ON Tuesday the 3d Instant, the Remains of His late Royal Highness William Henry Duke of Gloucester and Edinburgh, lay in State at Gloucester-House, from whence they were conveyed on the following Morning, Wednesday the 4th Instant, at half-past Ten o'Clock, in order to be privately interred in the Choir of the Royal Chapel of St. George, at Windsor, escorted by a Detachment from the 14th Regiment of Light Dragoons, which was relieved at Staines by a Party of the Royal Regiment of Horse Guards. At about Five o'Clock the Procession arrived at Windsor, and moved to the Castle in the following Order, viz. A Troop of the said Royal Regiment, which preceded and flanked the Procession; Nine Mourning Coaches, each drawn by Six Horses, and containing the Gentlemen of His late Royal Highness's Household; the Hearse drawn by Eight Horses; the State Coach, in which was placed, on a Black Velvet Cushion, the Coronet of His late Royal Highness, attended by H. D. Vincent, Esq; Treasurer of his Household, and Carriages of His late Royal Highness, and of other Branches of the Royal Family, closed the Procession. The Body was placed under a Canopy, in the Queen's Presence Chamber, which was covered with Black Cloth for the Occasion.

Between Nine and Ten o'Clock the Procession began to move from the Royal Apartments to St. George's Chapel (the Way to which was lined on either Side by a Party of the Royal Regiment of Horse Guards, dismounted, and by the Corps of Windsor Volunteers, bearing Torches) in the following Order:

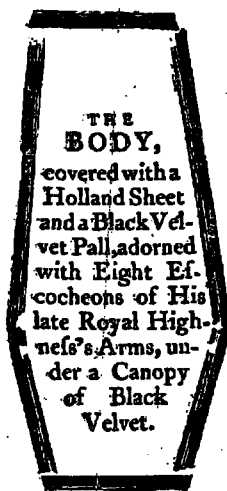

At the Entrance of Saint George's Chapel, within the South Door, the Dean and Prebendaries, attended by the Choir, and the Poor Knights, received the Body, falling into the Procession next before Lancaster Herald, acting for Norroy King of Arms, and so proceeded down the South Aisle, and up the Middle Aisle; singing, into the Choir; where the Coffin was placed on Treffels, the Head towards the Altar, the Crown and Cushion being laid thereon, and the Canopy held over it, while the Service was read by the Dean of Windsor; the Chief Mourner sitting on a Chair placed for him at the Head of the Corpse.

This Part of the Service before the Interment being read, the Corpse was deposited in the Vault near the Sovereign's Stall; and the Dean having concluded the Burial Service, Garter's Deputy proclaimed His late Royal Highness's Style, as follows:

Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory Life unto His Divine Mercy, the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Illustrious Prince WILLIAM HENRY, Duke of Gloucester and Edinburgh, Earl of Connaught, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Third Son of the late Most Illustrious Prince FREDERICK LEWIS Prince of Wales, deceased, and Brother of His Most Excellent Majesty GEORGE the Third, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith; whom God bless and preserve with long Life, Health, and Honor, and all worldly Happiness.

SIR,

HEREWITH I have the Honor to transmit you, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Copy of my Letter to Admiral Cornwallis, explaining the Capture of *La Didon* French Frigate by His Majesty's Ship under my Command, with a List of the Killed and Wounded.

SIR, *Phoenix, at Sea, August 13, 1805.*

I CANNOT but exult in the Honor of imparting to you the extreme good Fortune of His Majesty's Ship under my Command on the 10th Instant, Latitude 43 Deg. 16 Min. N. Longitude 12 Deg. 14 Min. W., in the Capture of *La Didon*, a remarkable fine, and the fastest-sailing Frigate in the French Navy, of Forty-four Guns and Three Hundred and Thirty Men, which had sailed but a few Days from Corunna, and was upon a secret Cruise. The Action commenced at a Quarter past Nine in the Morning, (*La Didon* having waited my Approach to Leeward,) and lasted Three Hours, never without Pistol-shot, during which all our Ropes were cut to Pieces, our Main-top-sail Yard shot away, and most of our Masts and Yards severely wounded. The Necessity for our engaging to Leeward, in order to prevent the Possibility of the Enemy's Escape, exposed us to several taking Broad-sides before it could be prudent to return the Fire; and the Superiority of *La Didon's* sailing, added to the adroit Manœuvres of Captain Milins, convinced me of the Skill and Gallantry I should have to contend with, which has been fully evinced by the stubborn Defence of his Ship until she became a perfect Wreck, and his subsequent honorable Department. Owing to the Lightness of the Wind, and *La Didon's* Attempt to board, brought our Starboard Quarter in Contact with her Larboard Bow, in which Position we remained full Three Quarters of an Hour, subject to a galling Fire of Musketry, that robbed me of such Support of Officers and Men, as there could be no Compensation for but in complete Victory.

