels shall be compelled forthwith to proceed to Sea with fuch Ships and Veffels, and the faid Superintendant or his. Affiliant, or the Principal or other Officer of the Cultoms shall use all necessary Means for that Purpose, calling to his Aid the Commanders or other Officers of any of His Majesty's Ships of War, if their Assistance shall appear to be necessary.

into any Port or Place in Great Britain or the Islands aforesaid, whether such Port or Place shall have been appointed for the Performance of Quarantine or not, the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, (if there shall be such Superintendant or Assistant at such Port or Place,) or if not, the Principal Officer of His Majesty's Customs at fuch Port or Place, or such Officer of the Customs as shall be authorized by the Commissioners of the Customs, or any Four or more of them to act in that Behalf, shall go off to such Ship or Vessel, and shall, at a convenient Distance from such Ship or Veffel, keeping to Windward, demand of the Commander, Maker, or other Person having Charge of fuch Ship or Vessel, Answers to the following preliminary Quellions:

3d. From whence do you come? 4th. To what place are you bound?

5th. At what Ports have you touched fince you left the Port of your Lading, on your homeward Voyage?

6th. What Ships have you had Intercourse or Communication with on your Passage, and from

whence did they come?

7th. Did the Plague or any other infectious Difease or Distemper prevail, in any Degree, at the Place from whence you sailed on your homeward Voyage, or at any of the Places at which you have touched? If at any, fay at which and when. Are any Persons on board your Ship suffering under any infectious Disease, or have any Persons died or been all of a Disease of that Nature, in the homeward Passage? and if any, what Number? and if any have died or been ill of such Disease, were their Bedding and Clothes destroyed?

[If the Ship shall have failed from any Port in Europe without the Streights, or on the Con-

tinent of America.]

8th. Have you on board any Goods enumerated in this List?

[Handing up a List of Articles enumerated in the First Class.]

If you have, specify the same, and whether they are of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or of what other Place? Have you any Declaration to prove of what Place they are the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture?

[If the Ship comes from the Mediterranean, or from any other Place respecting which there is any Order in Council in Force concerning Qua-

rantine.]

9th. Have you any and what Bill of Health?

oth. What Number of Officers, Mariners, and

Pallengers have you on board? And such Commander, Master, or other Person, having Charge of such Ship or Vessel, shall, upon such Demand, give a true Answer to such Questions in Writing or otherwise, and upon Oath, or not upon Oath, according as he shall be required by such Su-perintendant, or his Assistant, or Principal Officer, or other Officer of the Customs, authorized as aforefaid, under such Pains and Penalties as are inflicted by the faid hereinbefore recited Act.

And if it shall appear by the Answers so given to the said Questions that the said Ship or Vessel is liable to Quarantine, the faid Commander, Mafter, or other Person having the Charge or Command thereof, shall be directed to repair, and shall repair, forthwith with such Ship or Vessel to the proper Place appointed in that Behalf for the Performance of Quarantine, and shall not be permitted to remain in, or enter into, any Port or Place, other than the Port or Place so appointed as aforesaid, unless compelled by Stress of Weather, Damage, Loss, or other Injury unavoidably occasioned to the Ship or Vessel by the Perils of the Seas; which Stress of Weather, Damage, Loss, or other Injury, and that the said Damage, Loss, or other Injury was unavoidable, and not wilfully or intentionally done or occafioned, shall be made appear by the Oath and Examination of such Commander or Malter, and of the Pilot (if any) on board, to the Satisfaction of the Superintendant or his Affistant, or of the Principal or other Officer of the Customs, authorized as aforefaid, at the Port or Place in which he shall be so detained, or into which he shall be so compelled to enter as aforesaid; in Default of which satisfactory Proof, or when the Cause of such Ship or Vessel so coming in as aforesaid shall no longer exist, such Superintendant, Affistant, Principal or other Officer of the Customs, authorized as aforesaid, shall direct and (if necessary) compel such Ship or Vessel to repair to the proper Place appointed in that Behalf for the Performance of Quarantine, and shall use all necesfary Means for that Purpose, either by firing of Guns upon such Ship or Vessel, or by any other Kind of necessary Force whatever.

IX. And it is hereby further ordered, That, on the Arrival of any Ship or Vessel liable to Quarantine, in any Port or Place hereby appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, or in case of such Superintendant and his Aflittant being otherwise neces-larily engaged, the Principal Officer of His Majefty's Cuftoms at fuch Port or Place, or fuch Officer of the Customs as shall be duly authorized to act in that Behalf, (together with the Medical Attendant in such Cases as shall be thought to require his Asfiltance,) shall go alongside such Ship or Vessel in a Boat, (keeping to Windward,) and shall see the Officers, Crew, and all other Persons belonging to or being on board fuch Ship or Vellel, multered on the Gangway, and the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Affistant, or such Principal or other Officer of the Cultoms, authorized as aforesaid, shall then and there, in the Presence of the Crew, put the following Questions to the Commander, Master, or other

Person having Charge of the Ship or Vessel:
11t. What is the Name of the Vessel, and the Name of her Commander or Master

2d. Are you the Commander or Malter? 3d. To what Port or Place does the belong?

4th. When did you fail from the Port or Place from whence you took on board your outward Cargo, and at what Places did you touch before you arrived at the Port or Place where you took in your present Cargo?

5th. Did you carry any Bill or Bills of Health with you to the Port or Place where you took in the Cargo you have now on board? From what Places? Were the faid Bills of Health clean, unclear

When did you fail from such Port or Place; and at what Place or Places have you touched in the Course of the Voyage?

7th. Have you any Bill or Bills of Health on Board? From what Place or Places? Are the fame clean, unclean, or inspected? Produce them.

IIf the Ship shall have sailed from any Port or Place in Europe without the Streights, or on the Continent of America.]

8th. Of what Articles does your Cargo confift? Have you on board any Goods enumerated in this T.ift?

