Genoua, fan. 14.

Tlie Horie ne told you in oarlaf, was ordered to march to the Fronthers of Montferrat, epon fome'diforders that lea happened betwsen the su', cets of this Srete, and thofe of the Duke of Mantoua, have not by reafon of the great Snow that has fallen, been able to get thither, though by what we hear lir ce, they $n$ ay pare themfelves the crouble,for rhat the Countrey-people have been fo wife as to agree among them elves From Marjeilles we have an Account, phat eight French Gallies were ready to fall for thefe Coalls, fo that itfeems the French King intends to have always a Squadron abroad inthefe-Seas. We have been told that great preparations were making at Thoulon, in brder to the putting a very confiderable [leet to Sea in the Spring; and that a Squadron thereof was to be particularly employed againf the Tripolins, who hitherto refufe to make a Peace with che French, notwithftanding all the endeavours that have been uled for that purpole; and that the Sicur du Quefne was the laft Summer with the ode i
 Peate; but lome peifons who came hither not long Sncefrom Thonlon, fay, they neither faw nor heard of any man of War to be then fittirg ont there.

Vienna, Fan, 15. It is now out of all doubt, that the Emperor to gratifie the Hungariars, has atpointed a G nerat-Dyet of that King lom to meet at Newfitadt, in order to the con poling the Affairs of that Countrey, by foch Settlements, as may redrefs the Grievarices of thofe who have ground to complain, and uníte the a hole Kingdom in thir Duty and Obedience to his ImperiatMajefy; but this is like to prove a great $W$ ork! and will require great Prudence and Moderation in thofe that are Eotmanage it. There are thofe that fay already, that the leado ing Men among the Hungarian, notwithltanding their fair pretences, ard the difpofition they feem to be in, to bring things to an accommodation, will be fo unrealonable in their Demands, that the Em peror wilknot be able to clofe with them: but we willhope bteter, and that as they pretend the publick good, fo they will make that their only aim 2 and not be influenced by Self Interefts.

Lintz, fan. 18. This day was oblerved at Court the Birth-day of the Arch-Dutchels the Emperors Danghter, who is now twelve years old ; fome will ftill fpeak as if there were a dikelyhood of her Marrying with the Eleftor of Bavarix, though others Gy he is tohave a Briscels of Neuburg. The great difcourfe at prefert at this Court is, conceraing the Affaiss of Hungarys $I$ at the Emperor has appoint
ed a Meeting of the States of that Kingdom, is cerrain; and we are told that $h$ - hos nained the Count - of Starenberg, the Baron Eieriart and the Baron Bucclini to be there as his Commulfioners, till fuch time as his Imperial Majelty gocs thither him ${ }^{\text {relf }}$, which he will not do, till he fee what fuccels things are like to have, coneerring which, People have different opinions; tome believe che Hungatians will be fo moderate in theirdefires, that they will eafily be granted them, and others think the contrary: The Marqu's de Sepperille, Envoye Extraordinary from the French King, has had his Audiences of the Emperor and Emprels; in which nothing paffed but compliments.

Francfort, $\mathfrak{F}$ an. 20. We can write nothing from hence, for thung in thefe parts are at prefent very quiet, but of our fears an I apprehenfions of what's to comed a War with France is the fibect of tl em, but with what ground we cannot yer tell, befideq. that which is given by the prepargti ns the French have made in Lorrain and Alface. I he matter of the Mint is not yet determineu.

Sirasburg, farr. 2 I. The Baron de Monelar is going for France, to receive as is believed, the Kings forders corgernixg what he is to do in thefe parts! againft his return, which will be very fpeedy, its faid the Forces will be dráwn together, and all things in a readinefs for the execating their Defigns; which though ne cannot yet particularly fay what they are, yet this City has every day more and more ground to fufpect that the French will begin with them. It is not to be faid what Magazines they have laid up, and o hat Provifion has been made of Artillery and coey thing che, and now in a fhort time we Thall fee what ufe they will put them to.

Efamburg, fan 24. The Lettess we receive from Warfaw, tell us, that the Dyet nas met, but give us not any Acceunt either of wiat had b en propofed to them on the part of the king to be the lub. ject of their Debate, or of what had been done by them. The Duke of Zell having a defign to make the Townof Harbourg a place of Trade, has granted it feveral Priviledges, and particularly, fuch as may encourage the coming thither of ftrangers, who among orher things, are promifed the free enjoyment of their Religion. The Lity of Leipzick being in a manver wholly freed of the Plogo, the Magiftrates have caufed to be publithed 7 hat the Fait which ufis to be held there annually on the 6th of February, flhall this year be bept on the 13th of the fame Month. The Lettȩrs from Berion tell us, that the Elector of Brandenburg had appointed Comisiflioners, who were to examine the Inventories that have been taken of the Goods, unla len out of the Spanifh Ship taken in the Road of Ofend, and to proceed . as is faid, to the Sule of then.

