AT the Court at St. James's, the 21st of November 1805,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of December next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and

His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. Cottrell.*

AT the Court at St. James's, the 21st of November 1805,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing several Laws relating to the permitting the Warehousing of Spirits in Ireland for Exportation, for charging a Duty on the same when taken out for Home Consumption, and for regulating the Exportation to Great Britain of Spirits not warehoused, until the Twenty-ninth Day of September, One thousand eight hundred and five; to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions; and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and six;" it is, among other Things, enacted, That an Act, made in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament; which was continued by an Act of the Thirty ninth and Fortieth Years of His present Majesty, and amended and further continued by several subsequent Acts, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and five, shall be, and the same is thereby, further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and six, His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the Thirtieth Day of May last, to permit, for the Space of Six Months from the Date of the said Order, the Importation

of sundry Articles of Provisions therein specified, Duty free: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Thirtieth Day of this instant November, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Peas, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb (except salted Beef and Pork); and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Saur-Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel, belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act, passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Lord Hawkebury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been, by his Lordship, presented to the King, which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common-Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of your ancient and loyal City of Dublin, beg Leave to approach the Throne of our most gracious Sovereign with our sincere Congratulations on the late splendid and glorious Victories obtained by your Majesty's Fleets over the Combined Forces of France and Spain, on the 21st of October last; and on the 4th of November instant; and though we are, in common with all your Majesty's loyal Subjects, affected with the deepest Regret for the irreparable Loss of the ever to be lamented Lord Viscount Nelson, whose godlike Spirit and dauntless Fortitude enabled him to exceed all that he had himself before achieved: yet we cannot but join in the Effusions of Praise so justly due to those illustrious Heroes, whose united Energies contributed to obtain Victories the most brilliant that ever graced our Naval Annals, and which have almost annihilated a Fleet which surpassed your Majesty's in Number, and was led on by the most able and zealous Commanders of your Enemies; we cannot, therefore, but proudly exult at Victories, such as for-

mer Ages had never seen, and which have produced Events at once glorious to your Majesty's Arms, and destructive to the Hopes of your Enemies: Crushing the united Powers of those potent and implacable Foes, who dared to cope with the British Flag, and to dispute with your Majesty the Empire of the Seas: We most humbly hope that the God of Battles, who still continues to extend his Divine Favour to your Majesty and your Kingdoms, will enable you finally to compel the most dangerous and exorbitant Power, which ever threatened the Liberties of Europe, to sue for a fair, permanent, and honorable Peace.

In Testimony whereof we have caused the Common Seal of the said City to be hereunto affixed, the Eighteenth Day of November, in the Forty-sixth Year of your Majesty's Reign.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and Freeholders of your County-Palatine of Chester, beg Leave, with all Humility, to declare our unbounded Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to offer our united and fervent Congratulations on the signal Victories lately obtained, by your Majesty's Fleets, over the Combined Naval Force of France and Spain.

In common with all your Majesty's loyal Subjects, we do most feelingly lament that Triumphs so brilliant and so unprecedented in the Naval Annals, even of Great Britain, have not been purchased without the Loss of that gallant Hero, who so nobly fell in Defence of his Country, and in the Arms of Victory; nor without the Sacrifice of so many valuable Men, by whose intrepid and irresistible Exertions the Honor and Security of the British Empire has been so seasonably strengthened.

We have however, notwithstanding these severe Deprivations, every Reason to be confident, that the remaining Guardians of our Naval Pre-eminence will continue to emulate these glorious Examples; and that a similar Spirit will prevail for Ages yet to come, so that Britons may always exercise their Dominion over the Ocean with that Moderation and Justice by which they have ever been distinguished.

and Spain, off Cape Trafalgar, by your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of the Right Honorable Lord Viscount Nelson, and the subsequent Capture of a Part of the same Fleet, near Cape Ortegal, by Rear-Admiral Sir Richard Strachan, Baronet.
