P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this Day ordered by His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that from and after the First Day of December next, or upon the Publication of a Proclamation to that Effect within each Colony, it shall not be lawful, except by special Licence as hereinafter-mentioned, for any Slave or Slaves to be landed upon any of the Coasts, or imported or brought into any of the Ports, Harbours, Creeks, or Roads, or within the Limits, Jurisdictions, and Territories of any of the Settlements, Islands, Colonies, or Plantations on the Continent of America, or in the West Indies, which have been surrendered to His Majesty's Arms during the present War, until further Order, upon Pain that all Slaves so landed, imported, or brought, contrary to the true Intent and Meaning of this Order, together with the Vessels bringing in the same, or from which the same shall be landed, and their Cargoes, shall become forfeited to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors: But whereas it may be expedient to permit the Annual Introduction of a limited Number of Slaves, under due Regulations, for the Purpose of supplying any Waste that shall take place in the Population on particular Estates from extraordinary or unavoidable Causes, and thereby of keeping up the Cultivation of the Lands already cleared and cultivated; it is therefore ordered, that any Number of Slaves, not exceeding Three for every Hundred of the whole Number of Slaves in the said Settlements, Islands, Colonies, and Plantations respectively, (Returns of the Number whereof shall be made from Time to Time, in pursuance of Instructions to be transmitted by One of Our Principal Secretaries of State,) may be imported in each Year, (provided Casualties to that Extent shall appear to have taken place in the preceding Year,) under Licences to be previously granted by the Go-

vernor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the said Settlements, Islands, Colonies, and Plantations, from any other of His Majesty's Colonies in the West Indies, into the said Settlements, Islands, Colonies, and Plantations respectively; such Licence, or a Copy thereof, to be produced by the Master of the Ship on which such Slaves are laden, as his Authority for having Slaves on board destined to the Settlements, &c. as aforesaid: Provided always, that, until the First Day of January, One thousand eight hundred and seven, such limited Importation may be made from other Places than His Majesty's Colonies in the West Indies as aforesaid, and without its being necessary for the Master of the Vessel, if met with at Sea, to produce the said Licence, or a Copy thereof, as his Authority for having the said Slaves, destined as aforesaid, on board; but subject, nevertheless, to such Licence being first had and obtained as aforesaid, before any Slaves shall be permitted to be landed or sold from such Vessel in any of the said Settlements: And whereas special Instructions will be immediately transmitted by One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State to the Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, or Officers administering the Government of the said Colonies, Settlements, and Plantations respectively, containing the Regulations proper for carrying this Order into effectual Execution, directing and empowering them to grant Licences for the Importation of such limited Numbers of Slaves as aforesaid, subject to such Regulations as in the said Instructions will be provided:—It is His Majesty's further Order, that such Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or other Officer as aforesaid, shall be, and they are hereby respectively authorized and empowered to grant such Licences, upon such Terms and Conditions, and subject to such Regulations, as, in Conformity to, and in Furtherance of, the Object of such Instructions, may, from Time to Time, be required;—and it is hereby further ordered, that the Prohibition hereinbefore contained shall not extend to prevent the importing and land-

ing of any Slaves which shall be imported into the said Colonies, Islands, and Plantations by Licence first had for importing the same, under the Hand and Seal of His Majesty's Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Colony, Settlement, or Plantation into which such Slaves are to be imported, specifying the Ship or Vessel permitted to import the same, in Conformity with the Instructions to be received from One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State as aforesaid; but that all Slaves, except such Slaves as may form Part of the Crew of any Vessels, or may be Household Servants to the Passengers therein, which shall be landed without such Licence as aforesaid, and without conforming to such Regulations as shall be contained therein, shall, together with the Vessels bringing the same, or from which the same shall be landed, and their Cargoes, become forfeited to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors.

