A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant November, We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant November to Tuesday the Seventh Day of January next: And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of that Part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And We do further hereby, with the Advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said Seventh Day of January next, be held, and sit for the Dispatch of diverse urgent and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Seventh Day of January next.

For a General Thanksgiving.

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the indispensable Duty which We owe to Almighty God, for the recent and signal Interposition of His good Providence, in addition to the manifold and inestimable Benefits which these Kingdoms have from Time to Time received at His Hands, manifested by the Blessing bestowed on Our Arms in the late signal and important Victory obtained by Our Fleet under the Command of the late Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, over the Combined Fleets of France and Spain, have thought fit; by

the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding that a General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed throughout those Parts of Our United Kingdom called England and Ireland, on Thursday the Fifth Day of December next; and, for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and Right Reverend the Bishops, of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to the Occasion, to be used in all Churches and Chapels, and other Places of public Worship, and to take Care for the timely dispersing of the same throughout their respective Dioceses: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said public Day of Thanksgiving be religiously observed by all Our loving Subjects, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and upon Pain of suffering such Punishment as We may justly inflict upon all such who shall contemn or neglect the same.

For a Public Thanksgiving,

WE, taking into Our most serious Consideration the indispensable Duty which We owe to Almighty God, for the recent and signal Interposition of His good Providence, in addition to the manifold and inestimable Benefits which these Kingdoms have from Time to Time received at His Hands, manifested by the Blessing bestowed on Our Arms in the late signal and important Victory obtained by Our Fleet, under the Command of the late Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, over the Combined Fleets of France and Spain, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and commanding, that a public Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed

throughout that Part of Our Kingdom called Scotland, upon Thursday the Fifth Day of December next: And We do strictly charge and command, that the said public Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, on the said Fifth Day of December next, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inflict on all such as contemn or neglect the Performance of so religious a Duty: Our Will and Pleasure is, therefore, and We charge, that this our Proclamation seen, ye forthwith pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that noie, pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Copies thereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that, upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixteenth of May, One thousand eight hundred and three, We were pleased to promise and declare, among other Things, That all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June then next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as Our Royal Bounty: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounty has been by several Orders in Council prolonged to the Thirty first Day of December next inclusive: And whereas it has been represented to Us that much Advantage would arise to Our Service if the said Bounty were extended to such young Able-bodied Landmen as may hereafter enter themselves to serve on board Our Fleet, upon Proof being exhibited of their being not less than Eighteen Years of Age, instead of Twenty Years; We do hereby promise and declare, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that all Able-bodied Landmen so entering themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive, shall be entitled to receive Our said Bounty of Thirty Shillings each Man, upon Proof being exhibited that such Able-bodied Landmen are not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years: And whereas, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixth of February last, We were pleased to promise and declare, that, instead of the Reward theretofore paid

for the Discovery of every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board Our Ships; and who might conceal him or themselves, a Reward of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Fifty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board Our Ships, should be paid in Manner directed by Our said Proclamation to any Person who should discover such Seaman or Seamen respectively, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our Service by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next: And whereas it hath been represented to Us that Advantage would arise to Our Service if some Encouragement were also given to such Person or Persons as may be disposed to procure Men for the Service of Our Fleet, We do hereby further promise and declare, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that a Reward of Four Guineas for every Able Seaman, Three Guineas for every Ordinary Seaman, and Two Guineas and a Half for every Landman, shall be paid to any Person or Persons who may, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive, procure the voluntary Service of, and convey, such Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, or Landman, fit for Our Naval Service, on board any of Our Ships or Vessels, or to any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men; together with an Allowance, at the Rate of One Penny per Mile, for each Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, and Landman, for every Mile such Man may respectively travel to the nearest of Our Ships of War, or nearest Place of Residence of any of Our Sea Officers employed in raising Men (provided such Man shall be found fit for Our Service, and there shall not be Reason to suppose that he is an Apprentice); the said Rewards and Travelling Allowance to be paid for any such Able Seaman or Seamen, Ordinary Seaman or Landman, respectively, so procured and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers (where there are any), and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collector of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors of Our Customs respectively, by the Person who may procure the voluntary Service of any Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, or Landman as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Numbers and Quality, of Seamen and Landmen so procured; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take Charge of such Seaman or Landman for Our Service.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for making further Provision for the effectual Per-



