Copy of a Letter from the Honorable William Cornwallis, Admiral of the White, &c. to William Marsden, Esq; dated Ville de Paris, at Sea, the 21st of October 1805.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to enclose, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter I have now received from Captain Lavie, of His Majesty's Ship Iris, giving an Account of his having fallen in with and captured the St. Pedro Spanish Corvette Privateer, and recaptured the Magdalen belonging to Greenock.

SIR, Iris, at Sea, October 21, 1805.

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, that, at Daybreak on the 15th Instant, being off Les Roche Bonnes, Two Sail were discovered steering towards Bourdeaux. It was soon ascertained that one was a Schooner Armed Vessel, the other, a Merchant Ship, her Prize. Though it blew strong on the Shore, I was fortunate enough to cut off the Ship. She proved to be the Magdalen of Greenock, who had separated from the Leeward Island Convoy, and had been nearly a Month in Possession of the Enemy.

On the same Night a Ship opened his Fire upon me, and did not surrender until she had received several Broadfides. She proved to be the St. Pedro Spanish Corvette Privateer, mounting Sixteen Guns, Eight of which are Eighteen Pounders, the rest Spanish Six-Pounders, with One Hundred and Fifty Men on board when she failed, Part of whom were distributed in Five Vessels she had captured. I am sorry to add that we had one Man killed, and the Enemy Two killed and Four wounded. The senior Lieutenant, Mr. Ivie, and the rest of the Officers and Ship's Company, conducted themselves on this Occasion much to my Satisfaction.

PROCLAMATION for pardoning Deserters from His Majesty's Regular Forces.

War-Office, October 8, 1805.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are, at this Time, several Deserters from His Majesty's Regular Land Forces who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; His Majesty has been graciously pleased to grant His Free Pardon to all Deserters from His Regular Land Forces who shall surrender themselves, on or before the Eighth Day of December next, to any of His Majesty's Civil Magistrates, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector-General of the Recruiting Service in the Isle of Wight.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be appointed to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command, and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

Every Deserter not actually serving in any of His Majesty's Regiments is to surrender himself for General Service.

Deserters serving in other Corps, (Militia, and Army of Reserve excepted,) are to continue therein upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers, who are to report the Circumstance to the Secretary at War and the Adjutant-General, and they shall not be liable at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: but this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps for raising Recruits for general Service, which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon, on declaring themselves to be such, and will be transferred to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command.

The Magistrate to whom any Deserter from His Majesty's Regular Forces may surrender himself, is authorised and required to certify the Day on which such Deserter surrendered himself, which Certificate is to continue in force until the Arrival of the Deserter at the Head-Quarters of the nearest Military Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of

Ten Miles a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the Magistrate's Certificate, or to be otherwise proved to the Satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such Military Post.

No Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity. Nor shall any Soldier who surrendered himself upon any former Proclamation of His Majesty's Pardon, and who afterwards again deserted, be included in the above Pardon. And it is to be clearly understood, that this Pardon is not to extend to any Deserter from His Majesty's Militia Forces, or from the Army of Reserve, or Additional Force; but all Soldiers who shall have enlisted for general Service from the said Forces, and shall subsequently thereto have deserted, will be included in this His Majesty's gracious Pardon.