And in case any Vessel shall contain more Slaves than the Number permitted to be imported in such Vessel by any such Licence or Licences, such Number of the most valuable of the Slaves on board such Vessel, (other than such Slaves as may form Part of the Crew of such Vessel, or may be Household Servants to the Passengers,) as shall be equal to the Excess beyond the Number mentioned in such Licence or Licences, shall be forfeited to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, and shall be selected and disposed of in such Manner as may be in that Behalf directed by any Instructions from One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to be given to the respective Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, or other Officers administering the Government of such Colonies, Settlements, and Plantations as aforesaid:—And it is hereby further ordered and provided, that nothing herein contained shall be extended, or construed to extend, to the landing, importing, or bringing in of any Slave or Slaves from or by any Vessel, which, by Stress of Weather, or by any other Peril, shall be driven on the Coast of any such Colony, Settlement, or Plantation, or compelled to take Refuge on such Coast, or within the Creeks and Harbours of such Colonies, Settlements, or Plantations; provided the Slave or Slaves which shall be so imported, landed, or brought in, as last aforesaid, shall be exported to some Place or Places other than any of the Colonies, Settlements, or Plantations to which this Order applies, within Ten Days from the importation, landing, or bringing in of the same, unless further detained by Stress of Weather; or provided the same shall, within such Ten Days, be sold under the special Licence of the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Colony, Settlement, or Plantation where such Slaves may be, to such Person or Persons as, under the Circumstances of his, her, or their Cases, (which Circumstance shall be inserted in such special Licence,) may, at

the Date hereof, be entitled to obtain a Licence or Licences to import such Number of Slaves as he, she, or they shall, in and by such special Licence or Licences, be permitted to purchase; and the Right Honorable Viscount Castlereagh, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, shall give all necessary Directions herein accordingly.

And it is hereby further ordered and declared, that One Third of every Forfeiture which shall accrue, in consequence of this Order, to His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, shall be granted to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Officer administering the Government of the Colony, and One Third to the Party who shall inform and prosecute for the same.

And it is hereby further ordered, that all Sales of Slaves, imported after Notice being published to that Effect by the Officer administering the Government of the Colony, shall be made publicly in the Presence of some Officer of the Customs, and the Returns thereof shall be kept according to the Regulations which shall be prescribed for that Purpose, in pursuance of the Directions to be transmitted for that Purpose by Viscount Castlereagh, as above mentioned:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For pardoning such Seamen and Marines as have deserted, and shall return into His Majesty's Service on or before the Tenth Day of October next.

WHEREAS We are desirous to give all due Encouragement to such Seamen as may have deserted from any of Our Ships since the Sixteenth Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and three, and shall be willing to return to Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Deserters as shall repair on board any of Our Ships or Vessels on or before the Tenth Day of October next: and We do hereby further promise Our most gracious Pardon to all such Seamen as, having deserted, are now belonging to some one of Our Ships; and We do also hereby promise Our most gracious Pardon to all Marines who may have deserted from Our Service since the said Sixteenth Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and three, and shall, on or before the said Tenth Day of October next, surrender themselves at the Headquarters of the Royal Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to any Recruiting Party of Our said Forces; and We do hereby declare, that all Seamen and Royal Marines, so surrendering themselves as aforesaid, shall be released and discharged from all Prosecutions, Imprisonments, and Penalties, commenced or incurred by reason of any such Offences, but that such Pardon

shall not entitle Deserters, whether Seamen or Marines, to any Arrears of Pay forfeited by such Desertion; and We do hereby further declare, that all such Deserters, whether Seamen or Marines, who shall not, on or before the said Tenth Day of October next, surrender themselves on board One of Our Ships or Vessels of War, or at the Head-Quarters of the Royal Marines established at Portsmouth, Plymouth, or Chatham, or to some Recruiting Party of the said Forces, or who shall hereafter absent themselves from the Ships to which they belong, or from the Marine Quarters, without Leave from their Commanding Officers, shall be tried at a Court Martial, and, being found guilty, shall be deemed unfit Objects of Our Royal Mercy, and shall suffer the Punishment of Death, or such other Punishment as they shall be condemned to suffer by Sentence of the said Court.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for making further Provision for the effectual Performance of Quarantine," it is, amongst other Things enacted, That whereas certain Sorts of Goods and Merchandize are more especially liable to retain Infection, and may be brought from Places infected into other Countries, and from thence imported into Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, all such Goods and Merchandize as shall be particularly specified for that Purpose in any Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors in Council, concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection as aforesaid, which shall be brought or imported into any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, from any foreign Country or Place, in any Ship or Vessel whatever, and the Ships or Vessels in which the same shall be brought, and also all Ships and Vessels which shall arrive from any Port or Place whatever, under any alarming or suspicious Circumstances as to Infection, shall be subject and liable to such Regulations and Restrictions as shall be made by such Order or Orders of His Majesty, his Heirs, or Successors in Council as aforesaid, respecting the same: And whereas Rags are an Article more especially liable to retain Infection; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to order, That upon the Importation of any Rags into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Islands aforesaid, whether the Ships in which such Rags shall be imported shall be subject to Quarantine or not, such Rags shall in all Cases (except as hereafter excepted and provided) be subject to the Performance of special Quarantine, and shall be unpacked, opened, and aired on board the Lazaret in Standgate Creek, or on board Lighters, or other proper Vessels at the Out-Ports, (as the Case may