And it is further ordered, That the Answers to the aforefaid Questions thall be taken down in Writing; and the Commander, Mafter, or other Person having the Charge of such Ship or Vessel, fhall folemnly make Oath to the Truth thereof before the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Affistant, or the Principal or other Officer of the Cuftoms, authorized as aforefaid, (as the Cafe may be) and such Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Af-fistant, or such Principal or other Officer of the Cultoms as aforefaid, (with the Advice of the Medical Attendant, if such Advice shall be judged neceffary,) shall, according to the Answers returned to the Questions hereinbefore set forth, then appoint a proper Place or Station for such Commander, Master, or other Person having the Charge of such Ship or Vessel, to repair to with such Ship or Vessel; who thereupon thall, as foon as possible after having answered the foregoing Quellions, repair with such Ship or Vessel to such Place or Station, where the faid Ship or Vessel shall be forthwith placed, and shall there perform Quarantine accordingly; the said Commander, or Master, or other Person having the Charge of fuch Ship or Veffel, carrying with him the Log-Book, Manifelt, and all the Ship's Papers, all of which he shall there deliver to the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, or to the principal or other Officer of the Customs, authorized as aforefaid, (as the Case may be,) the said Log-Book, Manifest, and Papers having been first immersed in Vinegar, and fumigated; and fuch Commander, Mafter, or other Person having the Charge of such Ship or Vessel, shall there solemnly make Oath to the Truth of the Contents of Such Log-Book, to the best of his Recollection and Belief, or shall state and specify upon Oath in what Particulars alone the same, or any Part thereof, is false and incorrect, and whether every particular Entry therein was made as soon after the Fact as possible, and if not, for what Reason it was delayed, and when it was made; and and also to the Truth of all the other Ship's Papers, before fuch Superintendant or his Assistant, or the principal or other Officer of the Customs, authorized as aforefaid, and shall obey and conform to all such Directions as he shall then receive, touching the Performance of Quarantine, from such Superintendant or his Assistant, or the Principal or other Officer of the Customs, authorized as aforefaid.

XI. And it is hereby further ordered, That in the Case of Ships or Vessels liable to Quarantine arriving at any of the Ports of Great Dritain or Islands aforesaid, if any suspicious Circumstances shall appear in the Answers returned to the said Questions by the Commander or Master, or other Person having Charge of any such Ship or Vessel, or from any other Circumstance, the proper Officer of the Customs at such Port or Island shall immediately transmit such Answers, and give Notice of the Cause of such Suspicion to the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, and shall, without Regard to the Bill of Health, whether clean or otherwise, order such Ship or Vessels in Station distant from all other Ships and Vessels in

the same Port or Place, and put her under special Guard, in order the more effectually to prevent all Communication therewith.

XII. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Ships and Vessels liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, and being furnished with clean Bills of Health as well as the Crews and Passengers on board the same, the lame of the lam shall perform a Quarantine of Fisteen Days, in the Manner heretosore practised; which Quarantine shall commence from the Time when such Part of the Cargo, if any, as is enumerated in Two Classes, hereinafter stated, shall have been delivered into the Floating Lazaret in Standgate Creek, or into the Lazaret to be erected at Chetney Hill, in case the Ship or Vessel thall perform Quarantine in Standgate Creek, or into Lighters or other proper Vellels ap pointed for the Purpole, in case the Ship or Vessel shall perform Quarantine at any of the Places bereinbefore appointed for the Performance thereof by Ships bound to any of the Out-Ports or Islands aforefaid: But in Cases where no Part of the Cargo shall consist of such Goods as are last described, then fuch Quarantine of Fifteen Days shall commence on the Day on which the Master or other Person having Charge of such Ship or Vessel shall have arrived with fuch Ship or Vessel at the Station so appointed as aforefaid.

XIII. And it is hereby further ordered, with respect to all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, in Ships or Vessels furnished with clean Bills of, Health, that all such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, other than such as are enumerated in the said First and Second Classes hereinafter stated, shall be aired and treated on board the Ship or Vessel in which they shall arrive, according to the Manner heretofore practifed respecting such Goods imported in Ships and Vessels furnished with clean Bills of Health, and shall continue to be so treated for and during the Space of one Week; and all fuch Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes as are enumerated in the said First and Second Classes hereinafter stated, so coming in Ships or Vessels with clean Bills of Health, shall be removed from the Ship or Vessel to the Place appointed for that Purpole, and shall be sired and treated in the Manner heretofore practifed with regard to such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, and shall continue to be so treated for and during the Space of Fifteen Days.

XIV. And it is hereby further ordered, with respect to all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, and other Articles as aforesaid, brought or imported in Ships and Vessels not having the Plague or other insectious Disease or Distemper as aforesaid, actually on board, and which may arrive in any of the Ports of wreat Britain or the Islands aforesaid, coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, not being furnished with clean Bills of Health, that such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, (such Ship or Vessel having sirst repaired to Standgate Creek as hereinbefore directed,) shall perform Quarantine, either in the Floating Lazaret there, or in the Laud Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, and no where essels in the Manner, and for the Time hereinaster mentioned.

And it is hereby further ordered, That im-Station distant from all other Ships and Vessels in mediately after the Commander, Master, or other Person having Charge of every such Ship or Vessel so arriving without a clean Bill of Health, shall have undergone the Examination hereinbefore directed, and shall have arrived with his Ship or Vessel at the Station so appointed as aforesaid, Two Quarantine Guardians shall be placed on board such Ship or Vessel by the Superintendant of Quarantine or his

XVI. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Persons on board any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine may be permitted to have Communication with others by Letters, under the following Regu-

lations and Restrictions, viz.
In Cases where such Persons shall persorm Quarantine in the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, an Officer appointed by the Superintendant of Quarantine, shall daily go to a proper Place to be appointed by the said Superintendant of Quarantine for the Receipt of Letters from Persons under Quarantine; and in Cases where such Persons shall persorm Quarantine in a Floating Lazaret or in a separate Vessel, an Office Boat not under Quarantine, with an Officer appointed by the Superintendant of Qua-rantine, shall, in like Manner daily, at a fixed Hour, go round the faid Lazaret or Vessel to receive such Letters, the usual Precaution of dipping such Letters in Vinegar and putting them into the fumigating Box, being always first observed; and such Letters shall remain in the fumigating Box until fuch Time as the Superintendant shall give Directions for taking them out to be forwarded; and no Person except the faid Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, or one of the Guardians on board the Ship or Vessel, shall be permitted to deliver such Letters from such funigating Box; and the faid Persons so hereby authorized to deliver the same, shall take Care, where several Letters or Papers are enclosed together, to slit open the Covers in Manner practised and the Lazarets of the Mediterranean.

