To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Commonalty of the City of Winchester.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

IT is with mixed Feelings of Exultation and Regret that we presume to approach your Majesty on the Occasion of the late glorious and decisive Triumph obtained by your Majesty's Naval Forces over the Combined Fleets of the Enemy. At the same Time that we partake with the rest of your Majesty's loyal Subjects in the general Joy and Gratitude to Divine Providence for the additional Splendour acquired by the British Arms, we cannot suppress the deep Regret which we feel at the Loss which your Majesty and the Public have sustained by the lamented Fall of an Officer, whose superior professional Talents, Intrepidity, and Perseverance have, on so many Occasions, raised the Glory of the British Flag, endeared him justly to the Public, and excited the Envy and Admiration of the World.

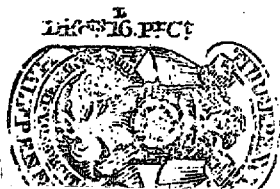