be,) for the Space of Forty Days before the same are discharged; provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that in case such Rags shall have been imported in any Ship or Vessel coming from the Ports of Hambro' or Bremen, or from any of the Ports to the Northward thereof; and in case a special Declaration, authenticated upon Oath, and certified in the Mode directed by Sec. 42, of His Majesty's Order in Council of the Fifth Day of April last, respecting the Quarantine of Goods enumerated in the First Class of the said Order, and brought from any Port or Place in Europe without the Streights, or on the Continent of America, at which there is not a regular Establishment for the Performance of Quarantine, declared sufficient by His Majesty in Council for that Purpose, shall have been produced to the Superintendent of Quarantine at Standgate Creek, or to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Out-Ports of this Kingdom, (as the Case may be,) shewing that such Rags are brought from the Port where the same have been shipped, and are the Produce of, or collected from such Port, or the Interior of the Country, and have undergone the Process there usual of having been stacked; and if such Rags shall, as soon as they can be come at, be taken out of the Ship importing the same, and be put on board Lighters, (in case the said Ship is bound to the Port of London,) to be sent to Standgate Creek, or (if bound to any of the Out-Ports,) to be sent to the Quarantine Station appointed for such Ports respectively, to be there unpacked, opened, and aired for the Space of Fifteen Days; and if the same shall be cleaned Rags, then, after having been so unpacked, opened, and aired as aforesaid, for the Space of Fifteen Days, such Rags shall be discharged:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors and Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

A LETTER from the Governor-General and Council, dated Fort William, 24th March 1805, has been received at the East India House, containing the following Accounts from Lord Lake of the Operations of the British Army in India:

Letter from General Lord Lake, Commander in Chief, to Marquis Wellesley, Governor-General, &c. dated Head-Quarters, Camp before Bhuripore, 21st January 1805.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the Honor to inform your Lordship, that the Breach appearing in a sufficient State of forwardness, I determined to attempt the Place again * this Afternoon. The Storming Party moved out of the Trenches, where they had been lodged for the Purpose, a little before Three o'Clock. I

am sorry to add, that the Ditch was found so broad and deep, that every Attempt to pass it proved unsuccessful, and the Party was obliged to return to the Trenches without effecting their Object. The Troops behaved with their usual Steadiness; but I fear, from the heavy Fire they were unavoidably exposed to for a considerable Time, that our Loss has been severe. I shall have the Honor to forward Returns of the Killed and Wounded as soon as possible. I have the Honor to be, &c.

Letter from Lord Lake to the Governor-General, dated Head-Quarters, Camp before Bhurtpore, 23d January 1805.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the Honor to inform your Lordship, that I, Yesterday Morning, detached the 1st Regiment of Native Cavalry, and the 1st Battalion 15th Regiment, under the Command of Captain Welsh, of the former Corps, to meet a Convoy of Provisions, on its Way from Muttra to my Camp. The Detachment having, Yesterday Evening, joined the Convoy, halted for the Night about Six Cols from my Camp, and moved again at an early Hour this Morning. The Detachment was attacked on its March by a very considerable Body of Infantry with Guns, and the Whole of the united Force of Cavalry belonging to Holkar, Ameer Khan, and Bappoojee Scindiah, about Four Cols from Camp, which obliged them to occupy a Village, for the