And all Letters to fuch Persons so under Quarantine, shall be delivered to the Superintendant or his Affiliant, and shall be distributed by him, or according to his Directions; and no Communication or Conference shall be had by Persons not under Quarantine with Persons so under Quarantine, except by Permission, or in the Presence of the Superintendant or his Affiltant, and under such Regulations and Restrictions as shall be directed by the faid Superintendant; nor, in Cases where such Persons shall perform Quarantine on board any Ship or Vesfel, unless from the Boat of the Superintendant or his Affistant, one of whom shall always, and in all Cases, be present during fuch Communication and Conference; and such Communication and Conference shall be had at the Distance observed by the Superintendant or his Assistant in their usual Communication with Ships and Persons under Quaran-

XVII. And it is hereby further ordered, That a Night Watch shall be regularly kept, and a sufficient Number of Guard Boats and Officers shall be appointed, for the Purpose of preventing all clandestine Communication between Persons in the Lazaret and those in the Hospital or Pest-House at Chetney-Hill, or other Place that may be there provided for the Reception of Persons afflicted with any infectious Disease, or between Persons in the Floating Lazaret, either at Standgate Creek or elsewhere, and Persons in any Hospital-Ship, or any Place that

may be provided for the Reception of Persons afflicted with any infectious Disease as aforesaid; or between Persons in such Floating Lazaret, Flospital-Ship, or Place so provided as aforesaid, and those in Ships and Vessels under Quarantine; oor between; Persons in Ships and Vessels under Quarantine, and those in any other Ship, Vessel, or Boat, or on Shore; and such Guard Boats shall row Guard all Night; and Centinels, with loaded Muskets, and small Pieces of Ordnance, loaded with Grape or Cannister-Shot, shall be constantly stationed on the most commanding Parts of the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, or of the Ploating Lazaret at Standgate Creek, or elsewhere; and no Houses or other Buildings shall be erected at or near the Beach near Chetney-Hill, other than those belonging to the faid Lazaret; and that all Boats belonging to any Floating Lazaret, when not on necessary Duty, shall be always either on board the same, or sastened thereto by Chains, with strong Padlocks, the Keys of which shall be lodged in the Custody of a Person to be appointed for that Purpole by the Superintendant; and all the Boats belonging to Ships or Vessels under Quarantine, either at Standgate Creek or at the Out Ports, shall be taken from them, and no Use made of such Boats, except for the Purpose of carrying Goods to the Lazaret, or upon Occasions of Necessity, such Necessity to be determined by the Superintendant of Quarantine; and such Boath shall not be delivered up to the Commanders or Mas-ters of such Ships or Vessels until the Expiration of the Quarantine to be respectively performed by

XVIII. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Affistant, or some proper Person appointed by the Superintendant, shall, as often as required, afford Assistance, and provide Necessaries for the Persons in the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, or in any Floating Lazaret or Hospital-Ship, and also for those on board the Ships and Vessels under Quarantine, taking Care to allow of no improper Communication with the Persons employed for that Purpose; which Persons shall always place their Boats to Windward, and shall deliver, by Means of Buckets, the Articles supplied

by them.

XIX And it is hereby further ordered, That the Quarantine Guardians, who shall be placed on board Ships and Vellels not furnished with clean Bills of Health, shall be instructed to take especial Care that nothing whatever be delivered from on board such Ships or Vessels when under under Quarantine, without an Order, in Writing, from the Superintendant or his Affishant; every such Order to be entered in a Book by one of the faid Guardians, and the Original to be delivered back to the Superintendant or his Affiftant; and nothing, however little susceptible it may be thought to be of Infec-tion, shall be conveyed from one Ship or Vessel under Quarantine to another, nor any personal Intercourse be permitted from any fuch Ship or Vessel to another; and one of the Quarantine Guardians, when thereto required by the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Affillant, shall accompany the Lighters and Boats which shall be employed in passing to or, from the Ship or Vessel on board of which fuch Guardians are placed, during the Passage of fuch Lighters and Boats to and from fuch Ship or Vessel, in order to prevent any Communication in the



Transit of the Cargo from the Ship to any. Floating Lazaret, or to the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, and shall take Care, after every Removal of Goods, that ao Remnants of Cotton, or of any other Article enumerated in either of the faid Two Classes hereinafter stated, remain in the Lighters or the Boats, but shall, before leaving off Work, collect and deliver such Remnants into the Lazaret with the last Package, which they shall then carry from the faid Ship or Vessel.

XX. And it is hereby further ordered, That the said Guardians shall take Care that after the Discharge of the Cargoes into the Lazaret, the Holds and between Decks of the Ships shall be completely

fwept, and the Sweepings burnt.

XXI. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Taid Guardians shall diligently search the Lockers, Chelts, and other Repolitories of the Officers, Paffengers, and Crews, and every Part of the Ships and Vessels, so that no Article so enumerated in either of the faid two Classes, nor any Matter or Thing confidered as susceptible of Insection, remain undelivered to the Lazaret, unless what shall be declared by the faid Superintendant or Medical Attendant to be requifite for daily Use, and shall see that all the said Chests, Lockers, and other Repofitories, and all the Clothes and Bedding in the Ship or Veffel be daily opened and aired in such Manner as shall be directed by the Superintendant of Quarantine, and shall also make the like diligent Search in Ships and Vessels laden with other Goods not enumerated in either of the said Classes, so as to be able the better to ascertain that nothing enumerated or considered as susceptible, has been lest on board.

XXII. And it is hereby further ordered, That one of the faid Guardians shall make a daily Report to the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, and to the Medical Attendant, of the State of Health of every Person on board, and whether the Regulations of Quarantine have been properly complied with; and in case any Impediment shall occur in the Execution of the Duties required of the faid Guardians, they shall give Notice immediately to the Commander, Master, or other Person, having Charge of the Ship or Vessel in the first Instance, and if thereupon such Impediment be not instantly removed, they shall then give Notice thereof to the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, who shall take Care to use essential Means for the Re-

moval of the same.

XXIII. And it is hereby further ordered, That if any Person on board shall fall fick, and any Medical Person shall be on board the Ship or Vessel, fuch Medical Person shall confer with the Medical Attendant alonglide the Ship or Vessel, the Medical Attendant keeping to Windward, at a Dillance of not less than Ten Feet; and in case there shall be no Medical Person on board, and it shall be necessary for the Medical Attendant to inspect the Sick, the Vifit shall be made at the Ship's Boat by the Medical Attendant in his own Boat, keeping to Windward, at the like Dillance of not lefs than Ten Feet; and if any Patient, after being examined in the Manner before-mentioned, shall be found to require fuch Medical or Chirurgical Aid as cannot properly be administered, except in the Pest House, or Hospital Ship, he shall be removed either to such Pell House or Hospital Ship, as the Case may require.

XXIV. And it is hereby further ordered, That

Patients under Circumstances which shall induce Sufpicion, that they may be infected with any pestilential Disorder, whether such Persons shall be in the Lazaret at Chetney Hill, or in a Floating Lazaret, or in any of the Ships or Vessels performing Quarantine, shall be sent to the Pest-House, or other Place which may be provided for the Reception of Persons afflicted with any infectious Disease, or to the Hospital Ship, according to the Discretion of the Superintendant of Quarantine, with the Advice of the Medical Attendant, and when it shall be proved that the Disease is not the Plague, nor infectious, the Patient shall be removed to a more commodious Apartment in the Lazaret, there to complete the Remainder of his Quarantine.

