The Conduct of Captain Lindlay, of His Majefty's zzd Regiment, has been reprefented to me as highly meritorious; I lament to add that this gallant Officer is likewise wounded.

It is unneceffary for me to detail more fully the Conduct of Individuals on" a Service where Merit has been, throughout all Ranks, fo eminently confpicuous; but I feel it my Duty to draw your Lordship's Attention to the Services rendered by Lieutenant Colonel Horsford, commanding the Artillery, to whole professional Knowledge and Activity throughout this Siege, and on every other Occafion, I feel infinitely indebted, as well as to the whole of that Corps, for their fpirited and unremitted Exertions.

The Officers of the Engineer Department, Captain Robertfon and Lieutenant Smith, have peculiar Merit, and are entitled to my beft Thanks and Approbation.

The Corps of Pioneers, under the Orders of Captain Swinton, command my warmeft Praile, for the Chearfulnels with which they performed their labo-rious Duties, and particularly for the Alacrity they difplayed on the Night of the 23d Inftant. Too much Credit cannot be beftowed on Captain Swinton, who on this and every former Occasion has been most zealous and active. I am forry to add that this excellent Officer is feverely wounded, as is Lieutenant Forreft, of the fame Corps, whole Conduct was equally meritorious.

Your Lordship will, I am confident, receive much Pleafure in learning the highly exemplary Conduct of the Three Corps of British Cavalry in Camp, the whole of whom volunteered their Services as working Parties for the Trenches and Batteries, and afsifted very materially in accelerating our Operations against this Place; they have received my fincere Thanks for their Exertions, and for a Zeal fo honorable to the British Character.

I have the Honor to enclose Returns of the Killed and Wounded during the Siege, and on the Night of the Aflault, with a Return of the captured Ordnance, &c.

The Fugitives, compoled of the Rajah of Burtpore's Battalions, and his Garrifon, with the Remainder of Jeswunt Rao Holkar's Infantry, appeared generally to have taken the Direction of Burtpore. By every Information, great Numbers have deferted, and I do not imagine they will again attempt to oppofe us. I shall move towards Burtpore as foon as poffible.

Before I conclude this Difpatch, I beg Leave to mention to your Lordship the very spirited Conduct of Mr. Metcalf, of the Civil Service. He volunteered to accompany the florming Party, and was, I am informed, among the foremost who ascended the Breach.