“formance of Quarantine;” it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That, from and after the Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five, all Ships and Vessels, as well His Majesty’s Ships of War as all others, coming from, or having touched at any Place from whence His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council, shall have adjudged and declared it probable that the Plague, or any other infectious Disease or Distemper, highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty’s Subjects, may be brought, and all Ships, Vessels, and Boats receiving any Person, Goods, Wares and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any other Articles whatever, from or out of any Ships or Vessels so coming from, or having touched at such infected Place as aforesaid, whether such Persons, Goods, Wares and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or other Articles, shall have come, or been brought in such Ships or Vessels, or such Persons shall have gone, or Articles have been put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships or Vessels at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, and whether such Ships or Vessels were or were not bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid; and that all Persons, Goods, Wares and Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or any Articles whatever, on board any such Ships or Vessels so coming from, or having touched at such infected Place as aforesaid, or on board of any such Receiving Ships, Vessels, or Boats as aforesaid, shall be, and be considered to be liable to Quarantine within the Meaning of the said Act, and of any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by and with the Advice of His or Their Privy Council concerning Quarantine, and the Prevention of Infection from the Time of the Departure of such Ships or Vessels from such Infected Place as aforesaid, or from the Time when such Persons, Goods, Wares, Merchandize, Packets, Packages, Baggage, Wearing Apparel, Books, Letters, or other Articles, shall have been received on board respectively; and that such Ships, Vessels, and Boats as aforesaid, and all Persons, (as well Pilots as others), Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, whether coming or brought in such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, from such Infected Place as aforesaid, or going, or being put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid; and all Persons, Goods, Wares and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, on board any such Receiving Ship, Vessel, or Boat as aforesaid, shall, upon their Arrival at any such Port or Place, be obliged to perform Quarantine in such Place or Places, for such Time and in such Manner, as shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette; and that until such Ships, Vessels, and Boats, Persons, Goods, Wares and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, shall have respectively performed, and shall be duly discharged from such Quarantine, no such Person, Goods, Wares, or Merchandize, or other Articles

as aforesaid, or any of them, shall, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, come or be brought on Shore, or go, or be put on board any other Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to come or be brought on Shore, in any such Port or Place, although such Ships or Vessels so coming from such infected Place as aforesaid, may not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, unless in such Manner and in such Cases, and by such Licence as shall be directed or permitted by such Order or Orders made by His Majesty, His Heirs, or Successors, in Council as aforesaid; and that all such Ships, Vessels, and Boats, whether coming from such infected Place as aforesaid, or being otherwise liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, and all Persons, (as well Pilots as others,) Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, and other Articles as aforesaid, whether coming or brought in such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, or going, or being put on board the same, either before or after the Arrival of such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, at any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid, and although such Ships, Vessels, or Boats shall not be bound to any Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands aforesaid; and that all Commanders, Masters, or other Persons having the Charge or Command of any such Ships, Vessels, or Boats, whether coming from any infected Place, or being otherwise liable to Quarantine as aforesaid, shall be subject to all the Provisions, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions contained in the said Act, or in any Order or Orders which shall be made by His Majesty, His Heirs, and Successors, in Council as aforesaid, concerning Quarantine and the Prevention of Infection, and to all the Pains, Penalties, Forfeitures, and Punishments contained in the said Act, for any Breach or Disobedience thereof, or of any Order or Orders of His Majesty in Council, made under the Authority thereof: And whereas Information hath been received that an infectious Disease hath lately shewn itself in various Parts of the Continent of America, and particularly in the District of Southwark, in the City of Philadelphia, and in the City of New York: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon adjudge and declare it probable, that the said infectious Disease is highly dangerous to the Health of His Majesty’s Subjects, and may be brought into some Port or Place in Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, by Ships or Vessels coming from, or having touched at any of the Ports within the State of Pennsylvania, or the State of New York; and is thereupon pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels, (as well His Majesty’s Ships of War as others (not having the said infectious Disease on board,) coming from, or having touched at any of the Ports within the State of Pennsylvania or the State of New York, do perform a Quarantine of Fifteen Days at the several Places appointed, and according to the Rules prescribed by His Majesty’s Orders in Council, bearing Date the Fifth Day of April last, concerning the Performance of Quarantine by all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or from the Port of Cadiz, or from any other Port of Spain, without the Streights of Gibraltar lying to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent: but in case it shall

