WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-eighth Day of this instant November, We, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Twenty-eighth Day of this instant November to Tuesday the Seventh Day of January next: And We have given Order to Our Chancellor of that Part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And We do further hereby, with the Advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said Seventh Day of January next, be held, and sit for the Dispatch of diverse urgent and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Seventh Day of January next.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixteenth of May, One thousand eight hundred and three, We were pleased to promise and declare, among other Things, That all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June then next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as Our Royal Bounty: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the

said Bounty has been by several Orders in Council prolonged to the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive: And whereas it has been represented to Us that much Advantage would arise to Our Service if the said Bounty were extended to such young Able-bodied Landmen as may hereafter enter themselves to serve on board Our Fleet, upon Proof being exhibited of their being not less than Eighteen Years of Age, instead of Twenty Years; We do hereby promise and declare, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that all Able-bodied Landmen so entering themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive, shall be entitled to receive Our said Bounty of Thirty Shillings each Man, upon Proof being exhibited that such Able-bodied Landmen are not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years: And whereas, by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixth of February last, We were pleased to promise and declare, that, instead of the Reward theretofore paid for the Discovery of every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board Our Ships, and who might conceal him or themselves, a Reward of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Fifty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board Our Ships, should be paid in Manner directed by Our said Proclamation to any Person who should discover such Seaman or Seamen respectively, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our Service by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next: And whereas it hath been represented to Us that Advantage would arise to Our Service if some Encouragement were also given to such Person or Persons as may be disposed to procure Men for the Service of Our Fleet, We do hereby further promise and declare, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, that a Reward of Four Guineas for every Able Seaman, Three Guineas for every Ordinary Seaman, and Two Guineas and a Half for every Landman, shall be paid to any Person or Persons who may, on or before the Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive, procure the voluntary Service of, and convey, such Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, or Landman, fit for Our Naval Service, on board any of Our Ships or Vessels, or to any of Our

Sea-Officers employed in raising Men; together with an Allowance, at the Rate of One Penny per Mile, for each Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, and Landman, for every Mile such Man may respectively travel to the nearest of Our Ships of War, or nearest Place of Residence of any of Our Sea-Officers employed in raising Men (provided such Man shall be found fit for Our Service, and there shall not be Reason to suppose that he is an Apprentice); the said Rewards and Travelling Allowance to be paid for any such Able Seaman or Seamen, Ordinary Seaman or Landman respectively, so procured and taken in and about London, by the Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy; and at the Out Ports, by the Naval Officers (where there are any), and (where there are no Naval Officers) by the Collector of Our Customs, immediately upon a Certificate being produced to the said Principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, Naval Officers, or Collectors of Our Customs respectively, by the Person who may procure the voluntary Service of any Able Seaman, Ordinary Seaman, or Landman as aforesaid, certifying his Name, and the Name or Names, and Numbers and Quality, of Seamen and Landmen so procured; the said Certificate to be given by such Officer as may take Charge of such Seaman or Landman for Our Service.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of December next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An

Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing several Laws relating to the permitting the Warehousing of Spirits in Ireland for Exportation, for charging a Duty on the same when taken out for Home Consumption, and for regulating the Exportation to Great Britain of Spirits not warehoused, until the Twenty-ninth Day of September, One thousand eight hundred and five; to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions; and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and six;" it is, among other Things, enacted, That an Act, made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; which was continued by an Act of the Thirty ninth and Fortieth Years of His present Majesty, and amended and further continued by several subsequent Acts, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and five, shall be, and the same is thereby, further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and six, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, to permit, for the Space of Six Months from the Date of the said Order, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions therein specified, Duty free: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Thirtieth Day of this instant November, the Impor-

tation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Peas, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb (except salted Beef and Pork); and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel, belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

At a Time when the domineering Power of our inveterate Foe was subjecting unresisting Nations, and concentrating, in View of our own Shores, immense Armies, with the desperate Design of subverting our Liberty and Independence, the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, the gallant Conduct of your Fleets and Armies, seconded by the patriotic Zeal and Indignation of a free and loyal People, opposed such a Resistance as, we trust, would have defeated all the Attempts of our Enemies to enslave us.