Purpose of collecting the Convoy, and preserving it from the numerous Cavalry of the Enemy. Immediately on hearing the Firing, I ordered Lieutenant-Colonel Need, with His Majesty's 27th Light Dragoons, and the 2d Regiment of Native Cavalry, to proceed to the Relief of the Party, whilst I followed with the Main Body of the Cavalry of the Army. I have the Pleasure to inform your Lordship, that the Detachment under Captain Welsh made a most gallant Defence; and immediately, on the Approach of Lieutenant-Colonel Need, they moved out of the Village, charged, and totally routed the Enemy to whom they were opposed. Great Numbers of the Enemy were killed; and nearly Forty Stands of Colours, and all the Artillery they had in the Field, consisting of Four Guns, with their Tumbrils, fell into our Hands. This Body of Infantry was commanded by Ameer Khan, who, according to the Information I have received from some of his Servants who were made Prisoners, was so closely pressed, that, to prevent himself from being known, he stripped himself of his Clothes and Arms, and is supposed to have escaped in that Situation; some Accounts render it probable that he has fallen, but on this Subject I have no certain Information. Ameer Khan's Palanquin, with a complete Suit of Armour, said to be his, has been brought into Camp, as has also Bappoojee Scindiah's Palanquin. Too much Praise cannot be bestowed on the Troops engaged, for their good Conduct and Activity on this Occasion; and I feel infinitely indebted to Captain Welsh, who commanded the Escort, for the Gallantry with which he resisted the repeated Attacks of a numerous Enemy. Lieutenant-Colonel Need is likewise entitled to my best Thanks, for the Activity and Spirit with which he charged and completed the Rout of the Enemy, whose Loss has been very great. I feel it particularly incumbent on me to mention the Service rendered by Major Salkeld, the Deputy Quarter Master-General, who carried my Orders to Lieutenant-Colonel Need, and proceeded to point out the Road to that Officer; his Services on this, as on every Occasion, have been most conspicuous for Zeal and Gallantry. I want Words to express to your Lordship how infinitely I feel indebted to this meritorious Officer for the Assistance he has rendered me in every Instance where I have had an Opportunity of availing myself of his Services. I am happy to add, that our Loss on this Occasion has not been considerable. Lieutenant Gordon, of the 15th Native Infantry, and Cornet Erskine, of the 1st Native Cavalry, have been wounded, but I hope not dangerously. The Number of Privates wounded does not exceed Twenty, and I believe only Two Men have been killed. I have the Honor to be, &c.

Letter from Lord Lake to the Governor-General, dated Head-Quarters, Camp before Bhurtpore, 21st February 1805.

MY LORD,

MY Dispatch of the 20th will have informed your Lordship of our Failure on that Day, in an Attempt to carry Bhurtpore by Assault.

I have now the Honor to detail, for your Lordship's Information, the Plans that were formed to ensure, if possible, the Success of the Attempt.



The Storming Party under the Orders of Lieutenant-Colonel Don, was formed of the greater Part of the European Force belonging to the Bengal Army, and Three Battalions of Sepoys.

One Column composed of Two Hundred of His Majesty's 86th Regiment, from the Bombay Division, and the 1st Battalion 8th Regiment Bengal Native Infantry, under Captain Grant, of the former Corps, was ordered to attack the Enemy's Trenches and Guns outside the Town, whilst a Third Column, composed of Three Hundred Men of His Majesty's 65th Regiment, and Two Battalions of Bombay Sepoys, marched to attack the Beem Narain Gate, which, from every Report I had received, was easy of Access for Guns, &c.

The Signal for the Storming Party to move out was the Commencement of Captain Grant's Attack on the Enemy's Trenches, which took place a little before Four o'Clock in the Afternoon.

Captain Grant's Column was completely successful, and got immediate Possession of the Enemy's Guns, Eleven in Number, all of which have been brought into Camp. The gallant Conduct of Captain Grant and his Party merits every Praise.

I am sorry to say, that neither of the other Columns succeeded. Lieutenant-Colonel Don's was unfortunately delayed by some unexpected Circumstances, and on its Arrival at the Ditch, it was found to contain such a Depth of Water as to render it impossible to gain the Breach. The Troops immediately attempted to ascend by the Bastion, but the Obstacles they met with were of so serious a Nature, that their utmost Efforts were unsuccessful, though the Colours of the 12th Native Infantry were planted within a short Distance of the Top.

The Column from the Bombay Division, under Lieutenant-Colonel Taylor, notwithstanding every Exertion, could not effect their Object. They were considerably delayed on their March by a large Body of the Enemy's Horse; and, by a Mistake on the Part of their Guide, were very early exposed to a most heavy and destructive Fire from the Town, which, by destroying their Ladders, rendered the Attempt on the Gate impracticable, and obliged Lieutenant-Colonel Taylor to draw his Men under Cover, until he received Orders to return to Camp.

I feel it my Duty to assure your Lordship, that though unfortunately not crowned with Success, the Exertions of Colonel Don were meritorious and gallant in the extreme, and I feel under infinite Obligations to this Officer.

Letter from Lord Lake to the Governor General, dated Head-Quarters, Camp before Bhurtpore, 22d February 1805.

MY LORD,

MY Dispatch of Yesterday's Date will have conveyed to your Lordship Intelligence of our want of Success in a Fourth Attempt made to carry this Place by Assault.

