

Hague, Jan. 24. The Province of *Utrecht* has agreed to the State of the War for the present year; and that the States-General have resolved to call upon the other Provinces, that they will likewise give their consents without any delay. The Prince of *Orange* is gone for *Soesdike* to pass some few days there: The *Sieur Fuen Mayor* the Spanish Minister has presented a Memorial to the States, complaining, as is said, of the proceedings of the French. The *Heer Van Diest* is expected here within few days, who succeeds the *Heer Romswinkel* as Envoye Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*. Mr. *Skon* who arrived here some days since, parted again last Saturday for *Rotterdam* to embark there on an English Yacht.

Brussels, Jan. 14. The Prince of *Parma* is sending Commissioners into the several Provinces to muster the Troops, and when that is done the great Reform will be put in execution. Yesterday his Highness was abroad for the first time since his recovery. The States of *Brabant* have Adjourned their meeting for some days, that his Highness may in the mean time, if he think fit, Assemble the Nations of this C. ty.

Brussels, Jan. 17. Yesterday we received an account from *Lovain* that they have settled there the matter of the Imposts, and we expect the like will be done here the next week. Last night the *Sieur Christin*, the first of the Spanish Commissioners for the adjusting the Limits, arrived here from *Courtray*, having for two Months together expected Monsieur *Pelleuier* return from *Paris*, who being the Chief of the French Commissioners, the others in his absence, would not renew the Conference, though their Powers did sufficiently authorise them to do it, so that it seems the French have no mind to bring this matter of the Limits to a conclusion. Two days since Monsieur *Corfeth* the Intendant of *Tournay* arrived here, he comes again about the Affair of *Bovines*.

Brussels Jan. 21. On Sunday last Monsieur *Corfel* parted again from hence, and went for *Paris*, with his Highnesses Answer concerning *Bovines*, which was, That every Prince might Fortifie any place within his Territories, as he thought fit; That for what concerned *Bovines* they had not Fortified it, but only put up some *Palisadoes* to keep the *Soldiers* from deserting, that if there was any thing disputable concerning the Place, or the Limits on that side, his Highness was ready to refer it to the Commissioners at *Courtray*, whose proper business it was to determine it. His Highness having by the last Spanish Ordinary received the necessary Orders concerning the General Reform, which has been so much spoken of, it is believed the same will now very speedily be put in execution; and when that is done his Highness resolves that the constant standing Forces of these Provinces shall be 25000 men, and these he will take care shall be punctually paid, which will be more for the service of these Countrys than a far greater Army in the condition our Troops have formerly been in. The City of *Gaunt* it seems pretends to a privilege of having the Guard of their Gates, which his Highness will by no means allow them.

Windfor, Jan. 21. This day Charles Count *Palatine* of the Rhine, and Prince Elector of the Empire,

who, in a Chapter held at *Whitehal* on the 15th of September last, was chosen into the Society of the most Noble Order of the Garter, was solemnly Installed in the Quire of the Royal Chappel within the Castle of *Windfor*, in the 4th Stall on the Princes side, the Earl of *Craven* being his Proxie; and the Earl of *Oxford*, and the Duke of *Albemarle*, Knights-Companions of that most Noble Order, being Commissioners specially Constituted by His Majesty, as Sovereign, for the performance of this great Ceremony.

Whitehal, Jan. 22. His Majesty has been graciously pleas'd to Confer the Honor of Knighthood upon Sir *George Treby* Recorder of the City of *London*.