appear upon the Arrival of any Ship or Vessel coming from or having touched at any of the Ports within the said States of Pennsylvania and New York, that any of the Crew or Passengers belonging to the same have died, or been ill of such infectious Disease, within the Space of Forty Days, prior to the Arrival of such Ship or Vessel on the Coasts of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man; or in case any Person shall have died on board such Ship or Vessel, in consequence of the said Infectious Distemper, within the Space of Forty Days, as aforesaid: then and in that case the said Ship or Vessel, and her Cargo, shall perform Quarantine at Stangate Creek, and shall be compelled to depart from any other Port or Place at which she may have arrived, or shall arrive, and shall repair to Stangate Creek, and there perform Quarantine, and not elsewhere; and shall be subject to all the Rules and Regulations to which Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, or from the West Barbary on the Atlantic Ocean, or the Port of Cadiz, or from any other Port of Spain, without the Streights of Gibraltar, lying to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent, and not being furnished with Clean Bills of Health, are subject and liable to: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the Rules and Regulations contained in Sec. 42, of His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the Fifth Day of April last; to ascertain whether certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandize, enumerated in the First Class of the said Order, and imported in any Ship coming from any Port or Place in Europe, without the Streights, or on the Continent of America, at which there is not a regular Establishment for the Performance of Quarantine, declared sufficient by His Majesty in Council, for that Purpose, are, or are not, of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa, within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary, on the Atlantic Ocean, should be extended to Ships coming from the Island of Newfoundland, Cape Breton, and other Islands adjacent to the Continent of America: His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, That all the Rules and Regulations contained in the said 42d Sect. of the said above-recited Order, be extended (and the same are hereby extended) to all Ships and Vessels, having on board any of the said Articles, and arriving in any of the Ports of Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man; from any of the Ports in the

Islands of Newfoundland and Cape Breton, and other Islands adjacent to the Continent of America: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General, and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the said Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

I SEND the inclosed Letter for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 8th of last Month, now received from the Honorable Charles E. Fleming, Captain of His Majesty's Ship *Egyptienne*, making known to me, that he had fallen in with, and captured, on the Night of the 2d, the French National Brig, *L'Asteon*, of Sixteen Guns, and One Hundred and Twenty-six Men.

The *Egyptienne* having seen her Prize into Plymouth, returned to her Station.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, that His Majesty's Ship under my Command, captured, on the Night of the 2d Instant, the French Imperial Brig, *L'Asteon*, of Sixteen Guns and One Hundred and Twenty-six Men, Two Hours after she left the Anchorage off Rochelle.

Having in the Morning reconnoitred the Port of Rochefort, in pursuance of your Orders, and perceiving *L'Asteon* apparently ready for Sea, in a Situation where I thought it practicable to bring her out, I resolved to accept of the very handsome Offer of Lieutenant Handfield to make the Attempt, and stood off to the N. W. till Sunset. At Eight P. M. returned into the Pertuis d'Antioche, intending to anchor in the Rade de Basque, to support the Boats which were prepared for this Enterprize, when the Brig was perceived, under all Sail, Outside, and fell into our Possession after a short Chase.

L'Asteon was commanded by Monsieur Depoge, Capitaine de Fregate; and had on board a Colonel and some Recruits, with Arms and Cloathing for a Regiment in the West Indies.

I dare say their Lordships will be surpris'd, that we have lost so few Men. I can only account for it from the Enemy firing high, and we closing suddenly.

who shall surrender themselves, on or before the Eighth Day of December next, to any of His Majesty's Civil Magistrates, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector-General of the Recruiting Service in the Isle of Wight.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be appointed to such Regiment as His Majesty may be pleased to command, and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

Every Deserter not actually serving in any of His Majesty's Regiments is to surrender himself for General Service.

Deserters serving in other Corps, (Militia, and Army of Reserve excepted,) are to continue therein upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers, who are to report the Circumstance to the Secretary at War and the Adjutant-General, and they shall not be liable at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: but this Clause is not to extend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps for raising Recruits for general Service, which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon, on declaring themselves to be such, and will be transferred to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command.

The Magistrate to whom any Deserter from His Majesty's Regular Forces may surrender himself, is authorized and required to certify the Day on which such Deserter surrendered himself, which Certificate is to continue in force until the Arrival of the Deserter at the Head-Quarters of the nearest Military Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of Ten Miles a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the Magistrate's Certificate; or to be otherwise proved to the Satisfaction of the Officer-commanding at such Military Post.

No Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity. Nor shall any Soldier who surrendered himself upon any former Proclamation of His Majesty's Pardon, and who afterwards again deserted, be included in the above Pardon. And it is to be clearly understood, that this Pardon is not to extend to any Deserter from His Majesty's Militia Forces, or from the Army of Reserve, or Additional Force; but all Soldiers who shall have enlisted for general Service from the said Forces, and shall subsequently thereto have deserted, will be included in this His Majesty's gracious Pardon.

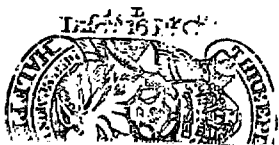

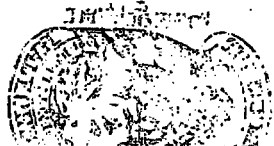