As it appeared that our Failure on the 20th was to be accounted for in a great Measure, by the Occurrence of unexpected Accidents and Delays, as Part of the Corps who formed the Storming Party

had surmounted the principal Difficulty, and had nearly gained the Summit of the Bastion, where I was informed a few Hours more battering would render the Ascent perfectly easy, I determined to make another Attempt Yesterday.

The Party for this Service consisted of the Whole European Force, and Two Battalions of Native Infantry of the Bengal Army, and the greater Part of His Majesty's 65th and 86th Regiments, and the Grenadier Battalion and Flank Companies of the 1st Battalion 3d Regiment, from the Bombay Division. The Whole moved on to the Attack about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, under the Command of the Honorable Brigadier Monson.

The Troops, most confident of Success, commenced the Attack, and persevered in it for a considerable Length of Time, with the most determined Bravery; but their utmost Exertions were not sufficient to enable them to gain the Top of the Breach. The Bastion, which was the Point of Attack, was extremely steep, the Resistance opposed to them was vigorous, and as our Men could only mount by small Parties at a Time, the Advantages were very great on the Side of the Enemy. Discharges of Grape, Logs of Wood, and Pots filled with combustible Materials, immediately knocked down those who were ascending, and the whole Party, after being engaged in an obstinate Contest for Two Hours, and suffering very severe Loss, were obliged to relinquish the Attempt, and retire to our Trenches.

I have to lament the Loss of very many gallant Officers and Men, as will appear to your Lordship by the accompanying Return of Killed and Wounded on this Occasion.

It is with sincere Grief I inform your Lordship, that among the Killed is my Aide-de Camp, Major Menzies, of His Majesty's 80th Regiment, who proceeded with the Storming Party, and fell whilst, among the foremost, he was making the most heroic Exertions to ascend the Breach. I feel sincere Sorrow for his Loss, no less on Account of the great Regard I entertained for his private Worth, than from the high Estimation in which I held his Merits as an Officer.

The Honorable Colonel Monson, to whom the Conduct of the Attack was entrusted, made every possible Exertion, and has received my best Thanks for his uncommon Gallantry and Perseverance on that Occasion.

Though the Troops were unable to effect their Object, I am happy to assure your Lordship, that they have on no Occasion displayed greater Steadiness. Those of the Bengal Army supported their former Character, and the Bombay Division displayed a Degree of Resolution and Discipline, which entitles them to my highest Praise and Approbation.

Letter from Lord Lake to the Governor-General, dated Head Quarters, Camp before Bhurtpore, 9th March 1805.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the Satisfaction to transmit, for your Lordship's Information, Copy of a Dispatch from Major General Smith, announcing his complete Success in an Attack on Meer Khan's Force near the Town of Ufzulghur, on the 2d Instant. The indefatigable Perseverance of Major-General Smith, in his Pursuit of the Enemy since he first crossed the Jumna, entitles that Officer to my best Thanks and Approbation; and his Mode of conducting the Attack on the 2d Instant, under Circumstances of peculiar Difficulty; and after a very long March, must ever reflect on him the highest Credit. The Cavalry appear, on this Service, to have maintained, in an eminent Degree, that high Character for Intrepidity and Discipline, which they have so successfully displayed on every former Occasion; and the Conduct of both Officers and Men has been represented to me, by Major-General Smith, as highly meritorious. Your Lordship will perceive, with much Satisfaction, that our Loss on this Occasion has not been heavy, and that the wounded Officers are likely to do well.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to inform you, that, on our March Yesterday Morning, in Pursuit of Meer Khan, I received Intelligence that he, with his whole Force, was encamped at Ufzulghur. I left the Baggage of the Detachment at Sherkot, with the Rear Guard, and the 3d Regiment Native Cavalry, with its Galloper Guns, under the Command of Major Doveton, for its Protection, and with the Remainder of the Force under my Command, moved on to Ufzulghur. After a March of Fourteen Cofs, we came in Sight of the Enemy at Two P. M. They were drawn up in Order of Battle, and prepared to receive us. The Detachment having forded a River in the Face of the Enemy, were formed into Two Lines. The Advanced Guard, under the Command of Captain Philpot, was intended for the Protection of the Right, and the Irregular Horse, under Mr. Skinner, for the Protection of the Left Flanks. As our Army advanced, the Enemy advanced also. Two Bodies of Cavalry, one led by Meer Khan, and the other by Shuamut Khan, at-

