Admiralty-Office, November 11, 1805: THE Letter, (and its Enclofures,) of which the following are Copies, were received at this Office laft Night, from Captain (now Rear-Admiral) Sir Richard John Strachan, Bart. Commander of His Majefty's Ship the Cælar, addressed to William Marsden, Esq.

SIR, *Cafar*, November 7, 1805. THE accompanying Copy of a Letter, addreffed to the Honorable Admiral Cornwallis, I requeft you will be pleafed to lay before the Lorda Commiffioners of the Admiralty, with my Apology for the hafty Manner in which it is written.

Cefar, Weft of Rochfort 264 Miles, Nov. 4, 1805, Wind S. E.

SIR, Nov. 4, 1805, Wind S. E. **B**EING off Ferrol, working to the Weftward, with the Wind Wefterly, on the Evening of the 2d, we obferved a Frigate in the N. W. making Signals; made all Sail to join her before Night, and followed by the Ships named in the Margin *, we came up with her at Eleven at Night; and at the Moment the joined us, we faw Six large Ships near us. Captain Baker informed me he had been chaced by the Rochfort Squadron, then clofe to Leeward of us, We were delighted. I defired him to tell the Cap-

tains of the Ships of the Line aftern to follow me, as I meant to engage them directly; and immediately bore away in the Cæfar for the Purpole, making all the Signals I could, to indicate our Movements to our Ships ; the Moon enabled us to fee the Enemy bear away in a Line abreak; clofely formed ; but we loft Sight of them when it fet, and I was obliged to reduce our Sails, the Hero, Courageux, and Æolus being the only Ships we could fee. We continued fteering to the E. N. E. all Night, and in the Morning observed the Santa Margarita near us; at Nine we discovered the Enemy of Four Sail of the Line in the N. E. under all Sail. We had also every Thing fet, and came up with them fast; in the Evening, we observed Three Sail aftern; and the Phœnix fpoke me at Night. I found that active Officer, Captaia Baker, had delivered my Orders, and I fent him on to affift the Santa Margarita in leading us up to the Enemy. At Daylight we were near them, and the Santa Margarita had begun in a very gallant Manuer to fire upon their Rear, and was foon joined by the Phœnix.

A little before Noon, the French finding an Action unavoidable began to take in their fmall Sails, and form in a Line, bearing on the Starboard Tack; we did the fame, and I communicated my Intentions by hailing to the Captains, " that I fhould attack the Centre and Rear," and at Noon began the Battle; in a flort Time the Van Ship of the Enemy tacked, which almost directly made the Action close and general; the Namur-joined foon after

we tacked, which we did as foon as we could get the Ships round, and I directed her by Signal, to engage the Van; at half-past Three the Action ceased, the Enemy having fought to admiration, and not furrendering till their Ships were unmanageable. I have returned Thanks to the Captains of the Ships of the Line and the Frigates, and they fpeak in high Terms of Approbation of their respective Officers and Ships' Companies. If any Thing could add to the good Opinion I had already formed of the Officers and Crew of the Cæfar, it is their gallant Conduct in this Day's Battle. The Enemy have fuffered much, but our Ships not more than is to be expected on these Occafions. You may judge of my Surprife, Sir, when I found the Ships we had taken, were not the Rochfort Squadron, but from Cadiz.

N. B. The Duguay Trouin and Scipion totally difmafted; the Formidable and Mont Blanc have their Foremafts flanding,

Our Frigates-Santa Margarita, Æolus, Phœnix, and Revolutionaire.

The Revolutionaire joined at the Time the Namur did, but, with the reft of our Frigates, in confequence of the French tacking, were to Leeward of the Enemy.

I do not know what is become of the Bellona, or the other Two Sail we faw on the Night of the 2d Instant.

The Reports of Damage, Killed, and Wounded, have not been all received. The Enemy have fuffered much.