XXV. And it is hereby further ordered, That incafe any pellilential Disorder shall actually discover itself on board any Ship or Vessel, or among any of the Persons under Quarantine, whether in any Ship or Vessel performing Quarantine, or in the Lazaret at Chetney Hill, or in a Floating Lazaret, the Person or Persons affected with such Disorder, shall be removed with all possible Care and Dispatch under the special Direction of the Superintendant of Quavantine and Medical Attendant to the Peft House, or other Place which may be provided for the Reception of Persons afflicted with any infectious Difease, and a Proper Attendant shall be assigned to such Patient or Patients by the Superintendant of Quarantine, with the Advice of the Medical Affiltant, and fuch Patient or Patients shall be visited at a due Distance by the said Medical Attendant, and in case near Approach shall be required, some Person shall be specially appointed by the Medical Attendant for that Purpole.

XXVI. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Passengers and Crew of any Ship or Vessel under Quarantine may have the Assistance of any Medical Persons they may desire from the Shore, subject to the official Visits of the Medical Attendant, and to such Regulations and Restrictions as the Superintendant of Quarantine, with the Advice of such Medical Attendant, shall judge necessary; but all such Medical Persons, as well as all others, if they communicate by Contact with the Sick, shall persons the same Quarantine as the sick Persons them-

eives.

XXVII. And it is hereby further ordered, That after the Quarantine Guardians shall have been placed on hoard any Ship or Vessel, the Pilot may quit such Ship or Vessel, and be removed to an Apartment in the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, or in the Hospital Ship, provided he comes from a Ship or Vessel having no suspicious Sickness on board; but if otherwise, tuch Pilot shall be sent to the Pest House, or other place which may be provided for the Reception of Persons afflicted with any insectious Disease, at the Discretion of the Superintendant of Quarantine, with the Advice of the Medical Attendant, and such Pilot shall in both Cales continue under Quarantine until the Probationary Airing of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, as hereinaster directed, shall be sinished; and at the Expiration of such Probationary Airing, such Pilot, if he continue free from Insection, shall be sumigated and discharged from Quarantine: Provided always, that during the Performance of such Quarantine, either on board the Hospital Ship, or at the Pest House, or other Place which may be provided for the Recep-

tion of Persons afflicted with any infectious Disease, fuch Pilot shall not have Communication with any other Person, except under similar Restrictions to those herein directed with regard to other Persons

under Quarantine.

XXVIII. And it is hereby further ordered, That until the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill shall be erected, fuch of the Passengers and Crew of any Ship or Vessel arriving as above mentioned, not furnished with clean Bills of Health, as may be desirous of performing Quarantine in a separate Vessel, to be hired at their own Expence, shall, in case the Superintendant of Quarantine, with the Advice of the Medical Attendant, shall see no Objection thereto, be permitted to quit the Ship or Vessel in which, they shall have arrived before the Hatches are opened, and to go on board any other Ship or Vessel to perform Quarantine, (in which other Ship or Vessel a Quarantine Guardian shall be placed at the Expence of the Person or Persons so performing Quarantine,) and fuch Persons shall there persorm a Quarantine of Thirty Days, and such of the Pasfengers and Crew as shall remain on board the Ship in which they shall have arrived, shall continue under Quarantine until the Ship shall be discharged there-

XXIX. Provided always, that in case any Pestilential Accident shall occur among the Ship's Crew or Passengers during the Probationary Airing of the Goods, at whatever Stage of the Quarantine such Accident may happen, the Quarantine of all the Officers, Passengers, and Crew, and of the Pilot, (if there shall be a Pilot at that Time liable to Quarantine in respect of his having been on board such Ship or Vessel, ) as well as of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, shall recommence; and the Bick Persons shall be sent to the Hospital Ship, or to the Pest House, or other Place which may be provided for the Reception of Persons afflicted with any infectious Disease; the external Guard shall be immediately doubled, and Notice of such Accident shall be given with all possible Dispatch to the Lords of His Majesty's Privy Council, that they may give such Orders thereupon as may appear to them to be

necessary.

XXX. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Persons who shall have to person Quarantine in the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill shall person such the same Quarantine for the same Time, and under the same Regulations as those who are permitted to perform Quarantine in separate Vessels as hereinbefore di-

rected.

XXXI. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Baggage, Wearing Apparel. Books, and every other Article belonging to any-Person on board any Ship or Veffel arriving as above mentioned, and not furnished with a clean Bill of Health, for which they shall have no immediate Occasion, shall be sent to the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, or to a Floating Lazaret, for the Purpose of being aired in like Manner as other Goods of the same Description; and before any of the Passengers or Crew shall be discharged from Quarantine, they, their Clothes, and other Effects, which have remained with them, shall be fumigated.

XXXII. And it is hereby further ordered, That immediately after the Pilot, and such of the Passengers and Crew of the Ships and Vessels so arriving without clean Bills of Health as may be permitted or directed to perform Quarantine in any of the Modes

hereinbefore mentioned, shall have quitted the Ship or Vessel in which they shall have arrived, the Hatches of fuch Ship or Vessel shall be opened, and the Probationary Airing of the Cargo shall commence, which Probationary Airing shall be in the following Manner, viz.

Such a Number of Bales of the enumerated Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes of the First Class, hereinaster stated, as can be ranged upon Deck, shall be taken from the Hold, and, the Seams at one or both Ends being ripped open, the Contents shall be handled as much as possible by the Sailors, in the Presence of one of the Guardians, and under this Process of handling and turning such Bales shall remain exposed to the Air for Six Days, and on the subsequent Day shall be put into a Condition to be, and shall accordingly be delivered to the Lighter appointed to transport them to the Floating Lazaret, or to the Lazaret at Chetney Hill .: and as foon as the Deck is cleared of the first Parcel of Goods, a fecond Parcel shall be hoisted up and treated in like Manner for the Space of Three Days, and on the subsequent Day shall in like Manner be put into such Condition, and shall be so delivered as aforesaid; after which a third Parcel shall be hoisted up and treated in the same Manner also for the Space of three Days, and on the subsequent Day shall in like Manner be put into such Condition, and shall be fo delivered; but in case of any suspicious Circum stances arising, the Probationary Airings shall be extended to Eight, Six, and Four Days, making, with the Three intermediate Days, Twenty-one Days in the Whole; or even to a greater Length of Time, if Circumstances shall require.