tempted to penetrate our Flanks, but were repulsed with Loss. A Body of Alee-Gholes moved on in a very daring Manner upon our Line: they were charged by a Squadron of His Majesty's 8th Light Dragoons, and a Squadron of His Majesty's 27th Light Dragoons, and were completely destroyed. After the Destruction of the Infantry, the Cavalry of the Enemy fled in every Direction. They were pursued beyond the Town of Ufszulghur. The Enemy's Baggage had been sent off in the Morning, when first they received Intelligence of our Approach; their Flight was therefore unincumbered, and the Fatigue which our Horses had sustained, the late Hour of the Day, and the Nature of the Country, prevented a farther Pursuit. Above Thirty of the Enemy's Colours fell into our Hands; among the Number are Two golden Standards, which were carried by the Yekus, a Body of chosen Men attached to the Person of Meer Khan. Three of Meer Khan's principal Sirdars, Mohamed-Sauzed Khan, Jumsher Khan, and Moortuza Khan, were killed; his Brother, Shuhmut Khan, and Ruhmut Khan, one of his principal Sirdars, are stated to have been wounded; Gholam Ulee Khan, a principal Sirdar, was wounded, and is now in our Camp; Meer Khan himself escaped, but the best and bravest of his Troops suffered. I feel infinitely indebted to the Whole of the Officers and Men under my Command, for their gallant, ready, and praise-worthy Conduct. I have the Honor to enclose a Return of our Loss. The Wounds received by the Officers, are, I am sorry to say, severe, but I trust not dangerous. I shall continue to pursue the Enemy in whatever Direction they may proceed.

ON the 24th of February, the Commander in Chief took up a new Position on the North East Side of Bhurtpore; and His Excellency is prepared to recommence Operations against that Place as soon as he shall have received Supplies of Stores and

Ammunition, which are advancing towards the Army from the Stations within the Company's Provinces at which they had been collected. The Commander in Chief expresses a confident Hope of obtaining Possession of Bhurtpore before the Conclusion of the Season for active Military Operations in that Quarter of India.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Mudge, of His Majesty's late Ship Blanche, to William Marsden, Esq; dated on board the French National Ship Topaze, 22d July 1805.

SIR,

I AM sorry to inform you of the Loss of His Majesty's Ship Blanche, which was captured by a French Squadron, as per Margin*; but, thank God, she was not destined to bear French Colours, or to assist the Fleet of the Enemy.

On Friday Morning, July 19th, in Lat. 20 Deg. 20 Min. N., Long. 66 Deg. 44 Min. W. (Weather hazy) at Eight, Four Sail were seen off the Weather Cat-Head, Three Ships, and a Brig on the opposite Tack, under easy Sail. I kept to the Wind until we were near enough to distinguish Colours. I then made the necessary Signals to ascertain whether they were Enemies. At Ten, when a breeze, about Three Miles distant, they all bore up, and hoisted English Ensigns; but, from the Make of the Union, and Colour of the Bunting, with other Circumstances, I concluded they were French, and therefore determined to sell the Ship as dearly as possible (for sailing was out of the question, the Blanche having little or no Copper on these last Nine Months, and sailed very heavy). Having brought to, with the Mainsail in the Brails, at Eleven the Commodore ranged up within Two Cables' Length, shifted his Colours, and gave us his Broadside. When within Pistol-shot she received our's;—the Action became warm and steady, the Ships never without Hail of each other, running large, under easy Sail,—Le Departement des Landes on the Starboard Quarter, and the Two Corvettes close a stern. At Forty-five Minutes past Eleven the Ship became ungovernable, and was reduced to a perfect Wreck; the Sails totally destroyed, Ten Shot in the Foremast (expecting it to fall every Minute), the Mainmast and Rigging cut to Pieces, Seven Guns dismounted, and the Crew reduced to One Hundred and Ninety, and the rest falling fast, with no Probability of Escape, I called a Council of Officers for their Opinion, who deemed it only sacrificing the Lives of the Remainder of as brave a Crew as ever fought, to hold out longer, as there was not the smallest Prospect of Success, I there-

fore, at Twelve, ordered the Colours to be struck, and was immediately hurried on board the Commodore. At Six, the Officers, who had Charge of the *Blanche*, returned, and reported the Ship to be sinking fast, on which she was fired; and, in about an Hour after, she sunk, for the Magazine had been some Time under Water.

Thus, Sir, fell the *Blanche*, and I trust, the Defence made by her Officers and gallant Crew, will meet their Lordships' Approbation.