With Sorrow I transmit you a List of the Killed and Wounded; and have the Honor to be, &c.

FIVE PER CENT. ANNUITIES, 1797.

Whitehall Treasury Chambers, Sept. 7, 1805.

Whereas by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to enable the Commissioners of the Treasury to contract with certain Proprietors of Stock, created by Two Acts passed in the Thirty-seventh and Forty-second Years of His present Majesty, for granting other Annuities in lieu thereof, or to pay the same off at the Period therein mentioned," it is enacted,

That all Persons, and Bodies Politic and Corporate, possessed of any Capital Stock in the Annuities after the Rate of Five Pounds per Centum per Annum, granted by an Act made in the Thirty-seventh Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for raising the Sum of Eighteen Millions by Way of Annuities;" and by an Act, made in the Forty-second Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for granting Annuities to satisfy certain Exchequer Bills," who, in pursuance of an Act, made in the Forty-fourth Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for granting additional Annuities to the Proprietors of Stock created by Two Acts, passed in the Thirty-seventh and Forty-second Years of His present Majesty," had, on or before the 5th Day of April 1805, signified to the Governor and Company of the Bank of England their Election to have the same paid off in Money on the 10th Day of

GENERAL ORDERS AND RESOLUTION.

ORDERED—That all Claimants whose Lists, Accounts, or Schedules of Debts before this Board have been made up, or extracted from any Books of Account in America, or who refer to Books of Account, Judgments, or other Records of Courts, Bonds, Bills, Notes, or other Vouchers or Documents in America, do, *without Delay*, give Notice at this Office of the Names and Places of Abode respectively of the Persons in that Country, in whose Custody or Possession such Books of Accounts, Judgments, or other Records, Bonds, Bills, Notes, or other Vouchers, now are, or will be found; and that they also write to such Persons, without Delay, directing them to be ready to produce the same, for the Inspection or Examination of such Person or Persons as shall be authorised by this

Board for that Purpose, and to answer all Questions which, under such Authority, may be put to them respecting the same, or the Debts on which their Claims are founded.

Ordered—That as the General Orders and Resolutions of the Board, which have been published in the London Gazette, and transmitted to Claimants or their Agents, pointing out by References to the Notices and Instructions published at the Commencement of their Proceedings, and by farther Explanation, the several Matters which it would be necessary to set forth, and as far as possible to substantiate before the Board, or stating and describing certain Losses which did not come within the Meaning of the Treaties, have in many Instances had much less effect in bringing forward additional Statements or Amendments, and thereby advancing the Proceedings of the Board, than there was Reason to expect, Notice be given to Claimants and their Agents, that the said General Orders and Resolutions were drawn up, and so published and transmitted to Claimants or their Agents, that they might themselves compare the same with the Statements and Evidence they had brought forward or offered in their respective Claims, and wheresoever, on such Comparison, any Errors or Defects should appear, they might, without Delay, by Representation to the Board, correct such Errors, and supply such Defects, or make the proper Enquiries for that Purpose.

Resolved—That in the Application of Evidence to the reputed Solvency or good Credit of Debtors, at and subsequent to the Peace, for the Purpose of ascertaining, as nearly in different Cases as the Nature of the Subject and the different Circumstances of such Case will admit, the Proportion of Debts which might have been recovered subsequent to the Peace, if lawful Impediments, within the Meaning of the Treaties, had not prevented such Recovery, the Board, while they give liberal Effect to all such Evidence, must not lose Sight of the material Consideration, that if the Debts which those Persons owed to His Majesty's Subjects could then have been made good against them, their Situations and reputed Circumstances would, in many Instances, have been very different; and that it is therefore unreasonable to conclude, that because Debtors were able to pay all their other Debts at the Peace, they would have been able to pay not only those Debts, but also the Whole of what they owed to His Majesty's Subjects, the former bearing often but a very small Proportion to the latter.
