AT the Council-Chamber, Whitehall, the 23d Day of May 1805,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intitled "An Act for establishing and maintaining a permanent Additional Force for the Defence of the Realm, and to provide for augmenting His Majesty's Regular Forces, and for the gradual Reduction of the Militia of England;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That from and after the passing of the said Act, there shall be raised in the several Counties in England, for the Year ending on the First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and five, towards supplying the Vacancies that have arisen in such Additional Force by reason of the enlisting of any Persons serving therein into His Majesty's Regular Forces, a further and additional Number of Nine Thousand Men: And it is further enacted, That His Majesty's Privy Council shall cause such Number of Nine Thousand Men to be raised for the supplying the Vacancies which have arisen from the enlisting of Men as aforesaid, in the several Counties in England, to be apportioned among such Counties according to the respective original Quotas of Men required at the Time of making such Apportionment to be raised in such respective Counties under the Acts relating to the Militia; and shall, as soon after such Apportionment shall have been made as the same can be done, cause the Numbers fixed and settled by such Apportionment to be transmitted to the respective Lieutenants of the several Counties in England, or their Vice Lieutenants, and shall also cause Notice thereof to be given in the London Gazette; and such Lieutenants, or Vice Lieutenants, shall immediately summon General and Subdivision Meetings of Lieutenancy in their respective Counties; and the Deputy Lieutenants at such Meetings shall divide and ap-

portion the Number so fixed and settled among the Hundreds in their respective Counties, and among the several Parishes of such Hundreds, according to the Provisions of the several Acts relating to the Militia, in order that such Men may, as speedily as possible, be raised for the Additional Force, under the Provisions of the said Act, His Majesty's Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Directions contained in the said Act, are thereupon pleased to apportion and divide, and do hereby apportion and divide, over the several Counties in England, the Number of Men to serve for such Counties respectively, according to the several Numbers specified in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and amounting, in the Whole, to Eight Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-five Men; and which Schedule His Majesty's Privy Council are pleased to direct shall be taken as Part of this Order, and they do hereby direct that this Order, and the Schedule thereunto annexed, be published in the London Gazette, and be transmitted to the respective Lieutenants of the several Counties in England, or their Vice Lieutenants, in order that they should proceed upon the same in pursuance of the Directions of the said Act of Parliament.

Eight Hundred Men: And it is further enacted,
That His Majesty's Privy Council shall cause such
Number of One Thousand Eight Hundred Men,
for the supplying the Vacancies arising from the en-
listing of Men as aforesaid, to be apportioned among
such Counties according to the respective original
Quotas of Men required at the Time of making such
Apportionment to be raised in such respective Coun-
ties and Stewartries under the Act relating to the
Militia; and shall, as soon after such Appor-
tionment shall have been made as the same can be done,
cause the Numbers fixed and settled by such Appor-
tionment to be transmitted to the respective Lieute-
nants of the several Counties and Stewartries in
Scotland, or their Vice Lieutenants, and shall also
cause Notice thereof to be given in the Edinburgh
Gazette; and such Lieutenants or Vice Lieutenants
shall immediately summon General and Subdivision
Meetings of Lieutenancy in their respective Coun-
ties and Stewartries; and the Deputy Lieutenants
at such Meetings shall divide and apportion the Num-
bers so fixed and settled among the Subdivisions, Pa-
rishes, Cities, or Places in their respective Counties
and Stewartries, according to the Provisions of any
Act relating to the Militia, in order that such Men
may, as speedily as possible, be raised for the Addi-
tional Force under the Provisions of this Act, His
Majesty's Privy Council, in pursuance of the said
Directions contained in the said Act, are thereupon
pleased to apportion and divide, and do hereby ap-
portion and divide, over the several Counties and
Stewartries in Scotland, the Number of Men to
serve for such Counties respectively, according to the
several Numbers specified in the Schedule hereunto
annexed, and amounting, in the Whole, to One
Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty-two Men,
and which Schedule His Majesty's Privy Council are
pleased to direct shall be taken as Part of this Order;
and they do hereby direct that this Order, and the
Schedule thereunto annexed, be published in the
Edinburgh Gazette, and be transmitted to the re-
spective Lieutenants of the several Counties and
Stewartries in Scotland, or their Vice Lieutenants,
in order that they should proceed upon the same,
in pursuance of the Directions of the said Act of
Parliament.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Dacres, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to William Marsden, Esq; dated at Port Royal, March 15, 1805.