Cologne, fum. 28. Prince willism of Furjcmberg is going for Paris, to vifit his Brother the Buthop o Strasburg, who has been very ill, and is not yet recovered. There is now lefs difcourfe than ever of our Electors removing to bonne, it feems he is pleafed with his Retirement here, and according to all appearance, has no thoughts of leaving it. The Atairs of Liege continue to give his Electoral Highneis fome diflurbance, things there remaining in the greateft dilord -r, and nothing being done to bring them into t ;cir 1 ight courle again; bat its believed his Electoull ighnefs will nut Yuffer them to remain much ionge in the flate they now are in, and that fince the endeavours that have been ufed to bring thofe people back to their Obedience, have not had any eflect, he will hare recourfe to foch $m$ ans as may be effectual for the doingit. From Ransbonne they write, that the Dyet was preparing an Anfwer to a Letter they had received from the moll Chrittian King, juflifying the Proceedings of his Officers in Alfuce, © $c$.
Hague, Fam. 31. The States, as we are informed, hav: a, defign to retrench the extraordinary Charge of the Admiralties, and tareduce the feveral Colledges to ons general Court, which fhall be held h, re; buit the Intereft of the prelent Deputies being grear, its thought the thing will meet with much difficulty. The iaft night.arrived here Sy Gabriel Sylvius from the Court of the Duke of Zell, wherehe has been fome time in the quality of Envoye Extraordinary from the Kiug of Eugland. The Heer Romswinkle, Envoye Extraurdinary from the Elector of Brandenburg, pas had his Audience of leave of the States-General. The weff-India Company bave bya Veffel arrived from the Caftle del Mina on the Coart of Guinea, received Advice, that the Affars there are in a very good condicion. From Bruffels we bave an Account, that the Prince of Parma their Governgr was fo well recquered of hisillnefs as to goe abroad; and that heo had already begun to put the Reform of the Militia in execution, and that he had caufed Moness to be given out to the Offcers, for providing the Soldiers with new Cloachs.
Marleitles, fan. 14. The eight French Gallies defigned for the Coaft of Genoun, are ftill here in Port, detained by bad weather, We are told that Orders are come from Court for the fitting out Yeveral men of War at Thoulon, to be employed againf the Tripolins, in order to the obliging them to make a Peace with this Crown.

Paris, $\mathfrak{F}$ an. 29. The Dauphin has bad fome little Returns of his Indifpoftion, which though they are not fuch as to interrupt his Divertifements, and particularly, his Daucing in the great Balet, yet give the Court fome difquiet. ThereareLetters which fp ak of the Cardinald' Eftree's arrival at Rome, fa that now we fhall quickly fee what iffue Matters uill have, though by what has happened lately, there appears no great difpofition towards an accommodation, but rather the differences grow highor : For the Pope having written to the Chapter of pamiers, and to others, in the Matter of the Regality, the Parliament here being informed thereof, nade an Arreft or Decree fn september laft, by which the faid Cbapter was Commanded, nut to obey the Giid Letters of the Pope, or to take any notice * Hem; Whereupon the Pope publihed a Bull,
by which he Excommunicatis sall thore that fhall read Do keep the faid Arreft, and within thele three or four days the Farliament has Pablifhed another Arref, by which they forbid on very fevere Penalies, all Perionsto read or keep by them 'the faid Popes Bull. The Chamber of Mesz has united a great many Lands to the Crown of France, and lias pub'ilhed a Declaration of the Kings, Command, ing, That the publick Jniltice fhall not for the future be Adminilltred in Lorrain, in the name of their Duke (as it feems it has hitherto been) but in the name of the king. We aretold that Orders have been fent to Rockefort to fit out fix Frigats, for' what Defign we know not. Our Confulat Argiers complains of fome ill Treatment he has received of late from that Goverument.

Falmouth, fan. 20. The 17th Infant came in here the Fofeph and Mary, Thomas BrapelMafter from Lisborne ; the Mafer and Scamen report, that the next day after they came out, they were cbaced by a Turks man of War ten hours together, but that the night coming on they changed their courft, and fo cfcaped: that by contrary Winds they were forced to putiuto Brewbaven in Ireland, where they found a Scaman (who ithy br ught over) that belonged to the George of London, Fobn Robinfon Mafter, who inher V oyage hom. fom the Barbadoes was caft away upon the coa ts of lrelund on.the 6 th Inflant, the Men $b$ ing all faved, but none of the Goods. The Peter of $L_{4} \boldsymbol{r l}^{\prime} \mathrm{l}_{\mathrm{n}}$ a Veffel of abnut 60 Tuns, Fofeph Adley Ma foundred at Sea the 18th Inflant, about fix Leakid s to the Weftward of this Harbor, th weather being fair, the Men faved thernfelves in their Boat, and came in here yeferday morning.
