ON the Morning of Wednesday next, the 4th of September, the Remains of His late Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester will be removed from Gloucester-House to Windsor, where they will be privately interred in the Vault built by Order of His Royal Highness, for himself and Family, in the Choir near the Sovereign's Stall, within the Royal Chapel of Saint George; in which Vault the Remains of Her late Highness the Princess Caroline Augusta Maria, youngest Daughter of His Royal Highness, were deposited on the 22d of March 1775.

ORDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Sunday the 1st of September next, for His late Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, His Majesty's Brother, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, plain Muslin, or Long Lawn, Crape, or Love Hoods, Black Silk Shoes, Black glazed Gloves, and Black Paper Fans.

Undrefs, Black or dark Grey unwatered Tabbies.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Cloth without Buttons on the Sleeves or Pockets, plain Muslin or Long Lawn Cravats and Weepers, Black Swords and Buckles.

Undrefs, dark Grey Frocks.

*The Earl Marshal's Order for a General Mourning for His late Royal Highness William Henry Duke of Gloucester.*

IN pursuance of His Majesty's Commands, these are to give public Notice, that it is expected that, upon the present Occasion of the Death of His late Royal Highness William Henry Duke of Gloucester, all Persons do put themselves into decent

Mourning; the said Mourning to begin on Sunday next, the 1st Day of September.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this Day ordered by His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, that from and after the First Day of December next, or upon the Publication of a Proclamation to that Effect withiu each Colony, it shall not be lawful, except by special Licence as hereinafter-mentioned, for any Slave or Slaves to be landed upon any of the Coasts, or imported or brought into any of the Ports, Harbours, Creeks, or Roads, or within the Limits, Jurisdictions, and Territories of any of the Settlements, Islands, Colonies, or Plantations on the Continent