SIR,

I ENCLOSE you, for their Lordships' Information, a Copy of a Letter this Day received, (under Cover of one from Captain Atkins, of the Seine,) acquainting me of the Rein Deer having captured a Spanish Privateer.

His Majesty's Sloop Rein Deer, off Montego Bay, 7th March 1805.

SIR,

I HAVE the Pleasure to inform you, that after a Chace of Five Hours and a Half, in Company with His Majesty's Sloop Hunter, I have captured the Spanish Schooner Privateer Santa Rosalia Galundrina, commanded by Francisco de Naras, having on board Fifty-seven Men.

Previous to our falling in with her, she appears to have mounted Three Guns, which were thrown overboard during the Chace, (one of Eight and a Half and Two of Four Pounds Calibre,) and has on board Musketry for the Whole of her Crew.

She sails remarkably fast; is victualled for Fourteen Days; left Caliodam, in Cuba, Yesterday, but belongs to St. Jago; has taken nothing during her Cruise.

The Privateer I have sent into Port Royal, under the Protection of His Majesty's Sloop Hunter, with the greatest Part of her Crew, having only Fifteen remaining on board the Rein Deer.

SIR,

THE enclosed Copy of a Letter from Captain Impey, of His Majesty's Sloop Epervier, which I send for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty gives an Account of the Capture of a small French Privateer.

SIR, Epervier, Tortola, Jan. 31, 1805.

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, that on the 26th Instant, Crab Island bearing North, Two Leagues, I saw a suspicious Sail to the Southward, and after a Chace of Five Hours in His Majesty's Sloop under my Command, came up with, and captured L'Elizabeth French Schooner Privateer, belonging to Mariagalante, mounting Four Carriage Guns, with Muskets, Pistols, Cutlasses, &c. and manned with Thirty-four Men, one of whom was killed by their obstinate Attempt to escape. The Schooner had previously taken a Sloop, belonging to Tortola, and sent her into St. Thomas.

For the Security of that Constitution we will not cease to labour, by inculcating upon all those who are committed to our Charge, Submission to the Laws, a just Veneration for constituted Authorities, and disinterested Zeal for the common Welfare.

The renewed Appointment of Lord Napier to represent your Royal Person in this Assembly, is a most pleasing Mark of your Majesty's Paternal Indulgence. The Experience which we have had of his Wisdom and Integrity—His Love of his Country, and Zeal in whatever concerns the Interests of Religion and Virtue, make your Majesty's Choice on this Occasion most acceptable to us.

We rely with Gratitude and Confidence on the Assurance, which your Majesty is pleased to repeat of your unalterable Resolution to maintain the Church of Scotland, in the full Possession and Enjoyment of all its Rights and Privileges, as by Law established.

Your Royal Donation of One Thousand Pounds, to be employed for propagating our Christian Faith in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, we receive with the warmest Gratitude, as a Pledge of your Majesty's Confidence in us, and of your Zeal for the Interests of Religion and Virtue, and we shall study to apply it in the most prudent and effectual Manner, for promoting the pious Purpose for which it is bestowed.