XXXIII. And it is hereby further ordered, That of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes which shall arrive in Ships or Vessels without clean Bills of Health, the Articles hereinafter enumerated in Class the First, shall be carried to the Floating Lazaret in Standgate Creek, or to the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, there to be unpacked, opened, and aired, for

the Space of Forty Days, viz.

#### CLASS THE FIRST,

confiffing of those Articles which are confidered as most liable to Infection:

Apparel of all Kinds, Artificial Flowers, Bast, or any Article made thereof, Beads, Bracelets, or Necklaces in Strings, Beds, Bed Ticks, Books, Brooms of all Sorts, Brushes of all Sorts, Burdetts, Cambletts, Canvas, Carmenia Wool, Carpets, Cordage not Tarred, Cotton Wool, Cotton Yarn, Cotton Thread, All Articles wholly made of or mixed Leather, with Cotton, Silk, Linen,

Yarn, Down; Feathers, Flax, Furriers' Wafte, Goats' Hair, Gold or Silver on Thread, Cotton, Hair, Wool, or Silk, or any other Substance hereinbefore enumerated, . Grogram, Hats, Caps, or Bonnets, of Straw, Chip, Cane, or any other Material, Hemp, Hoofs, Horn and Horn Tips,

Hair of all Sorts,

Wool, Thread, or

Liquor of any Kind, in Bottles or Flasks, Lutestrings, Catlings, or Harpstrings, Maps, Mattraffes, Mats and Matting, Mohair Yarn, Nets, new or old, Paper, Packthread, Parchment, Pelts, Platting of Bast, Chip, Cane, Straw, or Horse. Hair, Quills, Rags, Sails and Sail Cloth, Silks, viz. Crapes and Tiffanies, Hulks and Knubs, Raw Silk,

Thrown and Organzine Silk, Wafte Silk Wrought Silk, Skins, Hides, and Furs, and Parts or Pieces of Skins, Hides, and Furs, whether undreffed, or in Part or wholly tanned, tawed, or dreffed, Sponges,

Straw, or any Article made or mixed with Straw. Stuckings of all Sorts, Thread,

Tow, Vellum, Whisks,

Wool, whether Raw, or anywise Wrought, Yarn of all Sorts,

and all other Goods whatever, if they shall have arrived in or with Packages confifting wholly or in Part of any of the Articles above-enumerated in this Class, unless such Goods shall be removed from such Packages as hereinafter mentioned.

XXXIV. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Expurgation of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes enumerated in Class the First, as beforementioned, after they have been removed to the Floating Lazaret, or to the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, shall proceed in the following Manner; that is to fay,

All Bales of Cotton shall be opened from one End to the other, and so much taken out as to leave Room for handling, daily, the Interior of the Bale.

The following Articles, viz. Carmenia Wool, Rags, Raw Wool, and

Goats' Wool, Hair.

'shall be taken out of the Bags or Bales, and shall be ranged in low Heaps, not above Four Feet high, and fuccessively handled and rummaged.

All Bales of Raw Silk, Silk Stracee (or Refuse),

and Silk Thrown, shall be opened on one Side from End to End, the Cords loosened, and Way made, by removing a Number of Skeins, for the Porters to handle the Interior of the Bales; and at the Expiration of Twenty Days, that Side of the Bale which has been opened being refewed, the other Side shall be ripped open, and the Contents handled and aired in the like Manner, till the Thirty-fifth Day, when the Bales shall be put in Order for Delivery

All Packages of Cotton, of Yara, of Thread, of Silk Stuffs, of Cotton Stuffs or Burdetts, of Camblets, and of Linen, shall be opened and the Piece Goods piled in Rows, Lattice Fashion, or in Pyramids, turned every Four Days, and completely fpread out and suspended on Cords for several

Days.

Cases of Paper, Books, Parchment, Cases of Sponges, and Silk and Thread Stockings, shall be entirely unpacked, and the smaller Parcels separated from each other, and so disposed as to admit of thorough Airing.

Feathers. Coral Beads in Strings, Straw Hats, Brushes, Artificial Flowers, shall be spread out in the same Manner.

Carpets, Fors.

Hides and Skins,

shall be unbaled, and each Piece shall be spread and fuspended on Cords sometimes in the open Air, and

frequently turned.

All Goods packed in or with Straw, Cotton, or any other Article enumerated in the faid First Class, or confidered as susceptible, shall be entirely taken out of or separated from the same, and carefully aired.

All Goods enumerated in the faid First Class, concerning the Expurgation of which no particular Directions have been hereinbefore given, snall be unpacked, opened, aired, and handled in like Manner, so far as may be, as is hereinbefore directed.

with regard to Goods of a fimilar Description.

XXXV. And it is hereby further ordered, That of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes which shall be imported in any Ship or Vessel arriving as abovementioned, and not furnished with clean Bills of Health, the Articles hereinafter enumerated, in Class the Second, shall in like Manner be carried to a Floating Lazaret, or to the Lazaret at Chetney-Hill, there to be unpacked, opened, or treated according to the Nature thereof, and aired for the Space of Thirty Days, viz.

#### CLASS THE SECOND.

Confishing of those Articles which are considered as liable to Infection, but in a less Degree.

Senua, Pomegranates, Flowers, Jalap, and Seeds, Gum Arabic, Sal Nitre, Tragacanth, Sal Ammoniac, Myrrh, Madder, Opium, Sumach, Scamony. Galls, Tobacco, Antimony. Cantharides, Coffee, Wood in Raspings, Allum, Juniper Berries,

XXXVI. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Expurgation of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, enumerated in the faid Second Class, shall be performed by exposing them to the Air as much as possible, and by moving them from Time to Time to as to admit of free Ventilation.

XXXVII. And it is hereby further ordered, That after the Delivery of all the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes enumerated in the two Classes before mentioned into a Floating Lazaret, or into the Lazaret at Chetney Hill, the Ship or Vessel, with the Rest of the Cargo, shall then commence and perform a Quarantine of Thirty Days, during which the Packages of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes not enumerated in either of the Classes before mentioned, remaining on board fuch Ship or Veffel, shall be frequently fwept and shifted, and moved from Time to Time as much as possible, according to the Nature thereof, so as to admit of free Ventilation; and at the Expiration of the said Thirty Days, if all Persons on board, and also all those on shore, employed in the Expurgation of that Part of the Ship's Cargo in the Lazaret; continue free from every Appearance of Infection, the Ship or Vessel, and such Part of the Crew, Passengers, and Cargo, as shall have remained on board, shall be smally sumigated

and discharged.

