I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, that His Majesty's Ship under my Command has this Day captured, after a Chace of Nine Hours, the Spanish Letter of Marque La Paulina, of Twelve Guns, Eight of which she threw overboard in the Chace. This Vessel had sailed from Passages, in Spain, and had stood to the Northward to avoid the British Cruizers off that Coast. I believe she was bound to the West Indies, where she could not have failed to have done great Damage to our Trade, as she sails remarkably fast.