That Almighty God, the Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ, may protect your Majesty's Person, establish your Government, and prosper your Administration; that He may bless abundantly our gracious Queen, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Members of your illustrious House; that He may long continue to us the Blessings which we enjoy under your Reign; and that He may bestow on you hereafter a heavenly Crown, are the Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, Your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in our General Assembly, desire to approach the Throne, in the present Circumstances of National Danger, for the Purpose of expressing our affectionate and zealous Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

Deeply impressed with a Sense of the invaluable Blessings which our Country has so long enjoyed under the Operation of equal Laws, and under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Reign, we cannot look without much Anxiety to the Progress of a War, in which the avowed Design of our inveterate Foe is the Subversion of our Liberty and Independence. And we lament that the Conduct of another Nation, under the Influence of the Enemy with whom we chiefly contend, has at length rendered it indispensable for your Majesty to extend still more widely the Scene of this arduous Contest; yet it is impossible not to

perceive, in the present Condition of that Nation, and of other States that have yielded to the same domineering Foe, the most decisive Evidence that our Safety, under God, depends upon a Spirit of vigorous and determined Resistance, proportioned to whatever shall be the Difficulties, and the necessary Duration, of the War in which we are engaged.

As Servants of the God of Peace, we rejoiced to hear that a Pacific Overture had been received by your Majesty. But, while we repose entire Confidence in your Majesty's Councils, for acceding at any Time to such Terms of Peace as may be consistent with the permanent Safety and Interests of the British Empire, we cannot forget that these Objects are intimately connected with the general Security and Independence of Europe, and that the Maintainance of our National Honour is indispensable to our National Safety. We, therefore, congratulate your Majesty on the patriotic Zeal, so universally manifested by your Subjects, as the best Pledge of our ultimately rising Superior to the Power of our enemies. And, feeling ourselves, in some Measure, responsible for those under our Charge, we have much Satisfaction in assuring your Majesty of the confirmed Loyalty, and ardent Patriotism of the People of Scotland.

We are proud to think that, notwithstanding the extensive Preparations that were early made for the Invasion of our Coasts, the Enemy has been hitherto deterred from the Attempt, by the well-known State of our National Defence, and the unexampled Ardour that has been manifested in our Country's Cause; and, if the Perseverance of our Countrymen shall be equal to their Ardour, we are confident that, under God, we shall remain a Free and Independent People.

While we look, therefore, to the Great Arbitrer of Nations, for his continued Protection, we feel that no other worldly Object is, in such Circumstances, entitled to stand in Competition with an unremitted Discharge of our Duty to our Country. We pledge ourselves to our King, in the Presence of God, that we shall be unceasing in our Endeavours to impress upon the People under our Charge an indelible Sense of what they owe to our National Cause. And we hope, to whatever Period the destructive Machinations of our Enemies may be protracted, it will be found that Britons are not unprepared to defend an Inheritance derived from Men who thought it worthy to be purchased with their Blood, and who have left to us but in Trust for the Generations that are yet to come.

That Almighty God may continue to bless the Means employed for our National Defence; that He may guide your Majesty's Councils, and give Success to your Fleets and Armies; that He may soon restore to us the Blessings of an honorable and permanent Peace; that your Majesty may long reign over a free and loyal People, and that you may, at length, exchange an earthly for a heavenly Crown, are the fervent Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful, most faithful, and most obedient Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

It is enacted, That it should be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (B), and which shall be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the Joint Locks of the Crown and the London Dock Company, in any Warehouse or Warehouses erected or to be erected, situate within the Premises belonging to the London Dock Company, without Payment at the Time of the first Entry of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, of the Duties of Customs or Excise due on the Importation thereof, subject nevertheless to the Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions therein contained; provided that no such Goods, Wares, or Merchandize should be so lodged, or secured, unless and until such Warehouses or other Works belonging, or to belong thereto, should be so far compleated that, in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, the same shall be fit and proper, in every Respect, for the Reception of such Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and wherein the same might respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions in the said Act contained; and the said Lord High Treasurer, or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand, or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of such Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times, at least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London. And whereas the Table marked (B), above referred to, is in the Words following; viz. Table (B)

A List of Articles which (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, or not being imported from the West Indies) may be secured in Warehouses within the Premises belonging to the London Dock Company, without the Duties due on the Importation thereof being first paid,

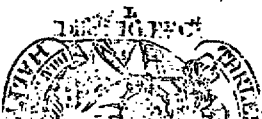