XXXVIII. - Provided always, That if all the Persons on board remain in Health, Dried Fruits having been shifted from Baskets or other Packages made of Articles enumerated in the faid First Class, or confidered as susceptible, when such Dried Fruits Thall have been imported in fuch Packages, may be delivered in Twenty Days; dried Fruits in Packages of Wood, in Ten Days; Barrels of Oil, the Bungs being first tarred, and the Barrels brushed and then thoroughly washed in Sea-Water, in Ten Days; Grain, Pulse, and other Seed in Bulk, on the Eleventh Day, after having been passed through an Iron Grating, in order to detect any susceptible Matter that may be mixed therewith; Grain, Pulle, and other Seeds in Sacks, or in Casks or Baskets of Rush Mat, being shifted into fresh Sacks or Packages, in like Manner on the Eleventh Day, being likewise passed through an Iron Grating. But in all Cases passed through an Iron Grating. But in all Cases where any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, shall have been shifted from such susceptible Packages as aforesaid into fresh Packages, the said susceptible Packages shall be sent to the Lazaret to perform Quarantine, according to the Nature thereof, or shall be destroyed, at the Option of the Importer.

XXXIX. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Quarantine of all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes (as well fuch as are directed to be left in, as fuch as are to be removed from, the Ship or Vessel,) in Cases where the Cargo shall consist partly of Articles enumerated in the said First and Second Classes, and partly of non-enumerated Articles, shall commence and be computed from the Day on which the Whole of the Articles enumerated in the said Two Classes shall have been removed from the Ship or Vessel importing the same, to be opened and aired in the Manner before directed, except as herein-

before particularly excepted.

XL. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Quarantine of Thirty Days to be performed by all Ships and Vessels arriving without clean Bills of Health, but with Cargoes wholly consisting of Articles considered as not susceptible of Infection, and not enumerated in either of the Two Classes before stated, shall commence, and be computed from the Day on which the Quarantine Guardians shall be put on board.

XLI. And it is hereby further ordered. That all Ships and Vessels, and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, on board thereof, arriving with suspected Bills of Health, (commonly called touched Patents or Bills,) shall respectively personn Quarantine, and be treated in the same Manner as above directed concerning Ships and Vessels arriving without clean Bills of Health, and Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, arriving in such Ships and Vessels; except only, that such Ships, Possons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, so arriving with suspected Bills of Health, shall respectively be subjected to Ten Days less Quarantine.

jected to Ten Days less Quarantine.

XIII. And it is hereby further ordered, That with respect to all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, having on board any of the Articles enumerated in the First Class before stated, and intending to import the same into any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark or Man,

from any Port or Place in Europe without the Streights, or on the Continent of America, at which there is not a regular Establishment for the Performance of Quarantine, declared sufficient by His Majelty in Council as aforefaid, the Master or other Person having Charge of every fuch Ship or Veffel is hereby required to bring with him a Declaration made by the Owner, Proprietor, Shipper, or Confignee of fuch Ship or Veffel, or of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes enumerated as aforefaid, on board the fame respectively, upon Oath before some Magistrate of the Port or Place from whence such Master or other Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Veffel shall have brought the faid Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, and attelled by such Magistrate, and also by the British Consul or Vice-Consul, or in case there shall be no British Consul or Vice Consul there, then by Two known British Merchants; in which Declaration it shall be stated either negatively, that the faid enumerated Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes are not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean; or affirmatively, of what place they are the Growth, Produce, of Manufacture; and if they are of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of any of the Countries last men-tioned, then it shall be stated in such Declaration whether the faid Ship or Vessel is or is not the same in which the enumerated Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes so imported were brought from Turkey, or from any of the Countries last mentioned; and in cale the Ship or Vellel is the same, the Master or other Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel is hereby required to bring with him the Bill or Bills of Health granted at the Port where any such Goods were originally taken on board, or Copies thereof attefted by a Notary Public; and if the Ship or Vessel having on board such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, shall be other than that in which they were imported into any Port or Place in Europe without the Streights, or on the Continent of America, at which there is not a regular Establishment for the Performance of Quarantine, declared sufficient by His Majesty in Council as aforesaid, the Master or other Person having the Charge of such Ship or Vessel is hereby required to bring with him a Declaration made and attested in like Manner as the Declaration before mentioned, in which it shall be stated whether the said enumerated Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes were imported into the Ports of the Countries last mentioned in a Ship or Vessel, with or without a clean Bill of Health; and fuch Mafter or other Person having the Charge of any fuch Ship or Veffel, if the same shall be bound to the Port of London, or to the River of Thames or Medway, shall forthwith produce such Declaration or Declarations (as the Case may be) to the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Affiltant at Standgate Creek; or if the fame shall be bound to any of the Outports or Islands aforesaid, to the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, or tothe Principal or other Officer of the Customs autho. rifed to act in that Behalf at Inch Outport or Place; and if it shall appear that none of the faid enumerated Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes on board fuch Ship or Vessel are of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary on



the Atlantic Ocean, such Ship or Vessel importing the same shall not be obliged to perform Quarantine, but shall, on Production of such Declaration to the Superintendant or his Assistant, or to the Principal or other Officer of the Customs as aforefaid, be admitted to an Entry in the usual and legal Manner; but if it shall appear that such enumerated Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, or any Part thereof, are of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of any of the Countries last mentioned, or if no such Declaration shall be produced by the Master or other Person having the Charge of such Ship or Vessel as aforesaid, then the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assissant, or the Principal or other Officer of the Customs authorised to act in that Behalf as aforesaid at the Port or Place at which fuch Ship or Vessel shall arrive, as the Case may be, shall take Care that every such Ship or Vessel, as well as the Officers, Crew, Passengers, and the entire Cargo on board the same, shall perform Quarantine, according to the Nature of the Case; at such and the same Places as are hereinbefore appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, for the fame Time, and in the same Manner as Ships and Vessels, their Officers, Crews, Passengers, and Cargoes coming from or through the M diterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, with clean Bills of Health, are hereinbefore respectively required to perform Quarantine.

XI.III. And it is hereby further ordered, That all Ships and Veffels arriving in the Ports of Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Aldereney, Sark, or Man, having come from or through the Mediterranean, or from the Well Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, which, with their Officers, Crews, Passengers, and Cargoes, shall have previously performed Quarantine in the Lazaret of Malta, Ancona, Venice, Messina, Leghorn, Genoa, or Mar-feilles, shall, upon their Arrival, be put under Quarantine in some of the Ports or Places hereinbesore appointed for the Performance of Quarantine, until the Commander, Master, or other Person having the Charge of such Ship or Vessel, shall have produced to the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Assistant, or to the Principal or other Officer of the Customs, authorized to act in that Behalf, the proper Documents to prove that such Ship or Vessel, and the Officers, Crew, Pallengers, and Cargo on board the same have duly performed Quarantine in one of the Lazarets last mentioned; and upon so producing fuch Documents the faid Ship or Vessel shall not be obliged to perform Quarantine, but shall be forthwith admitted to report, and all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes on board thereof, not hereinbefore enumerated in the First Class before stated, shall be admitted to an Entry; but all Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes on board any fuch Ship and Vessel, which are enumerated in the First Class before stated, fhall in such Case perform a surther Quarantine of Fifteen Days, at fome one of the Ports or Places hererinbefore appointed for that Purpose, in such Manner as has been heretofore practifed.

