THIS Day the Right Honorable Edward Earl of Powis, was, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honorable Edward Earl of Powis, Lieutenant General and General Governor of that Part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 21st of November 1805,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of December next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre; or any Sort of Arms

or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing several Laws relating to the permitting the Warehousing of Spirits in Ireland for Exportation, for charging a Duty on the same when taken out for Home Consumption, and for regulating the Exportation to Great Britain of Spirits not warehoused, until the Twenty-ninth Day of September, One thousand eight hundred and five; to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great

“ Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions; and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions without Payment of Duty, until the Twentieth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and six;” it is, among other Things, enacted, That an Act, made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; which was continued by an Act of the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of His present Majesty, and amended and further continued by several subsequent Acts, until the Twentieth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and five, shall be, and the same is thereby, further continued until the Twentieth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and six, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, to permit, for the Space of Six Months from the Date of the said Order, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions therein specified, Duty free: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Thirtieth Day of this instant November, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb (except salted Beef and Pork); and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel, belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

PROCLAMATION for pardoning Deserters from His Majesty's Regular Forces.

War-Office, October 8, 1805.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, that there are, at this Time, several Deserters from His Majesty's Regular Land Forces who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; His Majesty has been graciously pleased to grant His Free Pardon to all Deserters from His Regular Land Forces who shall surrender themselves, on or before the Eighth Day of December next, to any of His Majesty's Civil Magistrates, to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, to any of the Superintending Field Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the Margin hereof, or to the Inspector-General of the Recruiting Service in the Isle of Wight.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men, and fit for Service, shall be appointed to such Regiment as His Majesty may be pleased to command, and, when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may formerly have belonged.

Every Deserter not actually serving in any of His Majesty's Regiments is to surrender himself for General Service.

Deserters serving in other Corps, (Militia, and Army of Reserve excepted,) are to continue therein upon declaring themselves to their respective Commanding Officers, who are to report the Circumstance to the Secretary at War and the Adjutant-General, and they shall not be liable at any future Time, to be claimed by the Regiments in which they formerly served: but this Clause is not to ex-

tend to Deserters enlisted by the Corps for raising Recruits for general Service, which Deserters are only to be entitled to their Pardon, on declaring themselves to be such, and will be transferred to such Regiments as His Majesty may be pleased to command.

The Magistrate to whom any Deserter from His Majesty's Regular Forces may surrender himself, is authorised and required to certify the Day on which such Deserter surrendered himself, which Certificate is to continue in force until the Arrival of the Deserter at the Head-Quarters of the nearest Military Post, provided he proceed at the Rate of Ten Miles a Day, unless prevented by Sickness, to be certified by some Medical Practitioner on the Back of the Magistrate's Certificate, or to be otherwise proved to the Satisfaction of the Officer commanding at such Military Post.

No Soldier who may desert after these His Majesty's gracious Intentions are made public, shall be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity. Nor shall any Soldier who surrendered himself upon any former Proclamation of His Majesty's Pardon, and who afterwards again deserted, be included in the above Pardon. And it is to be clearly understood, that this Pardon is not to extend to any Deserter from His Majesty's Militia Forces, or from the Army of Reserve, or Additional Force; but all Soldiers who shall have enlisted for general Service from the said Forces, and shall subsequently thereto have deserted, will be included in this His Majesty's gracious Pardon.

NORTHERN LIGHT-HOUSES.

Notice to Mariners, of a Revolving Light on the Island of Sandy in Orkney.

THE Beacon, or Tower of Masonry, erected in 1803, upon the Start Point of Sandy, situate in the County of Orkney, in North Lat. 59 Deg. 31 Min. and West Long. 2 Deg. 15 Min. not having been found to prevent the numerous Wrecks which happen upon the low Shores of that Island, has been converted into a Light-House, which will be lighted upon the Night of Wednesday the 18.

Day of January, 1806, and thereafter each Night, from the Expiration of Day-light in the Evening, until Day-light in the Morning.