XLIV. And it is hereby further ordered, That

all Masters, or other Persons having the Charge of : any Ships or Vellels clearing outwards from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, for any Port or Place in the Mediterranean, or in the Well Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or for any

Time of fuch clearing out, be any Order of His Majesty in Council in force, subjecting Ships and Veffels coming from thence to Quarantine, shall receive from the Principal Officers of the Customs at such Port or Place, a printed Paper containing an Abstract of such Quarantine Regulatious as shall be thought necessary to be most generally notified and observed by such Masters, their Officers, Crews, and Passengers on board; and every such Master, or other Person having Charge of any such Ship or Vessel, shall cause the said printed Paper to be affixed on some convenient and conspicuous Part of his said Ship or Vessel, and there to remain so affixed until the Return of the said Ship or Vessel to some Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, provided the said Ship or Vessel shall return to Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, within Twelve

XLV. And it is hereby further ordered, That every Commander, Master, or other Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel about to fail from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, for any Port or Place in the Mediterranean, or in the West Barbary on the Atlanuc Ocean, or for any Port or Place respecting which there shall, at the Time of such clearing out, be any Order of His Majesty in Council in force, subjecting Ships and Vessels coming from thence to Quarantine, shall, before his Departure, provide and take on board one or more of the Quarantine Signal Flags and Lanthorns directed by the hereinbefore recited Act of Parliament, and likewise a proper Quantity of Materials and Instruments for Fumigation and Immersion, and shall keep the same on board, to be used in the Manner hereinbefore directed, upon the Return of such Ship or Vessel to any Port or Place in Great Britain.

XLVI. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships of War, who shall meet any Ship or Vessel liable to perform Quarantine, coming to any of the Ports of Great Britain, or of the Illands of Guernsey, Jer-fey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, shall take due Care to prevent the Landing of any Goods, Wares, Merchandizes, or Persons from on board the same, until they shall be put under the Direction of the Superintendant of Quarantine, or his Affistant, at Standgate Creek, or under the Direction of the Superintendant, or his Assistant, or the Principal or other Officer of His Majesty's Customs, authorized to act in that Behalf as aforefaid, at any of the Gut Ports or Places hereinbefore mentioned.

XLVII. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Commissioners and other Officers of His Majesty's Customs do use their utmost Diligence and Care that all Regulations for the Performance of Quarantine before directed be duly observed.

XLVIII. And it is hereby further ordered, That the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War, as likewise the Commanders of His Majesty's Forts and Garrisons lying near the Sea Coasts, and all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Chief Magistrates, Constables, Headboroughs, Tything Men, and all other Officers, and Ministers of Justice, shall be aiding and affishing to the said Superintendants of Quarantine and their Assistants, and to the Principal and other Officers of His Majefly's Customs, and to all others that shall be concerned in Port or Place respecting which there shall, at the stopping such Ships as aforesaid, and in bringing

"them to the Places appointed for the Performance of, shall have gone, or Articles have been put on board Quarantine, as well as in enforcing due Performance.

XLIX. And it is hereby further ordered, That this Order, and the Regulations herein contained, shall take Effect and be in Force from the Tenth Day of May next enfuing the Date hereof, until which Time the Orders and Regulations now fubfishing touching Quarantine shall continue in force; but which subfitting Orders and Regulations, and the Authority of the same, shall, from and after the faid Tenth Day of May, wholly cease and determine. Provided always, That the Regulation with respect to the Production of Declarations for Articles enumerated in the First Class, brought from any Port or Place in Europe, without the Streights, shall commence and take Effect on the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and five; and for the like Articles, brought from any Port or Place on the Continent of America, on the First Day of October · One thousand eight hundred and five, and not before; until which respective Times such Proof shall be required and admitted as to the Growth, Produce, and Manufacture of fuch Articles, as shall be thought expedient, and shall be directed by the Lords and others of His Majesty's Privy Council, or any Three or more of them.

L. And the Lords Commissioners of His Ma-jesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General, and the Relt of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the faid Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein-as to them may respectively apper-Steph. WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act " for making further Provision for the more effec "tual Performance of Quarantine;" it is (amongst other Things) enacted, That from and after the Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five, all Ships and Vessels, as well His Majesty's Ships of War as all others coming from, or having touched at any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Counsel, shall have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague or any other inclared it produce that the Flague or any other mefections Difease or Distemper highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty's Subjects may be brought, and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person, Goods, Westes, and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever from or out of any Ships or Vessels so coming from, or having touched at such infected Place as aforesaid, whether fuch Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or other Articles shall have come or been

the same either before or after the Arrival of such Ships or Vessels at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, and whether fuch Ships or Veliels were or were not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, and that all Perfons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any Articles whatever on board any fuch Ships or Vessels so coming from, or having touched at fuch infected Place as aforefaid, or on board of any fuch Receiving Ships, Vessels, or Boats as afore-said, shall be, and be considered to be liable to Quarantine within the Meaning of the said A&, and of any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection, from the Time of the Departure of fuch Ships or Veffels from such infected Place as aforesaid, or from the Time when fuch Persons, Goods, Wares, Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or other Articles shall have been received on board respectively, and that such Ships, Veffels, and Boats as aforefaid, and all Perfons, (as well Pilots as others,) Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforefaid, whether coming or brought in fuch thips, Veffels, or Boats from such insected Place as aforesaid, or going, or being put on board the fame, either before or after the Arrival of fuch Ships, Veffels, or Boats, at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforefaid, and all Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, on board any such Receiving Ship, Vessel, or Boat as aforefaid, shall, upon their Arrival at any such Port or Place, be obliged to perform Quarantine in such Place or Places, for such Time, and in such Manner as shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by His, or Their Order or Orders in Council notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette, and that until fuch Ships, Vessels, and Boats, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforefaid, shall have respectively performed, and shall be duly discharged from such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, or other Articles as aforefaid, or any of them, shall, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships, Vessels, or Boats at any Port or Blaze in Creat Pairing on the March of Such Portain Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforefaid, come, or to be brought on Shore, or go, or be put on board any other Ship, Veffel, or Boat, in order to come, or be brought on Shore, in any fuch Port or Place, although such Ships or Vessels, so coming from such infected Place as aforesaid, may not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain. or the Islands aforesaid, unless in such Manner, and in such Cases, and by such Licence, as shall be directed or permitted by fuch Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships, Vessels, and Boats, whether coming from fuch infected Place as aforesaid, or being otherwise liable to Quarantine as aforesaid; and all Persons (as well Pilots as others), Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforefaid, whether coming or brought in fuch Ships, brought in such Ships or Vessels, or such Persons Vessels, or Boats, or going or being put on board the

fame, either before or after the Arrival of Iuch Ships, Vessels, or Boats at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, and although such Ships, Vessels, or Boats shall not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands afore-faid; and that all Commanders, Masters, or other Persons having the Charge or Command of any such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, whether coming from any infected Place, or being otherwise liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be subject to all the Provisions, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions contained in the faid Act, or in any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majelty, His Heirs and Successors, in Council as aforefaid, concerning Quarantine and the Prevention of Infection, and to all the Pains, Penalties, Forfeitures, and Punishments contained in the faid Act for any Breach or Disobedience thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Coun-

cil, made under the Authority thereof:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date this same Fifth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and five, to direct that all Ships and Vessels, as well His Majesty's Ships of War as all others, (not having the Plague, or such other infectious Disease or Distemper as aforefaid, actually on board,) coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, with clean Bilis of Health; and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person or Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever, from or out of any fuch Ship or Vessel, before fuch Ship or Vessel should be duly discharged from Quarantine, whether such Person or Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, or other Articles as aforesaid, shall have come or been brought in such Ship or Vellel, or fuch Person or Persons shall have gone, or Articles have been put on board the lame, either before or after the Arrival of fuch Ship or Vessel, and whether such Ship or Vessel was or was not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, should, together with all Persons (as well Pilots as others), Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, on board thereof, perform such Quarantine, for such Time, in fuch Manner, and at such Places, as are therein

And whereas His Majesty was further pleased, by the faid Order in Council, to direct, That all Merchant Ships and Vessels, and all other Ships and Vessels, not having the Plague, or such other infectious Disease or Distemper as aforesaid actually on board, (except any Ship of War, Transport, or other Ship in the actual Service of Government, under the Command of a Commissioned Officer of His Majesty's Navy,) coming from, or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, which should not be furnished with clean Bills of Health, should perform Quarantine in Standgate Greek, and no where elfe; and that in case any such Merchant, or other Ship or Vessel, as aforesaid, coming from any of the Places before defcribed, and not being furnished with a clean Bill of Health, should come, or attempt to enter into any Islands aforesaid, the Principal and other Officers of

fuch Ship or Vessel to depart from thence immediately, and proceed to Standgate Creek to perform Quarantine, and that all Ships of War, Transports, and other Ships in the actual Service of Government, under the Command of Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Navy coming from any of the faid Places, and not being furnished with clean Bills of Health, should perform Quarantine at the Motherbank, in a separate and distinct Place to be appointed and marked out with Yellow Buoys for that Purpose, in the Centre of which Space a Floating Lazaret, moored with Chains, is to be stationed, with a Yellow Flag constantly slying at the Mast Head; and that all Ships, Veffels, and Boats, receiving any Person, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever, from or out of any Ships or Vessels so coming from any of the faid Places without clean Bills of Health as aforefaid, should perform the like Quarantine at Standgate Creek, or at the Mother Bank, respectively, in the same Manner as if such Receiving Ships, Vessels, or Boats had come from any of the faid Places without clean Bills of Health:

And whereas His Majesty, under the Authority of the faid hereinbefore recited Act, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth adjudge and declare it probable that the Plague, or some other infectious Disease, or Distemper highly dangerous to the Health of His Subjects, may be brought into Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernley, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, by Ships and Vessels coming from the Ports and Places hereinaster mentioned, His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, judges it necessary to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date this same Fifth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and five, upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, with or without clean Bills of Health, be extended as hereinafter directed, and that all Officers appointed for the Service of Quarantine do use their utmost Care and Diligence to cause the several Rules and Regulations established by the said hereinbesore recited Act, by the said Order in Council, dated this Fifth Dayof April One thousand eight hundred and five, and by this present Order, for the due Performance of Quarantine, to be punctually observed and carried into Execution.

And His Majesty, by and with the Advice afore-faid, doth further order, and it is hereby ordered, That all Ships and Vessels, as well His Majesty's Ships of War as all others, (not having the Plague, or such other infectious Disease or Distemper as aforesaid actually on board,) coming from the Port of Cadiz, or from any other Port of Spain without the Streights of Gibraltar, lying to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent, with or without clean Bills of Health, and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person or Persons, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever, from or out of any fuch Ship or Vessel, before fuch Ship or Vessel shall have performed, and shall of the Out Ports of Great Britain, or any of the Islands aforesaid, the Principal and other Officers of the Customs at such Port, or in such Islands, or the Governor or Chief Magistrate thereof, should cause been brought in such Ship or Vessel, or such Person

or Persons shall have gone, or Articles have been put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of such Ship or Vessel, and whether such Ship or Veffel was, or was not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, together with all Persons, (as well Pilots as others,) Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, on board thereof, do and shall persorm Quarantine for such Time, in such Manner, and at fuch Places respectively as are directed by His Mai jesty's said Order in Council, dated this Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five: and that all Commanders, Masters, and other Persons having Charge of any such Ships and Vessels, and the Officers, Crews, Passengers, and other Persons on board thereof, and also all Commanders and Masters of any such Receiving Ships, Vessels, and Boats as aforesaid, and the Officers, Crews, Passengers, and other Persons on board the same, and all other Persons who may or shall have any Intercourse or Communication with them, or any of them, do likewife strictly conform themselves, in all Respects, to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions required by the faid hereinbefore recited Act, and by the faid Order in Council, dated this Fifth Day of April; One thousand eight hundred and five, and by this present Order, to be observed by the Commanders, Masters, Officers, Crews, Passengers, and other Persons on board Ships and Vessels hable to Quarantine, and by all other Persons who shall or may have any Intercourse or Communication with them, or any

And it is hereby further ordered, That this Order, and the Regulations therein contained, shall take effect, and be in force, from the Tenth Day of May next enfuing the Date hereof, until which Time, the Orders and Regulations now sublifting touching Quarantine shall continue in force; but which subsisting Orders and Regulations, and the Authority of the same, shall from and after the said Tenth Day of May, wholly cease and determine: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General, and the rest of the Prin cipal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Sei cretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them . may respectively appertain. .
